

Energy and Petroleum Cabinet Secretary Davis Chirchir has stated that the power projects between Kapkwen (Bomet) and Chemosit (Kericho) have been completed, while construction from Bomet to Narok, and Narok-Olkaria, is ongoing



structing 4,600 kilometers of high-voltage transmission lines between Kapkwen in Bomet and Narok Counties to alleviate the frequent power blackouts in the country. Energy and Petroleum Cabinet Secretary Davis Chirchir says the

power projects between Kapkwen (Bomet) and Chemosit (Kericho) have been completed, while construction from Bomet to Narok, and Narok-Olkaria, is ongoing.

Speaking during the dissemination of the Fourth Medium-Term Plan (MTP IV) 2023-2027, held at ACK conference hall in Kericho where he was the chief guest, Chirchir mentioned that the Kapkwen to Chemosit power transmission lines have been completed and will stabilize power supply around the country. The CS noted, "To prevent na-

tional outages, the Energy Ministry is forced to switch power on and off in Kericho almost every other day because of constraints

from Mambo Leo in Kisumu to Muhoroni, and Muhoroni to Chemosit.'

"The Bomet-Chemosit line, which is constrained, is built to carry 85 Megawatts of power, and if we allow power to all the industries in the region, while at

When Vision 2030 was conceived, Kenya languished among the world's least developed nations. Today, we proudly stand as a lower middle-income country,

showcasing the tangible benefits of our dedication to implementing Vision 2030 through MTP 1, MTP 2, and MTP 3.

"As we transition to MTP IV and embrace a new long-term strategy. I am optimistic that we will ascend to the upper middle-income category, fueled by our commitment and focus," Kuria noted.

competing on their effective execution.

'The planning function is paramount for governance, financial stability, and economic prosperity. It's regrettable that long-term plans were once associated solely with specific administrations. We must collectively embrace these plans and strive for excellence in their execution," Kuria observed.

Kuria made these remarks during the launch of the Fourth Medium-Term Plan (MTP IV) 2023-2027 dissemination forum at the Kiambu Institute of Science and Technology, Kiambu County.

Kenya Vision 2030 has been the guiding force in development planning since its inception in 2008, implemented through successive five-year Medium-Term Plans (MTPs).

The Fourth MTP (2023-2027) marks the culmination of these efforts, transitioning the nation towards its next phase of development.

The Government's Bottom-Up Economic Trans-

formation Agenda (BETA), outlined in the Kenya Kwanza manifesto, has been integrated into actionable priorities within the Fourth Medium-Term Plan, he said.

BETA aims to stimulate economic growth and inclusivity through a comprehensive value chain approach. "Vision 2030 was mooted

by the Kibaki government, but successive governments, even after attempts to politicize the plan, have been faithful and shown fidelity to Vision 2030," Kuria said.

Key objectives of BETA include reducing the cost of living, eradicating hunger, creating 1.2 million new jobs annually, expanding the tax base, improving foreign exchange balance, and fostering inclusive growth.

These objectives will be achieved through targeted investments across five core pillars: Agriculture, Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises Economy (MSME), Housing and Settlement, Healthcare, and Digital Superhighway and Creative Economy.

the same time lighting homes, it will consume all the power.

"To sustain steady power supply, we need up to 150 megawatts to come through that line, which is only designed to carry 85 megawatts," Chirchir added. The CS explained that a feeder serves about 2,000 to 10,000 people during peak hours, mostly in the evenings.

"Due to the demand for more power in the evenings, it causes blackouts as the system senses danger and shuts down because of the Chemosit - Muhoroni line.

"Therefore, occasionally in the evenings, we switch off Kericho, because it consumes so much power, and we switch off the feeder simultaneously; Kericho today, tomorrow we switch off for Kapkatet, and sometimes in a day we switch off five to six feeders," the CS explained. Chirchir said the situ-

ation would soon be resolved since the power line will be upgraded after the government sourced funding from Korea to tackle the challenge.

"We have a contractor on site, and we started building the Narok-Bomet line so that we don't have to rely solely on power from Kisumu- Muhoroni- Chemosit. The problem does not only affect Kericho but also heavily impacts Bomet, Kisii, Homabay, and Awendo in the Nyanza

Region," Chirchir said. When we switch off Kericho, we must switch off another area to sustain enough power supply. If we do not do that, we will have to shut down the whole country. I'm not sleeping and really working on resolving the challenge. Every now and then, I receive calls from the highest office on the progress made to address the challenge," he said. The CS lamented that due to power issues, he no longer frequents his

home area. The CS further stated that the projects were estimated to take 15 months but had been shortened to a minimum of two months to address the challenge, adding that plans are underway to ensure that 30,000 public institutions are connected to the national grid.

"There should not be a primary school, a dispensary, a high school, or a market that is not connected to electricity as of today," Chirchir said.

Kenya gears up to host global peace leadership conference

enya is poised to host the Global Peace Leadership Conference (GPLC) Africa later this month. The conference, from 25th to 27th June 2024, will start with a tree-growing exercise at Konza Technopolis as part of environmental conservation, where over 30,000 seedlings of different types of trees are expected to be planted. Speaking during a media breakfast meeting in Nairobi, Mr. Daniel Juma, the Executive Director for Global Peace Foundation Kenya, said the conference will mainly address aspects of families, education, and African values and spiritualities.

"This global peace leadership conference is expected to promote unity and cohesion among us, and that is very important for us all globally," Mr. Juma said. Deputy Government Spokesperson Mwanaisha Chidzuga added that the conference will give Kenya an opportunity to collaborate and promote global unity and cohesion.

"This conference is important as it will bring together delegates from Africa and around the world to explore and discuss ways to promote peace, development, and cooperation among us," she said. Chidzuga also urged Kenyans to avoid indulging in ethnic and tribal division and embrace togetherness to promote unity.

Mr. Julius Rotich, the acting CEO of Mama Doing Good Foundation, stated that the conference will come at the right time as it will foster environmental conservation, which aligns with the First Lady Mama Rachel Ruto and President William Ruto's plan of planting over 15 billion trees by 2032.

"Kenya has been at the forefront of promoting peace, security, cohesion, and addressing climate change; hence, the conference will give the country a good image," he said.

Gov't steps up efforts to control tobacco use and related products

The Kenya Demographic and Health Survey (2022 KDHS) shows a decrease in tobacco use from 12 percent in 2014 to nine percent in 2022.

Despite the progress, Kenya now faces new challenges with the rapid proliferation of Novel Nicotine and Emerging Tobacco Products (NNETPs), such as nicotine pouches, vapes, and electronic cigarettes, said State Department for Public Health and Professional Standards Principal Secretary (PS) Mary Muthoni Muriuki.

Ms. Muriuki said these products are often marketed as less harmful alternatives to traditional cigarettes and are targeted toward young people with appealing flavors and misleading health claims.

Thus, "The Ministry of Health, in collaboration with Development Partners and Civil Society Organizations, aims to leverage World No Tobacco Day (WNTD) 2024 to increase awareness of the dangers associated with both conventional tobacco products and NNETPs," the PS said.

The PS said the ministry in collaboration with development partners and civil society organizations aims to leverage on the WNTD 2024 to increase awareness of the



dangers associated with both conventional tobacco products and NNETPs which contribute to increased morbidity and mortality in Kenya and globally.

"Additionally, Kenya has joined and is observing World Tobacco Day (WNTD), a global day promoting health risks associated with tobacco use and advocating for effective policies to reduce consumption," the PS said.

She continued: "Established by the World Health Organization (WHO) in 1987, this day has been celebrated annually on 31st May since 1988. "This year's theme, "Protecting Children from Tobacco Industry Interference", aligns with the WHO's "Stop the Lies" campaign, a vital initiative to shield young people from the manipulative tactics of the tobacco industry." Ms. Muriuki said the campaign calls for an end to tobacco industry interference in health policy, a demand echoed by youth globally who urge governments to protect them from the dangers of tobacco products.

The PS said Kenya has made significant strides in tobacco control, including the implementation of stringent regulations and policies aimed at reducing tobacco use. Key achievements include establishment of a multi-sector task force.

"A dedicated task force was established to investigate novel nicotine and other emerging tobacco products, shedding light on various aspects of these products and their potential impact on public health. Implementation of the recommendations is currently underway, the PS explained. She added that Kenya has continued to enforce the Tobacco Control Act of 2007, which mandates graphic health warnings on cigarette packages and bans smoking in public places. Enforcement of smoke-free laws has led to significant reductions in exposure to second-hand smoke in public areas, she said. Ms. Muriuki highlighted that a comprehensive review of the Tobacco Control Act was conducted to amend and align it with current market dynamics.

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African finance ministers form climate funding group

major milestone has Abeen achieved during the just concluded African Development Bank (AfDB) Annual Meetings in Nairobi, as African finance ministers united to form the Africa Ministers of Finance Consultative Group under the chairmanship of Kenya's Cabinet Secretary for the National Treasury and Planning Prof Njuguna Ndung'u.

This initiative by the African finance ministers which is designed to spearhead climate finance mobilization across the continent, will have Kenya's National Treasury serving as the interim chair b4sides also hosting the Secretariat.

The epoch making decision to form the the Climate Financing initiattive emerged from a high-level roundtable engagement

chaired by Kenya's Treasury Cabinet Secretary, Prof. Njuguna Ndung'u.

"Finance ministers hold the keys to accelerating climate action. They know most clearly the risks posed by climate change and recognize how taking action could unlock trillions in investments and create millions of jobs." Prof Ndung'u said, adding that the formation of the Consultative Group is seen as a timely intervention.

According to Peter Odhengo, the Coordinator of Kenya's Financing Locally-Led Climate Action (FLLoCA) programme, African countries have often missed out on green funding due to the absence of effective policy frameworks and, "this group will now spearhead the enhanced global mobilization of climate finance for the continent,"

Odhengo noted.

Kenya was lauded during the meeting for its leadership in the Africa Green Finance drive, a recognition that builds on its successful implementation of the FLLoCA programme.

According to the organisers of the initiative, it channels funds directly to local communities, empowering them to undertake climate actions tailored to their specific geographic needs using indigenous knowledge and the FLLoCA programme has become a learning hub for various countries aiming to establish similar structures.

The inaugural meeting, held on the sidelines of the 54th AfDB annual conference at the Kenvatta International Conference Centre (KICC), also tasked Rwanda with hosting the

next meeting.

This forthcoming session in Kigali is expected to solidify the operational modalities of the Consultative Group and confirm thematic areas of focus. The need for such a group is underscored by the African continent's significant climate finance deficit

Reports indicate an an-

nual funding gap of up to 213.4 million dollars, or approximately Sh28.2 billion. This shortfall highlights the urgency of coordinated financial strategies to build climate resilience in Africa.

The meeting was attended by ministers of Finance, development cooperation, taxation experts including Denmark's finance advisor, Tepe Christensen.

"The Coalition of Finance Ministers for Climate Action has brought together fiscal and economic policymakers from the continent to lead in climate response and secure a just transition towards low-carbon resilient development," Prof. Ndung'u added.

Religious leaders urged to spearhead civic education against violent extremism

BY CHRIS MAHANDARA(KNA) eligious leaders have been Lurged to reinvigorate civic education efforts at the community level to give impetus to the war against violent extremism.

Nyanza Regional Commissioner Ms. Flora Mworoa said religious leaders are in a vantage position to reach out to the community.

Sensitization, she added, is critical in the fight against violent extremism since those prowling on Kenyan youths have shifted base to areas traditionally not suspected to harbor such activities

She pointed out that the Nyanza region, which previously was not among the hotspots, has now been infiltrated, with several cases reported.

County Commissioner pledges action against criminal gangs

The Government will crack down on goons hired by politicians in parts of Homa Bay County who are perpetrating incidents of insecurity in the county.

County Commissioner Moses Lilan said the Government will not allow anybody, irrespective of their positions, to disrupt peace in the county. Speaking at a public baraza at Papkalango in Rangwe Constituency, Lilan said security officers have already profiled criminal gangs and will soon raid their dens.

He stressed that the government will not allow criminal gangs to operate in the county, adding that some criminal activities were fueled by politicians. Lilan, at the same time, said the county security team is conducting a crackdown on vandals of electricity transformers in the county.

He said a team of police officers has been assigned the duty of tracing lost transformers and arresting suspects.

'We have had frequent power outages due to vandalism of electricity transformers, but I can assure you that their days are numbered; they will face the full force of the law,"

he said.

The administrator said it was regrettable that some parts of the county have been without power due to criminal activities of siphoning oil from transformers.

Mr Lilan said the latest case of vandalism was reported in Rangwe town and another in Omoya area.

He said vandalism of transformers is an act of terrorism and economic sabotage

"Putting communities into darkness for weeks and even months is economic sabotage,' Mr Lilan said.

The administrator told village elders to safeguard all trans-

formers within their areas of jurisdiction through Nyumba Kumi.

He also directed chiefs to strengthen community policing in their areas of jurisdiction.

"Members of the public should cooperate with police by sharing information to weed out criminals in the illegal business," Mr Lilan said.

He said the government had cordoned off at least 50 acres of land in Gwassi Forest where some criminals had been using to grow bhang.

He said this was part of government's effort to fight drug abuse.

Mr Lilan said security personnel in the county have so far destroyed more than 5,000 litres of changaa.

We have also closed down 148 alcohol outlets which were non compliant. No bar in the county should operate for 24 hours," he said.

Rangwe Member of Parliament Dr. Lilian Gogo who was also present called on the security team to address cases of insecurity in her constituency.

She cited an incident in which a secondary school teacher at Bhakita Girls Secondary School was killed by unknown criminals last month.


The report focuses on energy transition, opportunity in the country, challenges and how to tailor locally made solutions that fit the circumstances to be able to address the opportunities in the energy sector.

Kenya Power partners with ministry to expand fiber optic network

BY CHRIS MAHANDARA (KNA)

The Ministry of Information, Communication, Technology, and the Digital Economy has signed a contract with Kenya Power to lay fiber optic cables on the firm's poles.

The Cabinet Secretary, Eliud Owalo, stated that the shift from the traditional laying of the cable underground was set to lower the costs involved and, at the same time, reduce the time spent fixing cables.

"We are currently spending about Sh2.3 million to lay one kilometer of fiber optic cable but, through the arrangement with Kenya Power, this is poised to come down to Sh300,000," said Owalo.

He stated that the target is to have high-speed internet at all corners of the country where Kenya Power has a presence to scale up the uptake of government services online and create jobs for the youth.

"Our target is to have the cable running on all Kenya Power lines. Anywhere we have a power line, we will also have the fiber optic cable. This will scale up connectivity across the country up to people's homes," he said. Speaking during the Vi-

sion 2030 Medium Term IV dissemination meeting in Kisumu, the CS said the government targets to lay 100,000 kilometers of fiber optic cable to scale up internet connectivity.

The CS urged the youth to take advantage of the free training to acquire digital skills.

The digital literacy program has created over 149,000 jobs for the youth over the last one year.

He said so far 490,000 youths have been trained, adding that the program was set to address the rising unemployment in the country.

The government, he said, targets to scale up the training to reach two million youths annually to ensure that they have the requisite skills and knowledge to secure jobs online.

To make the initiative a success, the ministry has embarked in the establishment of digital hubs across the country to ensure that as many youths as possible have access to the training, he said.

"We are going to set up digital hubs in all the wards across the country to enhance access to the free digital skills training program," he said. One digital hub, he

One digital hub, he said, will train up to 1,500 youths annually.

The CS said the government is also scaling up internet connectivity to ensure that the hubs are connected.

Ministry employs sports to restore landscapes and protect ecosystems

■he Ministry of Environment, Forestry, and Climate Change is harnessing the power of sports to accelerate the restoration of degraded landscapes and protect fragile ecosystems, including forests and wetlands in Kenya.

This initiative aligns with Kenya's ten-year National Landscape and Ecosystem Restoration Strategy, a cornerstone of the government's environmental agenda.

A significant stride in the strategy has been the reduction of forest crimes, such as encroachment and illegal logging, which were rampant at the onset of the Kenya Kwanza administration. Speaking during the 35th Rhino Charge held in Torosei, Kajiado County, the Environment Cabinet Secretary, Ms. Soipan Tuya, said the achievement was made possible by reinforcing the Kenya Forest Service (KFS) with an unprecedented addition of 2,700 new rangers, bolstering enforcement capabilities.

Ms. Tuya represented President William Ruto at the closing and award ceremony of the event. This year's event saw Graham Mckittirick of Team 5 emerge victorious, while Safaricom Board Chairman, Mr. Adil Khawaja, in car No. 44, was the highest fundraiser, contributing Sh185 million of the total Sh326 million raised. Accompanying the Cabinet Secretary were Kenya's UNEP Permanent Representative nominee, Amb. Gertrude Angote, and the Chief Conservator of Forests, Mr. Alex Lemarkoko.

They were hosted by Kajiado Governor Joseph Ole Lenku and the Kenya Wildlife Service Director-General, Dr. Erustus Kanga. During the event, Elijah Muli, the Head of Production at the Kenya Yearbook Editorial Board (KYEB), who represented the Chief Executive Officer Lilian Kimeto at the award ceremony, emphasized KYEB's commitment to documenting Kenya's environmental and wild-

PS urges sacco leaders to promote saving culture among Kenyans

■he Principal Secretary for the State Department for Cooperatives, Mr. Patrick Kilemi, has appealed to Sacco leaders to promote the saving culture in their regions, including the diaspora.

Kilemi called on the Saccos to also support the Department of Cooperatives by discussing with their parliamentarians the importance and urgency of the Cooperatives Bill 2024 so that it can be passed as soon as possible.

"Help to push the bill, which is awaiting the second reading in the National Assembly, to go through. MPs are asking for opinions from cooperative leaders, and you have

the ability to champion for the bill that will address what we are talking about, which is good governance of Saccos," he said.

He noted that the bill is for current members of Saccos and generations to come, protecting members' savings.

The Cooperative Bill, 2024, which is at the core of the implementation of the National Cooperative Policy, 2019, was officially published in the Kenya Gazette as a government bill on 23rd February 2024.

It awaits debate in Parliament, and the cooperative department has pledged to ensure the bill is enacted before Ushirika Day

The Sacco Leaders were also urged to support the tree planting agenda and ensure that trees are planted in their regions.

"Set aside funds through CSR for the tree planting campaign and come up with a climate action plan," the PS said in his address.

Multi-Sectoral Working Group unveiled to prioritize environmental justice

The Chief Justice, Martha Koome, has commissioned a multi-sectoral working group to prioritize access to justice on environmental and climate change-related matters.

Koome noted that the Judiciary is committed to tackling environmental challenges, especially climate change, by incorporating green justice principles. This involves embedding environmental sustainability into operations, procedures, and decision-making processes, including both administrative and judicial actions. The working group comprises key stakeholders in the environment and planning sector.

"This is laudable because collaboration and coordination in delivering services are not just constitutional obligations but also integral to our focus on putting the people at the center of all our actions," the Chief Justice said.

She urged members of the working group to continually work towards nurturing a culture of inter-agency consultation and collaboration. The CJ lauded the working group for incorporating Alternative Justice Systems (AJS) in resolving disputes filed in the division.

She noted that AJS had proved to be instrumental in deepening access to justice as it allows the elders and members of the community to unearth and work towards resolving the root cause of conflict and promote reconciliation therefore ensuring the peaceful co-existence of communities. Environment and Land Court (ELC) Principal Judge, Justice Oscar Angote observed that the creation of the working group marked a significant milestone in the continuous efforts to advance environmental protection, promotion of sustainable development and adaptation to the realities of climate change.

He noted that the initiative was a direct outcome of the commitments made at the ELC@10 Conference held in December 2022 in Kilifi County.

The Environment and Planning (EP) Division Presiding Judge, Justice Anne Omollo acknowledged that the law should not only punish but it should educate and inform. The working group which is headed by the Head of the EP Division Nairobi, comprises two ELC EP Division judges, four other judges from various counties across the country and representatives of key stakeholders.

New legislation to drive sustainable growth in Kenya's floriculture industry

he Government is in the process of enacting the Carbon Credit Trading and Benefit Sharing Bill 2023 to create a robust regulatory framework for carbon credit trading and benefit-sharing in the floriculture industry.

It will also establish an Authority to oversee legislative measures that significantly benefit the floriculture sector, providing for the registration and regulation of carbon trading businesses, and setting up a Carbon Credit Trading Tribunal to address disputes in the sec-

Speaking while open-ing the 11th International Floriculture Trade Expo (IFTEX) at the Oshwal Centre, the State Department for Cabinet Affairs Principal Secretary Dr. Idris Ŝalim Dokota said the amended Climate Act establishes a national carbon registry in Kenya and regulates the trade in carbon credits.

"This framework will ensure transparency and accountability in our carbon trading endeavors, and with this, our flower farms can also generate additional revenue by engaging in carbon credit projects," he added.

He explained that Kenya's flower farms can generate additional revenue by engaging in carbon credit projects and by adopting sustainable practices and reducing their carbon footprint. They can earn carbon credits that can be traded internationally.

Representatives from 75 countries participated in the week-long 11th International Floriculture Expo. "The theme of this year's Expo, 'Sustainability,' resonates deeply with the government's commitment to nurturing Kenya's floriculture," the PS said.

"Sustainability is not just a buzzword; it is our shared responsibility. We protect both our industry and our environment," Dr Dakota added, noting that the government

is actively promoting ecofriendly practices such as integrated pest management, water conservation, and organic fertilisation as well as encouraging farmers to adopt renewable energy sources and minimise their carbon footprint.

He said that Kenya's floriculture sector has propelled the country to become a global leader in floriculture, contributing significantly to the economy, creating jobs, and enhancing the livelihoods of over two million Kenyans.

The PS noted that the government has implemented policies that facilitate a conducive business environment, has streamlined export processes, created investment opportunities, and offered support for small and medium-sized enterprises within the floriculture value chain.

"By reducing bureaucratic hurdles and promoting fair trade practices, the government as one of the key priorities outlined in the Bottom-Up Economic Transformation Agenda (BETA) aims to enhance the competitiveness of our flowers in the global market," he said.

Dr Dakota added that the government has also invested in modernising transportation networks, including roads, railways, and airports to enhance efficient logistics that are essential for successful floriculture exports.

This infrastructure has facilitated the seamless movement of flowers from our farms to international markets, preserving their freshness and quality," he noted, adding that the government has also negotiated favourable trade agreements with various

countries, opening doors for Kenyan floriculture exports.

The agreements, he explained, have eliminated trade barriers, promoted fair pricing, and created a level playing field for our flowers in the global market.Dr Dakota gave an example of the Kenya-EU Economic Partnership Agreement, signed in December 2023 which has now been ratified by both the National Assembly of Kenya and the European Union in Brussels. Additionally, he added that collaboration with the UK has resulted in the suspension of the eight per cent duty on cut flowers from Kenya, further demonstrating the successful partnerships.

Christopher Kulei, Chair, Board of Directors, Kenya Flower Council (KFC) said that with around 5,000 hectares dedicated to flower cultivation, the industry exports over 200,000 tonnes of flowers annually, valued at \$900 million, bringing in vital forex revenues to the economy.

State rolls out tax expansion processes to boost revenue

The Government has formulated mechanisms to expand the country's revenue base by including more people in the tax bracket to boost tax collection.

Attorney General Justin Muturi said the level of taxes compared to Kenya's GDP is too low given the size of the economy in the region, and it is imperative for the government to include more and more people to expand the revenue base," Muturi said.

Muturi said in the medium-term plan, the government has factored in an additional 30 to 70 judges, who will be distributed in different courts, adding that an additional 11 judges will be recruited for the Court of Appeal.

He reiterated that it is important that disputes that end up in court are resolved expeditiously.

The Attorney General also called on the county government to work hand in hand with the national government to ensure farmers sell the minimum number of products they produce by adding value to them, saying this will help improve the living standards of the community.

Muturi was speaking at Kirinyaga University during the launch of a public dissemination forum for the Medium-Term Plan IV development programme.

He called for partnership programs by both local and foreign investors as one way to bring development to the country.

He supported the expressway expected to be constructed from Nairobi to Mombasa through a public-private partnership, saying it would speed up development.

Elijah Mwangi, the Principal Secretary State Department for Mining, announced the roll out of the Medium-Term Plan IV (MTP-IV).

The strategic plan, he said, which was the result of extensive county-wide engagements and validated data, was officially launched on March 12th, 2024.

PS Mwangi explained that MTP-IV provides a comprehensive framework for implementing Kenya's development agenda over the next five years.

Central to this agenda, Mwangi explained, is the government's Bottom-Up Economic Transformation Strategy, focusing on five critical areas which are: agriculture, medium and small enterprises (MSMEs), the digital economy, housing and settlement, and health.

These earmarked areas are structured to be executed across six sectors including finance, social protection, governance and public administration, environment, and agriculture. "The implementation

"The implementation of MTP-IV is expected to drive significant development within the country," Mwangi said. "Kirinyaga, in par-

ticular, will see notable benefits, including the development of seven key roads," he added.

Kirinyaga County Deputy Governor David Wachira called for the alignment of MTP- IV to the county's own Integrated Development Plan (CIDP).

Internal Security PS outlines strategy for Kenya's service reforms

team working on the Implementation and Coordination Framework for reforms in the National Police Service (NPS), Kenya Prisons Service (KPS), and the National Youth Service (NYS) has identified four strategic key areas for implementation.

Internal Security and National Administration Principal Secretary Raymond Omollo said the team examined all 598 recommendations provided in the report and is developing a strategic framework for implementation to ensure coherence among the reform institutions.

"The development of the Strategic Framework for implementation of the reforms, which began in February this year, aims to provide an integrated approach to reform priorities in a strategic and coordinated manner to ensure coherence among the reform institutions,³

Dr. Omollo said.

It also aims to strengthen the three security agencies to deliver effective and efficient services to the citizenry, he added. The PS said the four areas that have been identified are leadership, oversight and accountability, institutional capacity development, human resource management and development, and operational preparedness and logistical capacity.

The PS was speaking during a roundtable meeting with development partners on the implementation of reforms in the National Police Service, Kenya Prisons Service, and the National Youth Service at a Nairobi hotel. He said out of the 598 recom-

mendations, a total of 271 pertained to the National Police Service, 210 were for the Kenya Prisons Service, while those for the National Youth Service were 117

"The unpacking of the reforms recommendations was finalized in March this year, and the working team expressed that a total of 221 recommendations could be implemented immediately through administrative actions," Omollo said.During the unpacking, it was agreed that a total of 177 recommendations would require funds to be implemented without need for policy and or legislative actions, a total of 178 recommendations would require policy and legislative actions and funding while 22 recommendations would require consultations and policy guidance.

The PS noted that the strategic framework gives consideration to the Kenva Constitution, Kenva Vision 2030, Fourth Medium Term Plan 2023-

2027, United Nations 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, African Union Agenda 2063 and the East Africa Community Vision 2050.

Other considerations include legal and institutional frameworks of the NPS, KPS and NYS.

He said through good leadership, oversight and accountability, there will be increased capacity for internal and external accountability, transparency and prevention of corruption thereby improving service delivery and public confidence.

The PS at the same time observed that by putting in place institutional capacity development it will help to strengthen policy, legal and institutional framework hence enhancing capacity of the force.

Other strategies that the team will put in place include the developing of modernization masterplan, establishing modernization fund, implementing modernization projects for improved service delivery, improving terms and conditions of service, salary and benefits and enhancing career and succession management. It will also automate human resource functions for effective service delivery, enhance gender mainstreaming, prevention of sexual harassment and gender-based violence, enforce professional standards, training and

human rights protection, as well as develop comprehensive welfare policies among others.

In his speech, the British High Commissioner to Kenya, Neil Wigan said through their program they will support the four pillars of the strategic framework through their Internal Affairs Unit of NPS, the Independent Police Oversight Authority and the National Steering Committee on the Police Reforms. "We will also provide technical support to selected police stations to improve service delivery and the Ministry of Interior in the development of tracking tools for monitoring and evaluating the report," he said.

New education blueprint sets course for inclusive quality education and prosperity

Education Cabinet Secretary Ezekiel Machogu has launched the National Education Sector Strategic Plan (NESSP) for the period 2023-2027.

The comprehensive blueprint will steer Kenya's Education Sector over the next five years, signifying the country's readiness and preparedness to midwife the implementation of lined up reforms.

According to Machogu, this is the first strategic plan to be drafted under the Kenya Kwanza Government, signaling its resolve to give priority to education programs, which are largely seen as the key cornerstones upon which the Bottom-Up Economic Transformation (BETA) is anchored.

Insisting on the government's collective commitment to education, Machogu said Education has been allocated the lion's share in the 2024/2035 Budget Statement expected to be read next week.

He commended his col-

leagues in the Ministry of Education and development partners for working round the clock to finalize the strategic plan, which will immediately be used to guide education programs nationally.

"Having thoroughly read the document, I have no doubt that this strategic plan will ensure that we succeed in the delivery of the important education service. This well-done strategic plan is indeed a clear testimony that we will not fail to deliver robust and solid education programs to our children and youth," he maintained.

Speaking at the Kenya School of Government, Machogu highlighted that the plan has adopted a bold vision of inclusive and equitable quality education, training, and research for prosperity.

To achieve the goal of the Strategic Plan, therefore, all sector players would need to play their part This vision, he continued, underscores the government's commitment to ensuring that every citizen, regardless of their background or circumstances, has access to quality education that empowers them and contributes to the prosperity of the nation.

The CS pointed out that the key pillars contained in the strategic plan have made it clear where the national focus is on education.

He noted that the emphasis is on the issues of promoting inclusive practices that celebrate diversity and provide equal opportunities for success; promoting cutting-edge teaching and learning methodologies that foster critical thinking, creativity, and problem-solving skills and strengthening education management systems, improving transparency, and ensuring that resources are used efficiently and effectively.

Machogu mentioned that the pillars also seek to establish mechanisms for ongoing training and support to keep pace

with evolving educational practices; and enhance digital literacy, provide access to online resources, and promote the use of ICT in teaching and learning.

Machogu reckoned that the launch of the strategic plan comes at a time when the Education Sector is undergoing major reforms.

He said the strategic plan has incorporated the recommendations of the Presidential Working Party on Education Reforms that were contained in the report handed over to the President last year. Additionally, he disclosed that the Ministry has drafted a sessional paper and a number of proposed legislations that, once passed by Parliament, will effectively rollout the education reforms as outlined in the Presidential Working Party Report. The CS noted that the

The CS noted that the strategic plan lays out a clear roadmap for the smooth transition from the 8-4-4 system to the Competency-Based Curriculum as he cautioned that the well-thought reforms and programmes contained in the plan will not be achieved if the

roadmap is not resourced and as a result, the implementation of the strategic plan will require heavy financial and human capital investments.

Machogu stated that the implementation and coordination framework of the strategic plan is detailed in a cost implementation matrix, that would ensure resources are efficiently and effectively utilized adding that, in total, the plan will cost about Sh5.2 trillion over the next five years.

"To achieve the goal of the Strategic Plan, therefore, all sector players would need to play their part to mobilise the requisite resource requirements," the CS said.

Giving a sneak preview into the Strategic Plan, Machogu outlined that the Ministry plans to construct 16,000 new classrooms for the Junior School by December 2024 including the provision for renovations, rehabilitation and construction of other facilities such as laboratories, dining halls and WASH facilities.

Nyamira County implements climate change solutions through FLLoCA program

yamira County is implementing adaptive mechanisms to mitigate the effects of climate change in the area, courtesy of the Financing Locally Led Climate Action (FLLoCA) programme.

The county Department of Environment, Water, and Natural Resources has

initiated the construction of dams for water harvesting, desilting existing dams, protecting water springs, and installing solar-powered pumps to supply residents with clean water for domestic use.

"The FLLoCA programme has enabled us to start drilling boreholes in various identified wards within Nyamira, some of which include Nyansiongo, Mekenene, Magombo, Rigoma, amongst others, desilting the existing dams which were filled during the flooding seasons in the months of April and May, and protecting water springs where residents fetch water for domestic use and animals for drinking," said County Executive Committee Member (CECM) John Matiang'i. He further mentioned that the county has also initiated urban greening with the FLLoCA programme, planting trees in all urban and town centers within the county to increase tree cover, improve

Nyamira town centers. "We are still sensitizing residents against planting

carbon sink, and create

a cool green ambience in

eucalyptus trees, which are detrimental to the environment, cause a lot of disputes amongst people due to its effects on crops, and endanger water catchment areas because they are heavy water consumers for their fast growth," the CECM said. Matiang'i pointed out

that other types of trees apart from eucalyptus were equally economically viable because apart from timber, there were other trees like bamboo that are used to make several products and they have no waste at all.

He appreciated the Kenya Forestry Services (KFS) for their support of always providing tree seedlings and initiating various tree nurseries in schools and other public institutions to ensure that "we always have enough seedlings to plant and reclaim our environment which has speedily deteriorated mainly by human actions", he said.

Nyamira County has already surpassed the 30 per cent national tree cover target.

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New legislation aims to resolve resource conflicts in Laikipia

BY MUTURI MWANGI (KNA)

It will soon bring joy to pastoral communities in Laikipia County following the introduction of a bill that is expected to address resource-based conflicts in the area by environmental activists. The proposed Laikipia County Rangeland Management Bill, if enacted by the county assembly, is further expected to support pastoral communities in eradicating invasive plants like cactus that have invaded their grazing fields, affecting thousands of livestock keepers.

Laikipia County has in the past experienced perennial conflicts due to a lack of grazing fields and scarce water resources. The bill, which is being drafted in accordance with the Community Land Management Act of 2016, will simultaneously help prevent land degradation in the vast dry lands. The Rangeland Man-

agement Bill, which has received the green light from the county executive, is being sponsored by the LISTEN project in partnership with the Frontier Counties Development Council (FCDC) and the Laikipia County government.

LISTEN is a project being implemented in the counties of Laikipia, Isiolo, and Samburu aimed to bolster food nutrition, water security and climate change adaptation of the four Arid and Semi-Arid Lands (ASALs) through the nexus approach.

Speaking at a Nanyuki hotel during the rangeland management bill workshop, stakeholders in agriculture and environmental conservation said that the legislation will help in governing range lands and support pastoral communities through fonder formulation.

Ms Peninah Kituyo, a Laikpia north resident said that with the bill, it would be easy for the community to manage their land aimed at bolstering peace in the county.

Laikipia County Executive Committee (CECM) incharge of Agriculture and Livestock Dennis Kasoo pointed out that the laws will at the same time guide pastoralists from neighboring counties on the mode of grazing during dry weather which in the past had resulted in conflicts due to illegal herders.

IGAD experts call for increased funding to boost resilience in border communities

BY GATHIGIA NG'AARI

xperts from IGAD member states ⊿have called for increased funding to foster resilience among border communities covered by the regional bloc.

According to IGAD's Deputy Executive Secretary, Mohamed Ware, resilience is a common thread in the lives and livelihoods of border communities, which are often neglected and marginalized by distant capitals.

During discussions focused on cross-border resilience programming in IGAD's Karamoja, Moyale, and Mandera clusters, located in the border areas of Uganda, Ethiopia, and Kenya, Ware emphasized the need for border communities to be resilient.

He added that any assistance to them, whether humanitarian interventions or social development investments, must start with preserving and strengthening their resilience.

"I encourage development partners and member states to allocate funding to promote knowledge sharing across all IGAD clusters," he asserted.

He emphasized that engaging diverse stake-

holders, securing longterm funding, and enhancing collaboration among member states and development partners are essential for fostering a resilient and sustainable future.

Ware noted that border communities are largely pastoralists and agro-pastoralists, depending on increasingly unreliable and erratic rainfall.

"Often victims of the extremes of climate impact, these communities endure cycles of drought and floods, often in the same year, and sometimes several times," Ware added.

He observed that with limited infrastructure in border areas, humanitarian and relief efforts are often too little and late.

Further, Ware reckoned that borderlands are often hideouts of criminal elements due to inadequate policing and security services hence communities become victims of banditry, livestock rustling, arms trafficking and racketeering.

"The strong arm of the law and periodic

incursions of heavily armed security forces are sometimes the only meaningful interaction with government authorities, and they often leave misunderstanding, resentment and hostility behind," he disclosed. He at the same time

maintained that communities on the border are vital for individual member states security since states at the local and national level need their goodwill, cooperation, and partnership to secure their borders.

"The Project Building Resilience to Food and Nutrition Security in the Horn of Africa (BRE-FONS) mobilized \$162 million across five countries, with additional funding from the Green Climate Fund, which is expected to inject \$151 million, supporting IG-AD's goals for long-term sustainability," he said. Ware noted that man-

agement of river basins that often traverse the border needs to be depoliticized, with the establishment of non-political, technical, and competent River Valley Management Authorities that take rivers' cyclical impact on border communities.

He pointed out that advancements in technology, such as mobile

applications for data collection and GIS mapping, mobile money and banking, access to information through the internet, access to market prices for inputs and farm and livestock products all empowered borderland communities in ways unthinkable a few ways universe ago. "With their leg-

endary dynamism, and resilience, I am optimistic about the prospects for the lives and livelihoods of border communities," he said.

Kenya's State Department for the Arid and Semi-Arid Lands (ASALs) and Regional Development Princi-pal Secretary (PS) Kello Harsama said that Kenya and Uganda signed a MoU on September 13, 2019, in Moroto, whose objective was to accord communities on both sides of the border better cooperation, peaceful co-existence and bridge isolation gaps. "The Programme

document has been developed and validated by both countries," he re-affirmed, adding that the Ministry was in the process of reviewing the MoU between Kenya and Ethiopia and initiating the MoU between Kenya -Somalia and Kenya-South Sudan.

Loglogo Health Centre unveils cutting-edge lab for area residents

The launch of a modern medical laboratory at Loglogo Health Centre is set to improve access to quality healthcare for residents of Laisamis Constituency in Marsabit County.

The laboratory, constructed and equipped by the Lake Turkana Wind Power (LTWP) company in conjunction with Z. Boskovic Air Charters, is intended to provide curative, promotional, and preventive health services to members of local communities.

LTWP's new Chief Executive Officer (CEO), Max Schiff, stated that besides the green energy-producing firm's focus on implementing community development projects in the water and education sectors, bringing quality healthcare services closer to the people is of major concern.

Schiff expressed satisfaction during the facility's handover to the Marsabit County Government, emphasizing that members of the local communities would no longer have to travel long distances in search of this crucial diagnostic service whenever they fall ill.

"This gesture is definitely going to make access to the desired health services less costly and readily available to the residents of this area," he said. The facility was built and equipped at a cost of more than Sh15 million as a corporate social responsibility (CSR) gesture to the community by the company's Wind of Change (WoC) Foundation.

Marsabit County Chief Officer for Health Dr. Adan Alamin said that the devolved unit values partnerships with the private sector and such collaboration helps in speeding up development. Dr. Alamin termed the availability of the laboratory as a big boost in the provision of health care to the residents adding that the county government would strive to avail not only curative but also promotional and preventive health services.

The Chief Officer thanked LTWP for also donating reagents for use at the facility and pledged that the county government would post the requisite medical personnel including lab technologists at the health centre. "We acknowledge with appreciation the contribution that Lake Turkana Wind Power is making in the health sector which goes a long way in improving the livelihoods of our people," he noted, adding that it was barely a month after the company handed over a fully equipped male ward at the Laisamis sub-county hospital that cost Sh15.3M.

he Government, in collaboration with the United Nations (UN), is implementing a plan to end the triple threat of new HIV infections, mistimed pregnancies, and sexual and Gender-Based Violence among adolescents and young people in the country.

The National Syndemic Diseases Control Council (NSDCC), in collaboration with seven agencies, is implementing a multi-sectoral to secure commitplar ment and accountability by state and non-state actors for the initiative launched in February 2024 by Health Cabinet Secretary Susan Nakhumicha. The Principal Secretary for Medical Services, Harry Kimtai, said the country adopted a whole-of-nation approach uniting ministries, departments, agencies, county governments, development partners, and key stakeholders in the national initiative to end the triple threat.

"The high-level visits aim to connect with communities affected by the triple threat challenge, reflect on collective responsibility, and secure commitment to ending this challenge," the PS said during a high-level experiential visit in Homa Bay County.

In 2022, 41 of new HIV infections occurred among adolescent girls and young people aged 15 to 24 years. Furthermore, in the same year, women aged 15 and above accounted for 57 percent of all new HIV infections in the country.

Kenya and South Korea ink deals to boost fisheries and maritime sectors

BY BERNADETTE KHADULI(KNA) enya and the Republic of South Korea have signed two key Memorandums of Understanding (MOUs) to bolster their cooperation in the Blue Economy and Maritime Affairs. Salim Mvurya, Cabinet Secretary for Mining, Blue Economy, and Maritime Affairs, signed the MOUs on behalf of the Government of Kenya, while the Korean side was represented by Dr. Do-Hyung Kang, Minister of Oceans and Fisheries.

The signing ceremony took place in Seoul, Korea, during the Korea International Cooperation Conference on Oceans and Fisheries. With the MOU on the Blue Economy in place, Kenya and Korea will cooperate in supporting the establishment of infrastructure for fisheries and fishing communities, as well as collaborative projects in the fisheries sector. It also opens the door for collaboration in training fishery workers and professional human resources, and the transfer of fish processing technology, among other areas of mutual benefit to the two countries. In a press statement sent to KNA by the Ministry, CS Mvurya and his Korean counterpart agreed that the two sides will establish a Joint Technical Working Group and identify liaison secretaries who will be responsible for developing an implementation plan and supervising the cooperative projects in the two countries.

The MOU on Maritime Affairs focuses on cooperation in recognition of seafarers certificates of competency and capacity development. "The parties may, by common accord, identify and deepen other areas of cooperation under this MOU," the signed MOU says in part.

On recognition of seafarers certificates of competency, Kenya and Korea will create

joint maritime-related activities between maritime training institutions ranging from conferences, seminars, workshops, collaborative research, short courses and other certification training programmes for students, faculty and industries.

The two countries will also cooperate in facilitating capacity building opportunities, development and review of curriculum in the oceans, maritime transport and logistics, and fisheries sectors.

Other areas of cooperation include on-site support from Korean lecturers, development of Seafarers Train-the-Trainers specialized courses, exploring opportunities for Kenyan maritime students and exchange of best practices on marine environment protection.

Speaking before the signing ceremony, CS Mvurya appreciated the steady growth of the blue economy and maritime relations between Kenya and Korea focusing on various areas of cooperation trade, maritime security and technology exchange. "Both countries recognise the importance of maritime affairs for their economic development and have engaged in bilateral Agreements and initiatives to enhance cooperation in this domain," the CS said.

In terms of Trade, the Cabinet Secretary noted that Korea is a significant trading partner for Kenya in maritime-related industries such as shipbuilding equipment, port infrastructure and maritime technology.

He said the two countries also collaborate in maritime security initiatives to combat piracy, illegal fishing and other maritime crimes in the region.

"Korea has provided assistance to Kenya in terms of capacity building, training, and technology transfer to enhance maritime security capabilities," he said.

On Technology Exchange, CS Mvurya said Korea has shared its expertise in shipbuilding, port management and marine technology with Kenya through technical assistance programs and knowledge exchange initiatives.

The Ministry of Health, in partnership with selected county governments, plans to carry out a survey to ascertain the prevalence of bilharzia and intestinal worms among Kenyans.

Dr. Florence Wakesho, the Ministry's Medical Parasitology expert, said schistosomiasis, commonly known as bilharzia, and soil-transmitted helminthiasis, commonly known as intestinal worms, are among the highly endemic neglected tropical diseases (NTDs) in the country.

eases (NTDs) in the country. "In Kenya, 17.4 million people are at risk of being infected with bilharzia," she said, adding that the country, however, has over ten neglected tropical diseases that are common within the various endemic counties.

Dr. Wakesho said 32 counties, including Murang'a, Nairobi, and others drawn from Central, Rift Valley, Eastern, and North Eastern, will be carrying out the survey.

"We are looking to understand, especially for bilharzia and intestinal worms, the distribution of these diseases and to understand who is affected by these diseases in the 32 selected counties in Kenya," Wakesho said.

She said the data findings from the survey will enable the government to make informed decisions and policy-making regarding prioritizing intervention measures in identified areas that are prevalent to NTDs.

"Some of the measures will include mass drug administration, water sanitation and hygiene and incorporating behavior change communication within health intervention measures," she noted.

Speaking in Murang'a County during a mapping and validation exercise, Dr. Wakesho said in Murang'a, the survey will kickstart in June and will be carried out among school going children within the seven sub-counties in the county.

"Bilharzia is a chronic illness that can seriously damage the internal organs. In children, it can lead to reduced growth and problems with cognitive developments," she added.

"The numbers of infection can be rising high because of the trends of the diseases and that is what we want to evaluate and know the true burden of these diseases," said Wakesho, who is also the Ministry's schistosomiasis and soil transmitted helminthiasis programme manager.

She divulged that neglected tropical diseases are not just a health issue. They have profound social and economic impacts, hampering educational achievement and perpetuating cycles of poverty.

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EPRA to inject Sh2.1 billion to boost power connection in Mount Kenya counties

The Rural Electrification and Renewable Energy Corporation (REREC) is targeting to connect more than 14, 500 households from the Mt. Kenya region with electricity.

Through the ambitious programme, the REREC will use Sh. 2. 1 billion to increase power connections not only to households but also to public facilities including schools, hospitals and markets.

Speaking when he launched Rugongo Ruraya power project in Kigumo sub county, the REREC Director Mark Nderitu said the counties slated to benefit with the programme include Murang'a, Kirinyaga, Kiambu, Nyeri, Embu, Meru, Isiolo, Tharaka Nithi and Marsabit.

In Murang'a, he averred, more than 6, 000 households in rural areas as set to be connected with electricity in the drive.

"Sh. 434 million will be used in Murang'a County where 87 power projects are being implemented to attain last mile electricity connections.

"The projects are at various stages of completion and by next financial year, all the slated 6, 000 households will be connected with electricity." Added Nderitu.

The director underscored the government's commitment to attain 100 percent power connection in near future.

Electricity, he noted, will spur social and economic development in rural areas saying education will benefit as students will get more time for studies.

"The power connection will go a long way in improving people's lives especially those in rural areas, access to electric power at markets, hospitals among other social amenities will increase working hours," he added. Nderitu continued "Res-

idents will now be able to make use of technology and fit their homes with appliances that will make their lives easier, and children will no longer depend on kerosene lamps to do their homework." On Rugongo Ruraya power project which serves residents at tea growing areas of Kigumo, the director divulged 785 households are set to be connected.

"In the first phase of this Kigumo project, 270 households will get connected and in the second phase slated to commence next financial year, 515 homes will be linked to electric power," he remarked.

Tea farmers, the director added, will benefit hugely from the power connection as they were unable to sell their green leaf at night thus incurring huge losses.

"Tea farmers from this region were unable to sell their produce at the tea buying centre at night and would lose kilos but with power, they can sell their tea any time. Installation of electricity has transformed their lives," he stated.

Nderitu urged various development partners including the National- Government Constituency Development Fund (NGCDF) and county governments to allocate funds and support electrification programmes to accelerate rural electrification in priority areas.

National Treasury CS highlights urgency of balancing economic growth with population expansion rate

for Population and Development (NCPD) has launched Sessional Paper No. 1 of 2023 on the Kenya National Population Policy for Sustainable Development.

National Treasury and Economic Planning Cabinet Secretary, Prof. Njuguna Ndung'u, stated that the aim of the policy is to maximize investment in people through appropriate quality education, healthcare, nutrition, job creation, and skills development. Speaking at a Nairobi hotel during the launch, Prof. Ndung'u emphasized that population growth has become a critical issue. He noted that the population is growing faster than the economy, adding that this will become a problem if left unattended.

"Our economic growth does not match the population growth, and this will lead to problems in the future where demand for government services, amenities, and infrastructure like roads, schools, and hospitals will be very high," Prof. Ndung'u said. The Treasury CS said population growth is a dynamic issue which requires critical analysis and management for there to be adequate development and good quality of life.

"Population growth comes with various dynamics like infrastructure, migration, changes in mortality rates among others, and if these fundamental factors are not addressed they might lead to a slowdown in development," Prof. Ndung'u said.

Government pledges collaboration with counties to enhance living standards for Kenyans – Namwamba

The national government is committed to working with county governments to promote the standard of living for Kenyans through coordinated planning of development programs and projects.

Cabinet Secretary for Youth Affairs, Creative Economy, and Sports, Ababu Namwamba, stated that the transformation of the country will be achieved through joint efforts by the two levels of government to prioritize projects that directly generate employment opportunities and grow the economy. Namwamba made

Namwamba made these remarks during a public dissemination forum of the Fourth Medium-Term Plan held at a Kakamega hotel.

He noted that the Constitution makes it mandatory for county and national governments to cooperate in the performance and exercise of their functions and mandates.

Namwamba mentioned that the national government has committed to completing several projects initiated by the Kakamega County Government but stalled due



to a lack of resources. The CS cited Bukhungu Stadium, which he noted will be completed by the national government at a cost of over Sh700 million, as well as the Kakamega County Level Six Hospital, which was initiated by the county but also stalled midway.

He observed that the Kakamega County Integrated Development Plan (CIDP) of 2023-2027 has a deficit of Sh41.1 billion and emphasized the importance for the national government to assist the county in achieving the desired projects. "Let us work together

and support the govern-

ment despite our political affiliations," the CS, who was accompanied by the Principal Secretary in charge of Higher Education Dr. Beatrice Inyangala, said.

On her part, Dr. Inyangalaseverald several developments that the national government has initiated in the region and hailed Kakamega County for aligning her CIDP to the MTP IV.

Stakeholders at the forum asked the national government to help complete all stalled projects and expand the Kakamega airstrip to an airport to spur the local economy.

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Nakuru's milk production set to soar with subsidized insemination scheme

BY ESTHER MWANGI (KNA) ilk production in Nakuru is poised to increase through a plan to provide subsidized artificial insemination services.

The County Government's plan targeting more than 200,000 farmers is also aimed at improving beef animal breeds to boost meat production.

The county currently produces an average of 318 million litres of milk annually with an estimated turnover of Sh14 billion.

The County Executive Committee Member (CECM) for Agriculture, Livestock and Fisheries Mr Leonard Bo said the initiative to provide pedigree semen aims at giving dairy farmers new improved breed that will increase milk production from

the current seven litres to around 12 litres per cow per day, enabling farmers to earn more money from the sale of milk.

Mr Bor said with the cheap cost, they expect demand for the services to grow exponentially.

"We have procured dairy cows', beef cattle, and dairy goats' semen which we will sell at Sh800, down from the market price of Sh2,000. During the first phase of the project 23 cooperative societies will benefit from this program which is being carried out through public-private partnerships," the CECM disclosed adding "lready Sh10 million has been budgeted for the service this year"

The 23 dairy cooperative societies are drawn from Naivasha, Gilgil, Subukia, Bahati, Nakuru West, Rongai, Njoro, Molo, Kuresoi North, and Kuresoi South Sub-Counties.

"The programme will help farmers increase their earnings. It is regrettable that farmers have not been able to optimize production due to poor breeds, but this is now set to be a thing of the past," the CECM said and added that the county produces 25,000 to 30,000 litres of milk in a day.

Bor added that through the initiative, the Department's sub-county officers have been provided with semen, nitrogen tanks, and technical expertise to offer AI services to dairy farmers.

Livestock Fisheries and Veterinary Services Chief Officer Dr. Michael Cheruiyot said that the program is a game changer

since it will ensure a thriv-

ing dairy and beef industry. Dr. Cheruiyot added the county will continue to have continuous capacity building training for the cooperatives to ensure

success of the program.

He advised farmers to join the Nakuru County Cooperative Dairy Union as it brings together 15 giant and active cooperatives. The major aim of the Union, the Chief Officer noted, is to promote value addition and marketing for better prices.

"The ultimate goal of this programme is to ensure that farmers increase their milk and meat production and get more value from it so that they can uplift their living standards," he said.

Nakuru County establishes committee to acquire title deeds for public land

The County Government of Nakuru has established a standing committee to expedite the process of acquiring title deeds for public land after it emerged that 210 health institutions and four cemeteries did not possess the vital document.

John Kihagi, the County Executive Commit-tee Member (CECM) for Lands, Physical Planning, Housing, and Urban De-velopment, stated that the administration of the devolved unit is exerting every effort to safeguard the public interest vested in the health facilities within the region.

For quite some time now, land owned by public health facilities across all 11 sub-counties has been targeted by land grabbers, largely due to the absence of title deeds.

'We will ensure that the public health facilities established by our forefathers and foremothers do not disappear under our watch but remain public grounds as they are, through the sanctity of proper titling," declared Mr. Kihagi.

He highlighted that the failure to secure these public health facilities exposes taxpavers to the risk of losing or paying billions of shillings in compensation to private firms and individuals.

Mr. Kihagi made these remarks at the Nakuru Teaching and Referral Hospital during a consultative meeting between

alarm over the continued shrinking of public health facilities' land due to encroachment and grabbing by unscrupulous private developers.

Kihagi indicated that they will deploy county surveyors and planners to determine levels of encroachment, grabbing, land size and land status, adding that this move will ensure all health facilities are documented with grabbed land reverted to the county.

"This is in line with Governor Susan Kihika's directive on titling of all public utilities within Nakuru to form part of the County Public Land Inventory. We will fasttrack the process of acquiring title deeds for all public health facilities to keep away land grabbers," the CECM affirmed.

Reports tabled in the assembly over the last four years show that most of the public health facilities in the county have no ownership documents.

Among the recommendations include compelling the Department of Lands and Physical Planning to start the process of issuing land documents in the names of the hospitals.

In 2019, the health committee, led by the then Elburgon MCA Njuguna Mwaura, visited Rift Valley Provincial General Hospital- Annex, which serves residents within Nakuru County.

The committee found that the hospital that has served Nakuru residents for over 60 years had no title deed and registered under private ownership.

According to Njuguna, the hospital was launched to cater for patients from the main Rift Valley Provincial General Hospital due to congestion.

"Despite sitting on government land, the hospital has no ownership document," read the report in part. In March last year, the same committee visited Naivasha Sub-County Referral Hospital to assess the quality of services provided to the public.

A report tabled in the assembly on March 8, 2023, showed Nakuru County Government had no title deed for the land where Naivasha Hospital sits. "The facility has no title deed, and the county cannot claim it owns the property. Soon the property may be claimed by private individuals," the committee submitted in its report.

Another report, passed by the Assembly on October 4, 2023, shows that Elburgon Hospital in Molo Sub-County has no ownership documents.

The hospital which sits on 3.72 hectares of land

serves a population of over 36,450 patients but sometimes gets referrals from other facilities.

The Health Committee has now turned its guns on the Implementation Committee of the Assembly, for failing to follow up on the title deeds.

According to the Com-mittee, the implementation team has failed to table reports on the progress in obtaining the deeds for the hospitals.

"Despite previous recommendations by the assembly for title documents of hospitals to be obtained, the implementation committee has not followed up," states the report.

The committee now wants the Department of Health to collaborate with the Department of Land, Housing and Physical Planning to fast-track processing of the documents. The house has also given the implementation committee 21 days to respond to the allegations of lagging follow-up to the issuance of title deeds for the hospitals.

Chapter Five of the Constitution defines public land as that occupied by state organs, government forests, game reserves and national parks, specially protected areas, roads and road reserves.

County Executive Committee Member for Health Roselvn Mungai said the department will facilitate all the necessary documents for ease of the exercise.

Mungai hailed the Lands docket for seeking to employ the use of Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) mechanisms to address disputed lands where some of the health facilities stand.

Technical team advances proposals to fast-track building of industrial parks

The Government has initiated consultations with the Council of Governors to navigate the rigorous process of seeking expressions of interest towards the operationalization of County Aggregation and Industrial Parks (CAIPs).

This collaboration aims to attract proposals from stakeholders, with a formal call for expressions of interest (EOIs) slated for the third week of June.

During the consultative meeting, which gathered top officials from national and county governments, Trade Investments Cabinet Secretary Rebecca Miano highlighted significant progress in the construction of industrial parks in Phase I counties.

"The development and implementation of CAIPs is on a 50/50 basis between the national government and county governments. "The County Govern-

ments Additional Alloca-

tion Act, 2023, facilitated the recent disbursement of Sh1.125 billion from the National Treasury to the 18 Phase I counties, with each receiving Sh62.5 million to expedite the implementation process," Miano said.

To fast-track the process, a technical team has already developed proposals for expressions of interest in several areas, including CAIPs management, equipping to promote value addition of local agricultural and industrial resources, constructing additional industrial warehouses and supportive infrastructure, and encouraging industrial investment in aggregation, value addition, manufacturing, branding, packaging, labeling, and logistics.

The Cabinet Secretary noted that despite last month's disbursement, some counties are still below five per cent in construction progress.

"We have initiated further discussions with the counties below five per cent to encourage and assist them in resolving the issues affecting their progress," she said. CS Miano affirmed that

CS Miano affirmed that the manufacturing sector is crucial for economic development, employment creation, and generating new value-added products that increase foreign exchange.

She noted that the sector's contribution to GDP has stagnated at around seven per cent, and despite Kenya being an agriculture-led economy, the export value added of agricultural and livestock products remains at 16 per cent.

According to the Cabinet Secretary, CAIPs will propel the manufacturing sector through agro-processing industries, create employment opportunities for the youth, strengthen linkages between manufacturing and agriculture, enhance the volume of value-added products, boost farmers' incomes, increase foreign exchange and reduce post-harvest losses for Kenyans.



"This payment is meant to boost the morale of the workers and stabilise operations at the company," he assured. He also promised Nzoia farmers 20 per cent of their Sh54 million dues and unveiled Agricultural Development Corporation (ADC) tractors to promote mechanised farming, boosting agricultural productivity.



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Government calls for participation of all individuals and institutions in the 10-year environment restoration strategy

he government targets to rehabilitate all the country's degraded landscapes and ecosystems as it implements the 10-year National Landscape and Ecosystem Restoration Strategy, whose anchor initiative is the 15 billion tree planting initiative.

The strategy has five key objectives, which include to increase national tree cover by 17.8 per cent by 2032 through targeted interventions on public, community and private lands; improving landscape and ecosystem governance through robust policy, regulatory and institutional frameworks; encouraging private sector investment and develop sustainable financing mechanisms for the restoration of degraded landscapes and strengthening capacity, research, monitoring, evaluation and knowledge management.

Ms Soipan Tuya, the Cabinet Secretary for Environment, Climate Change and Forestry, said the strategy aims to enhance the ecological integrity of the country while contributing to social and economic transformation.

"Our approach is inclusive, calling for the participation of all Kenyans – from individuals to institutions, public and private sectors, urban and rural areas, and from the young to the old in what we term as the 'whole-of-society, whole-ofgovernment' approach," she said as Kenya joined the globe in celebrating World Environment Day on June 5, 2024, whose theme was "Land Restoration desertification and drought resilience".

Land degradation has manifested in many ways in the country, including through loss of vegetation, increased aridity, scarcity of water sources, growing of shrubs in areas which were predominantly rich in pastures, gullies, thin and stony soils and invasion of intrusive species that lead to food and water insecurity, according to the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification.

The key drivers of land degradation are "deforestation, overgrazing, poor agricultural activities (overuse of fertilisers, up-downhill ploughing), forest fires, poor spatial planning, mining and sand harvesting."

Ms Tuya noted that Kenya has no choice but to restore the degraded landscapes and ecosystems as the country becomes most vulnerable to climate change.

"We are vulnerable to climate change since

the key drivers of our economy - agriculture, livestock, tourism, forestry and fisheries, are climate-sensitive. Hence climate change continues to adversely impact Kenya's socio-economic sectors," she said.

According to her, land restoration holds the key to reversing this tide, as every investment in restoration yields significant returns in terms of improved ecosystem services.

"We believe land restoration involves more than just tree growing; it requires a holistic approach that integrates sustainable land use practices, community engagement and robust policy interventions. In this regard, we recently successfully reviewed the Climate Change Act to mainstream carbon markets as an important climate finance opportunity for Kenya," she said.

In the ongoing ecosystems restoration campaign, led by Cabinet Secretaries and senior members of the Executive, all MDAs have been allocated sites for tree planting and given targets to achieve.

"The new approach, as unveiled by President William Ruto, aims to ensure the full restoration of assigned ecosystems. This involves not only tree planting but also nurturing the young trees and protecting them through fencing to facilitate natural regeneration of the sites," said Ms Tuya.

INFOBOX

Land restoration: Tree-planting

Land restoration is a key pillar of the UN Decade on Ecosystem Restoration (2021-2030), a rallying call for the protection and revival of ecosystems all around the world, which is critical to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals.

According to the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), the World is still heading for a temperature rise of near 3°C this century – far beyond the Paris Agreement goals of limiting global warming to well below 2°C and pursuing 1.5°C. Even though Kenya contributes less than 0.1 per cent of global greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions annually, heat, drought and floods are impacting Kenyans negatively.

KPA unveils ambitious plan for new passenger terminal at Kisumu Port

∎he Kenya Ports Authority has announced plans to set up a modern passenger terminal at the Port of Kisumu to revive transportation through Lake Victoria.

Through a partnership with Trademark Africa, the KPA technical team has completed designs for the project, which is expected to inject new life into the revamped Kisumu Port.

The KPA General Manager in charge of infrastructure development (GMID), Eng Mathew Amuti, said the initiative, dubbed the Kisumu Port Resilient Infrastructure Project, aims to enhance connectivity in the East Africa region to spur trade and economic development. Eng. Amuti mentioned that the KPA technical team is reviewing the designs for the passenger terminal, which will be located at the junction of Oginga Odinga Street and Obote Road, to determine the actual costs for the project ahead of the tendering process.

The passenger terminal, he said, will have all aspects of an international entry or exit point, check-in or check-

out facilities, surveillance cameras, a port security office, a border patrol unit, the Kenya Coast Guard Service, immigration offices, among other government agencies.

Other amenities include an access road linking Kisumu Central Business District (CBD) and the western region en route to Uganda, a jetty for vessels plying the lake locally and internationally, a ramp for ferries, security systems, and restrooms. Designed to optimize passenger flow, the terminal includes segregated areas for ferry passengers with substantial cargo, local travelers, and international guests, with a capacity of over 500 passengers at the jetty and 1,000 at the ferry terminal per hour.

Travellers, he said, will have a range of facilities such as restaurants, forex bureaus and offices for taxi operators at the terminal premises. In addition, a new warehouse with a control tower for communication gadgets across the lake will be set up at the Kisumu pier

to facilitate the rollout of services. He added that the terminal will be linked to feeder ports of Muhuru Bay, Homa Bay, Sena, Mbita, Asembo, Luanda K'otieno, Usenge and Sio Port within the Kenyan waters which are also being developed in

phases. In an exclusive interview with KNA, Eng. Amuti said the Kenya Maritime Authority (KMA) will set up a rescue centre at the terminal to

carry out bathymetric surveys.International and local navigation channels, he added, have been mapped with additional navigation aids already identified.

KPA, he said, has partnered with the county government and relevant national government agencies to sensitise and mark areas for fishing to avoid installation of nets and fish cages in vessels' routes.

Early warning system, he added, has been developed and is undergoing tests to issue alerts on manifestation of water hyacinth.

Eng. Amuti said once completed, KPA will operate the terminal alongside other government agencies with the private sector bringing in cruise ships and vessels.

This, he said, will facilitate group tours for tourists and international travel in the East Africa Region, taking a relatively short duration.

Before operations grounded at the port, there used to be seamless connectivity of rail and lake steamers.Passengers would disembark at the Railway Station and walk down to catch a steamship to Asembo Bay, Kendu Bay and Homa Bay.

New road safety center to be established at KCA University

Kenya College of Ac-countancy (KCA) University has partnered with the Technical University of Dortmund in Germany to establish a Center for Road Safety Awareness and Traf-fic Injury Surveillance. This initiative aims to reduce the persistent road accidents in the country. The center will focus on

researching and innovating solutions to address the primary causes of road accidents and ways to mitigate them.

The scientific data collected will be shared with relevant agencies to inform policy formulation, and support discovery and innovation in road transport within the country. KCA's Vice Chancellor, Prof.

Isaiah Wakindiki, stated that the German institution is assisting in the development phase of the center. He also noted that this center, the first of its kind in Kenya, is expected to be completed before the end of the year.

Speaking at the university's main campus in Ruaraka,

tiative has been driven by the rising number of road accidents in Kenya. He expressed concern over the number of university students who have been involved in such accidents. "On average, the university has been losing at least one student to a road accident each year, possibly because we are located near the Superhighway. We have already lost a student since the beginning of this year. This is a trend that must be stopped," he said. Prof. Wakindiki added that KCA University will col-laborate closely with road agencies, including the National Transport and Safety Authority (NTSA) and the Kenya National Highways Authority (KeNHA), to improve the collection and analysis of road accident data.


