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Water experts warn of depleted underground sources in cities



Kenya National Commission for UNESCO Secretary General Dr. James Njogu addresses water delegates in Naivasha on the need for more scientific research to inform policies on water resources man-

Tater experts have issued a warning regarding the increased abstraction of underground water in major Kenyan cities, driven by the pressure to meet the demands of an ever-growing metropolitan population.

In recent years, Nairobi, Mombasa, and Nakuru have witnessed a surge in the extraction of water from underground aquifers to fulfill domestic, industrial, and upcoming infrastructure needs, posing a threat if not addressed promptly.

According to Ms. Agnes Mbugua, the CEO of the Regional Centre for Groundwater, the increased and uncontrolled abstraction of water poses a risk of future building collapses due to the exposed vacuum left beneath the surface.

Ms. Mbugua singled out Nairobi for its high urbanization rates, which have led to the de-

tation of a rigorous Action Plan to address potential and actual deficiencies in its Anti-Money Laundering, Countering the Financing of Terrorism, and Proliferation of Weapons of Mass Destruction (AML/CFT/CPF) obligations in the country.

National Treasury and Economic Planning Cabinet Secretary Prof. Njuguna Ndung'u says the implementation of the Action Plan is being deployed as part of a process undertaken under the Financial Action Task Force (FATF) Framework by the Government.

Prof. Ndung'u underlined Kenya's commitment to

addressing the identified deficiencies comprehensively and swiftly, stating, "Kenya is fully committed to addressing the identified deficiencies and ensuring compliance with international standards."

Emphasizing the urgency of the situation, Prof. Ndung'u said, "The decision to place Kenya under enhanced monitoring underscores the imperative for swift and comprehensive action to bolster her compliance efforts."

He said this in a press statement in response to the FATF's decision to place Kenva under enhanced monitoring, also known as the 'Grey List,' during its meeting in Paris from 19th - 23rd February 2024. This decision follows a rigorous assessment conducted by the Eastern and Southern Africa Anti-Money Laundering Group (ESÅAMLG) in 2022, which revealed a mixed performance by Kenya in various areas of compliance.



The CS said, the Kenya Kwanza Government, upon assuming office after the assessment, immediately embarked on a number of interventions and initiatives to implement the recommended actions which involved both legal and regulatory reforms as well as institutional enhancements.

"One notable achievement was the enactment of the AML/CFT (Amendment) Act, 2023, involving a comprehensive overhaul of existing legislation to address legal and technical compliance gaps identified in the Mutual

Evaluation Report (MER). Regulatory agencies such as the Central Bank of Kenya and the Capital Markets Authority have also enhanced their AML/CFT risk-based supervision, conducting numerous inspections and issuing new guidelines to enforce compliance effectively", Prof Ndung'u noted.

"However, despite these efforts, Kenya acknowledges the need for accelerated action to address remaining gaps and swiftly exit the Grey List." said the CS.

He noted that the Government is seeking collaboration and technical assistance from international partners, including the European Union, United Kingdom, and United States, to facilitate diverse actions in enhancing the AML/CFT/CPF framework.

He further said that said that the National Treasury assures minimal effects on the country's financial stability and the costs of conducting business amidst these reforms.

pletion of major aquifers due to overabstraction, equally affecting water quality due to high fluoride levels.

The CEO also raised concerns about Nakuru City, where 90 percent of water sources are groundwater, resulting in high fluoride levels in water for domestic use. Meanwhile, in Mombasa, freshwater aquifers are being replaced with saline seawater.

Mbugua also called for more scientific research to inform policy decisions regarding future water abstraction needs, aiming to strike a balance between increased demand and the sustainable growth of infrastructure in towns and cities.

Speaking at a water stakeholders' workshop by UNESCO in Naivasha, Ms. Mbugua mentioned that the government has begun deploying artificial water recharge methods aimed at refilling open spaces left after underground water extraction.

In addition, she called

for more funding from both the government and development partners for water resources management to ensure adequate protection of water sources to drive sustainability for future needs.

Ms. Mbugua reiterated her Centre's commitment to undertake necessary scientific research, deploy the right technology and innovation as well as have a harmonised database to ensure policies and interventions are adopted to address the concerns raised

"Uncontrolled underground water extraction

in our cities threatens the core foundations of buildings risking future collapse," said Mbugua.

Sustainable water abstraction, she said, will be achieved through the adoption and implementation of UNE-SCO intergovernmental Hydrological Programs (IHP) strategy including creating public awareness at a time when climate change continues to threaten the sustainable management of water resources.

The Kenya National Commission for UNE-SCO Secretary General Dr. James Njogu said Kenya is a water-stressful country while calling for more research and data to ensure sustainable water use.

Dr. Njogu said more than 50 per cent of the country's population lacks access to quality water.

Consequently, he said, as a Commission they are currently involved in tree planting exercises to increase the necessary tree cover and drive the conservation of the country's water resources.

JKUAT-led consortium of research and industry players receive NRF grant for indigenous vegetables project

consortium of researchers and industry players in the African indigenous vegetables value chains, spearheaded by Jomo Kenyatta University of Agriculture and Technology (JKUAT), has won a competitive grant worth Sh15 million from the National Research Fund (NRF) to upscale African indigenous vegetables (AIVs) climate-smart technologies for food and nutrition security in Kenya.

The consortium brings together ten members drawn from JKUAT, IREN Growthpad Ltd, Local Development Research Institute (LDRI), and Masinde Muliro University of Science and Technology (MMUST).

According to NRF Chief Executive Officer, Prof. Dickson Andala, "despite NRF investing in funding research on food and nutrition security, there are still gaps regarding transforming research outputs into tangible goods and services, hence the need to upscale previously funded research projects to ensure that they achieve their intended impact.

" NRF says that the project, which will be implemented over a period of eighteen months, is the first of its kind in the country and provides previously funded NRF researchers and innovators

in Food and Nutrition Security and Sustainable Agriculture (FNSSA) with the tools needed to commercialize their research results and connect with potential customers and investors.

Prof. Mary Abukutsa is the Principal Investigator and Project Coordinator, assisted by Prof. Anselimo Makokha, Dr. Eucabeth Majiwa, Ms. Joyce Njenga, and Patrick Amunavi (all from JKUAT), and Dr. Anne Aswani of MMUST.

The private sector partners are IREN Growthpad Ltd, represented by Mr. James Shikwati and Ms. Esperance Chesoli; Mr. Muchiri Nyaggah and Ms. Judy Mumba (both from LDRI).

The Principal Investigator,

Prof. Mary Abukutsa, said, "Due to the prolonged and recurrent drought experienced by about half of the counties, the production of predominant staple foods has been inadequate to meet food requirements in the country. African indigenous vegetables have great potential to

address the problem since

they are better adapted to the environment and mature within a very short time." She identifies challenges that affect their production as poor-quality seeds, unavailability of improved agronomic, preservation, and preparation packages produced mainly at the subsistence level.

The UPSCALE-AIVs project aims to use smart technologies to upscale the commercial production of registered varieties of two AIVs, namely, the African nightshade (Managu) and Jute Mallow (Mrenda).

This, the consortium notes, "will contribute to the achievement of food and nutrition security in Kenya, alleviate malnutrition, and curb diseases that

are partly due to diets high in starch but low in vegetables and fruits, increase foreign exchange earnings as dried vegetables will be marketed to Kenyans in the diaspora."

The project's objective-based deliverables include popularity and acceptability of registered varieties of AIVs, increased productivity and availability of AIVs, increased availability of recipes and consumption of AIVs, increased trade in domestic and international markets, improved economic status of the women farmers, and increased awareness and change of attitude by the general public and policymakers.

While focusing on upscaling already developed technologies and commercialization of African indigenous vegetables, the UPSCALE-AIVs project will be implemented in Kakamega and Kiambu counties.

Director of IREN Growthpad, Mr. James Shikwati, said, "We are privileged for the partnership between IREN Growthpad Ltd and esteemed institutions JKUAT, MMUST, and LDRI, powered by the Kenya National Research Fund. IREN Growthpad Ltd is at the forefront of promoting consumer wellness, revolutionizing the way Kenyans experience AIVs." Mr. Shikwati added.

Verify qualifications to combat fraud, authority urges employers

The Kenya National Qualifications Authority (KNQA) has encouraged all employers to engage the Authority in determining the authenticity of qualifications held by both current and prospective em-

According to the Acting Director General of KNQA, Dr. Alice Kande, the move is aimed at ensuring that only qualified persons are in the right positions, thereby building confidence in the Kenyan qualifications' ecosystem. She said there has been a noticeable rise in the prevalence of counterfeit qualifications in the country encompassing both academic and professional certificates.

"The escalating numbers of graduates holding credentials yet facing unemployment have contributed to the proliferation of fraudulent activities," Dr. Kande said. In a press statement sent to newsrooms, the Acting Director General disclosed that during the validation and alignment of qualifications exercise conducted by the Authority, they confirmed that about 30 percent of academic papers were fraudulent, falsified, or interfered with.


She further noted that the issuance of fraudulently acquired certificates by education and training institutions is unfriendly to the Qualifications Authority, as it puts the lives of Kenyans and citizens of other jurisdictions at high risk.

Dr. Kande said, "The proliferation of fraudulent credentials poses a significant threat to the integrity of our higher education system, undermining its credibility," adding that the issue could only be addressed through concerted efforts at both institutional and national levels.

She announced that the Authority was actively working towards establishing and maintaining a national database of national qualifications in the country, that will allow for comparability and information sharing, in the education sector.

The Acting Director General said, the database is vital since the country lacks a central national database of qualifications, resulting in a fragmented qualifications sector.

"With the database in place, fraudulent and falsified qualifications will become a thing of the past since it will be a central



repository of all our qualifications, where one can check and query easily," she added.

KNQA is a corporate body, mandated to coordinate and harmonize the various levels of education and training, and to create a database of all qualifications conferred within the country.

State to invest in technology, early warning systems to mitigate disasters

BY PHILEMON MANDELA (MYGOV)

The Government has underscored the importance of investing in technology, personnel, and early warning systems to predict and mitigate disasters effectively.

The Principal Secretary for Interior and National Administration, Dr. Raymond Omollo, said disaster response efforts must extend beyond immediate relief to encompass longterm recovery and rehabilitation programs.

Dr. Omollo urged expedited efforts in pooling collective synergies to address shared risks and build resilient communities

Speaking in Nairobi, Dr. Omollo highlighted the urgent need for collective reflection and enhanced disaster response measures, particularly in Kenya.

"With the looming long rainy season starting in March, stakeholders convened to evaluate capacities and strategies in light of recent devastating floods induced by the El-Nino phenomenon," he said.

The PS emphasized that Eastern Africa is one of the most disaster-prone regions globally, citing recurrent severe droughts,

floods, landslides, epidemics, and pandemics.

"The aftermath of the El-Nino-induced floods

severely affected Kenya, with approximately 180 lives lost and 540,000 households displaced, a staggering 80 per cent being women and children," Dr Omollo said.

Amidst adversity, the PS commended the collaborative efforts of various ministries and disciplined forces in executing rescue and relief operations.

"This multi-agency approach facilitated the distribution of food relief and essential supplies to the worst-hit counties, including Tana River, Garissa, Wajir, and Mandera,"

Dr Omollo said.

The PS further revealed that the Ministry of Interior is lobbying for parliamentary support for the National Disaster Risk Management Strategy that seeks to create the National Disaster Risk Management Authority alongside County Disaster Risk Management Committees with the aim of enhancing institutional preparedness, coordination, intergovernmental engagement, and to foster accountability and ownership in disaster management.

Kisumu County subsidizes health insurance for informal sector

MAHANDARA(KNA)

The County Government of Kisumu has rolled out a subsidy programme to support individuals in the informal sector in obtaining health insurance coverage.

Dubbed the "Marwa" subsidy programme, the initiative will see the county government contribute a portion of the Sh500 National Health Insurance Fund (NHIF) premium, with the balance being contributed by the beneficiaries.

Kisumu Governor, Prof. Anyang Nyong'o, said the move targets to increase the number of people under health insurance coverage in the area. This, he said, is in response to the challenges faced by people working in the infor-

mal sector, which has led to defaults on the monthly Sh500 NHIF premium payments.

"We have developed

this initiative in direct response to the challenges these people have faced. Today, we launch the Marwa Insurance Subsidy

Program, allowing individuals in the informal sector who are unable to afford the Sh500 premium to contribute a portion, while the County Government of Kisumu covers

the remainder," he said. He mentioned that the informal sector has responded positively to the initiative, adding that during the piloting of the initiative, 194 traders at Kibuye market enrolled and are reaping the benefits. "The registered vendors also showed their commitment by paying half of the required premiums. This targeted approach acknowledges the unique healthcare needs of these groups, ensuring they receive specialized care and support," he said. All beneficiaries, he added, will seamlessly transition to the Social Health Insurance Fund once it is activated.

The development comes a year after the county government rolled out the Marwa program targeting individuals in the area.

So far, the initiative has supported a total of 47,973 vulnerable households by paying part of NHIF cover for them.

This support has trans-lated into 39,720 clinic

To make the subsidy program a success, Kisumu County Executive Committee Member (CECM)-In-Charge of Medical Services, Public Health and Sanitation, Dr. Gregory Ganda, said all players in the informal sector have been sensitized.

The Department, he added, was negotiating with the potential beneficiaries and the Department of Finance and Economic Planning to include a small fee on the daily levies paid to the county government, which will in turn be used to pay part of the cover.

"What we are saying is, if a vendor is paying Sh30 per day, they can pay Sh50 and the difference automatically goes to the health cover kitty," he explained.

Government pledges support for SACCOs in financial inclusion drive

The Cabinet Secretary for Co-operative and Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) Development, Simon Chelugui, has underlined the Government's commitment to ensuring SAC-COs play a significant role in the financial inclusion of the population.

Speaking during the closing ceremony of the 9th Annual SACCO Leaders Convention in Mombasa, Chelugui said cooperatives have long been the backbone of financial inclusion, providing services to the unbanked and fostering financial literacy and resilience.

"They also facilitate access to affordable housing and essential services, ensuring that no Kenyan is left behind in our journey towards progress. It is against this backdrop that the government has recognized cooperatives as key enablers of implementing the BETA Agenda," CS Chelugui said.

He noted that the government has instituted several legal amendments

to streamline the cooperative sector, including the SACCO Societies Act, which aims at increasing short-term liquidity through inter-borrowing and access to central payment systems.

The amendments will also enhance confidence among SACCO members by establishing a Deposit Guarantee Fund, the CS said. Another law that is a game-changer is the Cooperative Act, which will pave the way for the development of prudential reg-

ulations for startups and small SACCOs that are not under the purview of the SACCO Societies Regulatory Authority (SASRA).

CS Chelugui noted that SACCOs would be stratified into tiers based on size and shall be subjected to segregated prudential standards, enforced by county governments.

"The national government will support counties in this role by developing standards and building their capacities through training," he said. Other key reforms targeting the SACCO sub-sector include bringing all cooperatives undertaking withdrawable deposits under the SASRA regulatory framework.

"These measures are designed to ensure financial stability within the cooperative movement and the entire country. They will ensure that a shilling saved in a SACCO is as safe as one saved in a bank," CS Chelugui stated.

The CS further said the government would support the productive sector through co-operatives and that various interventions were underway across various value chains including dairy, cotton, coffee, the blue economy, mining, beef, and leather.

The efforts are being carried out in tandem with the establishment of an enabling policy and legal framework meant to foster growth and sustainability.

The CS hailed SACCO leaders for their commitment to driving sustainable development and fostering inclusive economic growth.

CDA scales up its progress programmes along the Coast

The Coast Development Authority (CDA) is scaling up its development programs to improve the socio-economic well-being of the people along the coast.

The regional authority is also aligning its socio-economic activities in the Coast region with the Bottom-Up Economic Transformation Agenda (BETA) plan, championed by the national government, to synchronize with the government's agenda on food security. CDA Managing Director, Dr. Mohamed Keinan, states that the Authority is investing in economic programs and boosting transformational agricultural, water, and maritime activities in the coastal counties of Kwale, Kilifi, Lamu, Taita Taveta. and Tana River. Dr. Keinan mentions that development projects in the coastal counties are being aligned with the government's fivepoint BETA plan, which is President William Ruto's focal point in ensuring his administration delivers its pledge to Kenyans.

The BETA Plan focuses on Agricultural Transformation and Inclusive Growth; Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs); Housing and Settlement, Healthcare, Digital Superhighway, and the Creative Industry.

He adds that CDA is also rehabilitating areas surrounding the Sh20-billion Mwache Multipurpose Dam project, which seeks to tackle persistent water shortages in Kwale, Mombasa, and Kilifi. Mwache Dam is an 87.5-meter-tall concrete gravity dyke, impounding 118 million cubic meters of water for supply and irrigation, and is expected to boost the water supply for Kwale and Mombasa Counties.

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Government to implement tougher measures against illicit alcoholic drinks

peputy President Rigathi Gachagua has said stringent measures will be rolled out to wipe out illicit brews and drugs destroying the lives of hundreds of Kenyans from next week.

The Deputy President said it would not be business as usual as destructive drinks kill people and maim others, promising tougher responses to effectively deal with the vice.

Speaking at Kapser-

ton SDA Church in Mosop Constituency, Nandi County, Mr Gachagua said the Ruto Administration is working on tougher interventions that will wholly be implemented collectively by respective Government agencies.

The Deputy President who also presided over a fundraiser at Kurgung Boys High School in the Constituency said;

"I held a meeting this week with top Government officials and senior security officers and we have agreed on these measures which will be rolled out from next week."

He said the measures will be far-reaching, adding that the government will end the menace of illicit alcoholic drinks soon.

"We are determined to make our country safe from these killer drinks. We will make sure the manufacturers of these drinks will leave this country for good. We cannot allow Kenyans to be sold poison in the guise of alcoholic drinks," asserted the DP.

On Monday next week, the Deputy President will hold an Alcohol and Drug Abuse Conference in Mombasa to intensify the war against the menace in the coastal region. The DP has already held similar meetings in Nyeri, Chuka and Nakuru.

With implementation of the Coffee Reforms in top gear, the DP, said farmers are already reaping big saying they will remain focused and determined in the streamlining of the subsector for more benefits to the farmers.

"Last week, for the first time in 10 years, 50kgs of coffee from one factory was bought at 600 US dollars. We will continue to straighten this sector for more earnings," assured the DP.

Head of Public Service Felix Koskei said the President and Deputy President have established a strong foundation for the implementation of government programmes."

"This is a steady, well-founded government. The programmes have taken off after a difficult first year because of unavailability of resources.

"We must double the achievements of last year, this year. We will work hard to deliver the promises to the people because this is a truthful government as you are truthful," said Mr Koskei.

Smallholder organic farmers call for government support to boost food security

Smallholder organic farmers have urged the government to support them by offering subsidized farm inputs to enable them to contribute to national food security.

The over 500 farmers drawn from fourteen counties, mostly semiarid, said organic farming has the potential to eradicate hunger in dry regions if well-supported with farm inputs and extension services.

Led by Ngugi Mutuura, the CEO of the Sustainability Agriculture Community Development

Program (SACDEP) that supports organic farming, the farmers decried a lack of government support despite helping to promote the cultivation of healthy foods.

They said while farmers who practice conventional farming have benefited from fertilizer and other farm input subsidies, they remain neglected.

"Organic farming is largely low-cost and can be practiced by all farmers; the government should invest big in this area to achieve food security, especially in semi-arid areas," Mutuura said.

They were speaking during an agricultural exhibition at the SACDEP training center in Kilimambogo, Thika East.

Triza Wal an organic farmer from Taita Taveta, said the county has overcome hunger largely due to farming traditional crops.

She said farming tubers and cereals can reduce overdependence on relief foods and called for support from the area county government.

"We largely depend on maize, millet, sorghum, cassava, sweet potatoes, and other tubers due to the semiarid nature of our county. We ask the county government to consider distributing organic fertilizer and subsidized seeds before the rainy seasons so that we can effectively fight hunger in the rural areas," Wakesho said.

Margret Wangechi said extension officers discourage organic farming and, on most occasions, those involved in the practice have been locked out of agriculture-related forums.

"To be able to actualize the agenda on agricultural production, the government should change its policy and boost organic farming because it's not only cheap but will bring on board more farmers. This is the case in other Countries," Wangechi

SACDEP commands over 150,000 farmers in 14 counties and has been training, and equipping farmers with skills to increase food production as well as linking them to markets due to the huge demand for organic foods.

Herman Schut, an inernational SACDEP partner said the global increase in the demand for organic foods presents an opportunity for poor farming households to increase food and agricultural production and productivity using cheaper organic inputs originating from within the farms.

The First Lady of the Republic of Kenya, Mama Rachel Ruto, is set to launch a strategy towards growing 500 million trees by 2032 as part of her commitment to support the National Tree Growing Restoration.

The tree-growing strategy launched by President William Ruto has an ambitious goal of planting and growing at least 15 billion trees by 2032, increasing the nation's tree and forest cover to 30 per cent.

The escalating effects of climate change on our country highlight the urgency of our conservation efforts

"Over the past year, we have witnessed unprecedented extremes, from severe droughts to devastating floods, erratic rainfall patterns, and outbreaks of diseases and pest infestations," said Mama Rachel

It is evident that vulnerable groups, particularly women and children, bear

the brunt of these environmental crises, emphasising the imperative for concerted action in environmental restoration.

efforts of the local community, environmentalists, and activists, spearheaded by the indomitable Professor Wangari Maathai, turned the tide in favour of conservation.

Professor Maathai, a Nobel Peace Prize laureate, poured her heart and soul into the fight for Karura Forest, paying the ultimate price for conservation with unwavering determination and resil-

Her legacy continues to remind Kenyans of the power of collective action to safeguard our precious natural heritage.

The commitment by Mama Rachel Ruto to plant 500 million trees over the next decade employs a comprehensive strategy that engages women, youth, and learners in forest and landscape restoration.

The implementation of the tree-growing strategy commenced with a pilot program, resulting in the successful growth of over 2 million trees in forests and learning institutions.

Furthermore, the first lady adopted 200 hectares of Kakamega forest for restoration, laying the groundwork for similar initiatives nationwide in collaboration with the spouses of county governors and the Kenya Forest Service.

To engage students and youth in conservation, the learners are provided with

a practical learning environment that trains them to later apply the knowledge in their families and communities.

Through the office of the First Lady, every primary school and secondary school is poised to benefit from a fruit orchard dubbed MaMa Fruit Garden, supplementing the learners nutritional needs and providing a source of income on excess production.

The Office of the First Lady has further organised a national competition dubbed the "First Lady Mazingira Award" (FLAMA) that gives learners an opportunity to contribute their ideas to ongoing environmental conservation through creative expression.

Details of the competition are available at www. flama.or.ke, and the winners will be announced during World Environmental Day on June 5,

The strategy will see the Office of the First Lady

collaborate with government organs, development partners, and individuals, leveraging resources and expertise to create a sustainable tree-growing culture that will contribute to the social and economic development of the nation.

This tree-growing activity extends beyond ecological restoration; it is about fostering a harmonious relationship between people and nature and contributing to the overall wellbeing of our nations.

"With the vision of President William Ruto, we will improve biodiversity, safeguard precious water resources, improve the quality of air, and reduce exposure to the extreme effects of climate change," she said.

Mama Rachel Ruto urged Kenyans to contribute to Kenya's tree-growing exercise by taking advantage of the rainy season to plant at least 30 trees annually over the next decade.

KWS spearheads community conservation efforts in Nakuru

The Kenya Wildlife Service (KWS) has launched an ambitious initiative to raise awareness about the community's role in conserving lakes and rivers in Nakuru County, as more than 70 percent of the ecosystems lie outside protected areas.

KWS has indicated that educating communities residing in water catchment areas, near the lakes' shores, and along the rivers' courses about the value of natural resources would motivate them to take action and encourage national and county governments to enforce environmental laws and contribute to conservation efforts.

Nakuru KWS County Warden Cheruiyot Chepkwonv said the move was motivated by various scientific findings that have identified Lakes Nakuru, Naivasha, and Elementaita as the country's leading wetlands currently facing major challenges. According to Chepkwony, the three lakes, which have been declared United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) World Heritage sites, are reeling under massive pollution, human encroachment, abstraction, and climate change.

Other natural resources exposed to similar existential threats, according to the County Warden, include Rivers Njoro, Makalia,

and Enderit, which drain into Lake Nakuru; Rivers Malewa and Gilgil and the seasonal Karati River, which flow into Lake Naivasha; and Rivers Mereroni, Mbaruk, and Kariandusi, which stream into Lake Elementaita. KWS has also identified population pressure coupled with a change of land use as perils afflicting nearly all the wetlands in the devolved unit.

Lake Naivasha is burdened with pollution and water abstraction from nearby farms, while effluents from the Njoro River, industrial runoff, and plastic waste are finding their way into Lake Nakuru. "Our human life is dependent on nature, and we have embarked on teaching the community, industrialists, hoteliers and learners from primary school level that abusing it is digging a grave for ourselves," Mr Chepkwony said.

The County Warden added that the campaign, while incorporating clean up exercises of the natural ecosystems around the water bodies' basins and catchment areas, is also creating awareness among indigenous communities to at least know the economic value of nature as a motivation to consciously use natural resources sustainably.

The initiative that is being carried through public barazas and lectures in educational institutions incorporates pollution prevention and sustainable consumption behaviour guidance, aimed at shaping community perceptions of the dangers of environmental degradation and available solutions. "For instance, we are training the community members to do their part by reducing use of single-use plastics, recycling, and supporting businesses that prioritize

environmental sustainability," the warden explained.

In implementing the drive, KWS has brought on board several stakeholders including the County Government of Nakuru, research agencies, entrepreneurs and workers in the hospitality and tourism industry, learning institutions, environmental conservation lobby groups and environmental scientists among others.

The initiative will also rope in industrial concerns, retailers, and manufacturers who Mr Chepkwony stated, also have a crucial role to play in this effort, adding that business operations should be cognizant of the fact that their operations contribute to this problem and take steps to reduce pollution of the Lakes' ecosystems.

He said they were working with the County Government and authorized waste management agencies to address poorly handled domestic waste and oil residues from carwash facilities.

At public barazas, the initiative aims at promoting proper agronomical practices among both small holder and large-scale farmers by promoting minimal use of fertilizers and pesticides in agriculture and landscaping to prevent nutrient and chemical runoff into the lakes and replace chemical fertilizers and pesticides with sustainable methods like organic farming.

Nakuru partners with ILO, private firms to enhance TVET education

The Nakuru County Government is upgrading all Youth Polytechnics and Technical Vocational Education Training Institutes (TVETs) in an effort to empower learners with industry-responsive skills to help bridge the skills gap among TVET graduates.

Governor Susan Kihika said the county is partnering with the International Labour Organization (ILO) and several private companies to ensure that students acquire hands-on skills by spending at least 50 percent of their training time working in relevant industries.

Ms. Kihika said government her is prepared to pay Sh30,000 as part of the one-year school fees for all students enrolled in public polytechnics within the devolved unit. The decision to pay part of the school fees, the governor explained, was inspired by the willingness, support, and goodwill of parents, adding that the action would boost enrollment.

In a speech delivered on her behalf by County Secretary and Head of Public Service Dr. Samuel Mwaura during the launch of a football tournament at Morendat in Gilgil Sub-County, Ms. Kihika disclosed that her administration is pushing for exchange programs between village and national polytechnics to spur industrialization.

The Governor expressed happiness that TVETs and polytechnics had the capacity to cure the skills gap between graduates and the job market in the country, saying that the skills gap had rendered many college leavers jobless due to lack of hands-on job experience.

"Most graduates are unable to deliver on their jobs, forcing companies, especially in the private sector, to introduce in-house training before absorbing them," Ms Kihika said.

Research shows that there are between 500,000 to 800,000 fresh graduates entering the job market each year, the Governor added.

Kisumu Polytechnic's Sh1.2b textiles technology factory nears completion

A Sh1.2-billion textiles technology factory, which has been under construction at the Kisumu National Polytechnic, is poised to be commissioned to develop skills and competencies to drive the sector.

The facility, funded by the World Bank (WB) through the East Africa Skills for Transformation and Regional Integration Project (EASTRIP), targets the development of the regional textile industry through the provision of high-quality training, problem-solving, research, innovation, and technology transfer.

Kisumu National Polytechnic Chief Principal, Ms. Catherine Kelonye, said construction work is at 85 percent completion, adding that the contractor is expected to finalize and hand over the site by the end of this financial year.

She mentioned that part

of the modern equipment, sourced from China and India, has already been received at the institution and will be installed ahead of the facility's commissioning in July.

Additionally, Ms. Kelonye stated that Kisumu National Polytechnic has developed the relevant curriculum, with the institution set to roll out eight textile technology programs in May this year.

The State Department for Technical and Voca-

tional Education Training (TVET), she said, has already posted trainers for the programmes, which she added, were set to revolutionize the textiles industry in the country.

This development, she said, makes Kisumu National Polytechnic the only institution in the country with a learning industry, adding that learners will have hands-on training to prepare them for the job market.

"We are going to have

a dual model, where the training will take place in class and at the industry on a 50-50 basis. Kisumu National Polytechnic is the only institution in the country with this model.

We are also the only institution that is doing the curriculum and occupational standards under textile technology," he said.

To scale up the training, Kisumu National Polytechnic, she said, has partnered with several

institutions to roll out the programmes.

"All the other institutions will offer the course as per the programmes of Kisumu National Polytechnic. The certification will also be done by us," she said.

The institution, she added, has also partnered with Rivatex, Spin-Knit, Thika Mills and the Kenya National Chamber of Commerce and Industry to create linkages with the industry.

The Kenya Government signed a grant Agreement with the Millennium Challenge Corporation (MCC) with the objective of providing funding to provide support for a better multimodal transport system, clarify land planning policies and provide blended financing for implementation of the **Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) system** to promote lower greenhouse emissions among other related activities. The Kenya Government and MCC agreed that the best vehicle to achieve goals and objectives of the Grant Agreement is establishment of a Fund.

Accordingly, an Inter-Ministerial Committee comprised of Government technical experts from The National Treasury and Economic Planning, the Office of the Attorney General & Department of Justice, State Department of Lands, State Department of Roads and Transport, State Department of Environment, NMS and Nairobi City County Government has now finalized preparing the draft Public Finance Management (Kenya Millennium Development Fund) Regulations, 2024.

Section 4(a) of the Statutory Instruments Act, 2013 provides that "the object of this Act is to provide a comprehensive regime for the making, scrutiny, publication and operation of Statutory Instruments by requiring regulation-making authorities to undertake consultation before making Statutory Instruments". The Cabinet Secretary **I** for Youth Affairs, Cre− ative Economy and Sports Ababu Namwamba has launched the Kenya National Innovation Agency (KeNIA) 2023-2027 Strategic Plan which will be geared towards meeting KeNIA's mission statement of developing and managing a dynamic national innovation system which catalyses jobs and wealth creation in the country.

Namwamba said KeNIA has within the last three years of its operational existence already rolled out various programmes such as the Research to Commercialisation Accelerator, offered Institutional Support to Universities in commercialising their research outputs, developed a digital marketplace for innovators and investors, Kenya Innovation Week, Presidential Innovation Award and the Kenya Network of Entrepreneurial Institutions Leaders, among others.

"I am happy to launch this important institutional document that has outlined key pillars, including Commercialization Systems, Promotion and Awareness, Start-up ecosystem, Policy, Legal, and Regulatory, Institutional Capacity Framework," noted the CS.

The new strategic plan, Namwamba said, outlines an ambitious plan out recommendations to strengthen the National Innovation Ecosystem

These recommendations, Namwamba said include enabling KeNIA to create an inventory, and document innovations and start-ups at the county and national levels and increase awareness of the services offered by innovation hubs to the pub-

KeNIA, the CS added will strengthen the capacity of innovators through training, provide learning and growth linkages, support the commercialization of innovations, and facilitate access to funds for youth and other vulnerable groups.

KeNIA, he added, will spearhead the development of a framework to enhance collaboration among all entities engaged in innovation activities to improve service delivery to the Kenvan innovation ecosystem.

KeNIA will map out the funding landscape for innovation in Kenya: Not all sectors attract funding. It is evident that sectors such as Artificial Intelligence, Agriculture, Fintech, Energy, and E- commerce are the top four best funded sectors in Kenya, while sectors like health, housing, water, and sanitation aGract less funding", Namwamba said.

The CS said that the Government through Ke-

for the agency that has set NIA will develop an information portal on funding opportunities which are potential sources of funding and have not been adequately exploited by the Kenyan innovators such as the Youth Enterprise Development Fund.

KeNIA, the CS said, should support innovators in protecting their innovation through intellectual property rights and should formulate recommendations to foster an innovation on culture in Kenya, particularly on how the Government can provide tax reliefs to investors in innovation akin to reliefs available to the sports in-

Namwamba said KeNIA will spearhead the development of a framework to enhance collaboration among all entities engaged in innovation activities to improve service delivery to the Kenyan innovation ecosystem.

KeNIA, he added, will invest more in enhancing the appropriate skills for innovation on development, commercializing innovations, and managing innovation on hubs because investing in skills and talent will contribute to boosting Kenya's innovation performance in future ranking.

Speaking during the launch, the CS declared that the Ministry of Youth Affairs, Creative Economy has set up youth centres across all the constituencies and directed Ke-NIA to upgrade them into innovation hubs where innovation support programmes will be implemented.

The CS also challenged KeNIA to leverage the 10year Innovation Master Plan, launched by President William Ruto in 2023 to develop a coherent Innovation Policy and Strategy to drive the ecosystem forward.

"This strategic plan has aligned itself with the fourth Medium-Term Plan (MTP IV) of Kenya's vision 2030 that is aimed at creating jobs and enabling citizens to meet their basic needs, The Kenya Kwanza Bottom-up economic model, sustainable development goals (SDGs), among other national economic approaches in setting the momentum for economic transition to

the next long term development agenda for the country," the CS said.



Registrar of Political Parties seeking for more funding to expand its presence nationally

BY EMMANUEL MASHA AND WINNIE CHARO(KNA)

The Office of the Registrar of Political Parties is seeking additional funding to expand its presence to cover all 47 counties in order to effectively carry out its responsibilities. Currently, the Registrar, Ms. Ann Nderitu, has stated that financial constraints have hindered the opening of offices in 35 counties and the expansion of staff.

While 12 offices have been established in various counties, Ms. Nderitu emphasized the necessity of having a presence in all counties to fulfill their mandate comprehensively.

Despite receiving funds from the National Treasury, the current allocation is insufficient to meet the demands of grassroots activities effectively.

During the launch of the

Malindi Regional Office, serving Kilifi, Lamu, and Tana River Counties, Ms. Nderitu urged Parliament to allocate more funds to facilitate the opening of additional offices across the country.

Furthermore, Ms. Nderitu stressed the importance of the Registrar's role as a regulatory body and called on politicians to refrain from involving the office in

political disputes. She emphasized that their primary focus should be on regulatory functions rather than political matters, as resolving political conflicts diverts resources and attention from their core responsibilities.

In summary, the Registrar of Political Parties is advocating for increased funding to extend its reach to all 47 counties, urging politicians to al-

low the office to function independently as a regulatory body without political interference.

At the same time, Dr. Nderitu urged political parties to deal with errant or unfaithful members through their internal dispute-resolution mechanisms before seeking the intervention of the ORPP.

"Our mandate is to ensure that the law is followed by political parties and their members, each of whom has a responsibility in law. If a member has shown signs of infidelity to their party which

sponsored them to Parliament, the law We had

challenges previously, we used to access services from the Mombasa office explains what should be done and at what point the Registrar comes in," she said.

She said Kenya has 90 registered political parties with party membership estimated at about 24 million Kenyans.

Nderitu stressed the need for all adult Kenyans to join political parties saying the parties cannot be ignored as they are the ones that place leaders in political positions.

Kilifi County Assembly Speaker, Teddy Mwambire, called on the National Assembly, through the Finance Committee to allocate funds to enable the office to open offices and recruit staff to provide services efficiently all over the country.

Mwambire added that the County Assembly will collaborate with the ORPP to create awareness among the citizens on the importance of joining and being members of political parties.

"We had challenges previously, we used to access services from the Mombasa office, but we are privileged to have one here in Malindi. The office will create awareness among the citizens on the importance of joining and being in a political party," Mwambire said.

Similar sentiments were made by Umoja Summit Party Secretary General Naomi Cidi Kumbatha, who said the establishment of the office in Kilifi County would help residents to know their rights to make informed decisions regarding political party membership.

Kilifi Deputy Governor Flora Chibule stated that as county government, they are committed to supporting the work of the Registrar of Political Parties by ensuring they have the necessary tools and resources to fulfill their mandate effectively.

Leaders, parents rally for education in refugee camps

The Ministry of Education has launched an advocacy campaign in Kenyan refugee camps to raise awareness among residents about the benefits of quality education offered at various learning institutions.

The advocacy efforts, aimed at Elimu Scholars, have engaged community leaders and parents in Daadab and Kakuma refugee camps, as well as the Kalobeyei resettlement scheme. They have agreed to discuss with their disheartened students the importance of staying in school despite the daily challenges they face.

The Ministry of Education, along with other stakeholders, has reached a consensus on contentious issues affecting some beneficiaries, including the separation of certain refugees receiving Elimu Scholarships from their families.

Led by Dr. Hellen Boruet, the Ministry of Education team has encouraged camp community leaders to inspire parents to motivate their children, emphasizing that everything necessary has been provided by the Ministry through its implementing partners, the Jomo Kenyatta Foundation (JKF), and the Equity Group Foundation (EGF).

"Every child on Kenyan soil should be enrolled in compulsory education, as the government cares about its visitors," stated Dr. Hellen.

Speaking at Kakuma refugee camp in Turkana County, Dr. Boruet affirmed teenage pregnancies were prevalent amongst girls in refugee camps and that they could be averted if the girls were enrolled and retained in schools, calling on the community leaders not to discriminate girls in education.

Dr. Boruet said 'educating a girl is educating a community' calling for them to be considered in the programme, adding that teenage marriage denies girls the opportunity to know their rights among other probing skills ing basic hygiene, feeding children and family ensuring a healthy community. She observed that girls have the opportunity in the modern world, unlike their older counterparts who were victims of retrogressive cultures that denied them opportunities, calling on parents to educate all children.

The officer said the government is keen on resolving the Edu-Afya stalemate to ensure medical expenses for all students resume.

The stakeholders recommended that school management should come up with modalities of meeting medical costs where parents and guardians are unable to pay including having the medical bills pegged as pending bills which can be settled when the transition to Social Health Insurance Fund is complete.

Kakuma refugee camp community leader Jamal Abdikadir (not his real name) challenged fellow camp leaders to help the government in its effort to manage the future of their children including instilling discipline and counseling on drugs and substance abuse in the camps without leaving everything to the government and its partners.

On food rations for the refugees provided by the World Food Programme (WFP), the learners were assured their biometric data would not be deactivated instead they are on record as being in schools and will access their share of food during school holidays.

President's directive spurs training efforts in war against substance abuse

Government, through the National Authority for the Campaign Against Drug Abuse (NACADA), in collaboration with the County of Uasin Gishu, has conducted a training exercise for County Enforcement Officers, along with members of the National Police Service (NPS), on fundamental strategies to crack down on illicit alcohol, drug trafficking, and abuse.

The exercise is a follow-up initiative to ensure the effective implementation of the key strategies underscored in the County Action Plan on Alcohol and Drug Abuse, unveiled on 13th February during a stakeholders' engagement forum at Eldoret National Polytechnic.

This follows the President's directive through the Joint Communique for Rift Valley on 29th May 2023, where Alcohol and Drug Abuse (ADA) was identified as a major challenge to the socio-economic development of the country.

There was heightened public concern across the

The training of the officers comes barely a week after a similar sensitization of the National Government Administrative Officers (NGAOs) took place.

She acknowledged the immense support from partners including REIN-VENT Kenya, Kenya Bureau of Standards (KEBS), Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA), Anti-Counterfeit Authority (ACA) and NEMA.

Nakuru County proposes bill to safeguard food safety

The Nakuru County Government is working on a bill aimed at protecting humans and livestock from consuming foodstuffs and animal feeds contaminated with toxic substances, antibiotic residues, and disease vectors.

The County Public Health Chief Officer, Ms. Alice Abuku, stated that the devolved unit is crafting a new food safety policy that includes stringent regulations to ensure that foodstuffs failing to meet safety standards do not reach the market.

Ms. Abuku explained that the primary objective of the 'Nakuru County Food Safety Policy' and 'The Nakuru County Food and Feed Safety Quality Control Coordination Bill 2022' is to safeguard consumers of food products from foodborne illnesses or injuries related to food consumption.

During a workshop held at the County headquarters, where various stakeholders convened to discuss the policy and the Bill, Ms. Abuku mentioned that chemical and organic contaminants in foodstuffs could be partly responsible for the increase in cancer cases.

According to the World Health Organization (WHO), foodborne diseases are responsible for a comparable burden of illness such as cancer and tuberculosis in Africa, with young children bearing

the brunt of it. WHO further indicates that the resulting health cost implications and threats to productivity are incapacitating.

If passed, the Bill will ensure that there is thorough scrutiny of milk, meat, vegetables, and fruits' suppliers to ascertain the safety of their produce. Manufacturers of animal feeds will also be closely monitored to ensure that they complied with feed safety standards in their processes.

The Public Health Officer said the Bill is necessary to ensure that food is safely produced, distributed, processed, marketed, and prepared for human consumption from the farm.

It also provides for the coordination of competent authorities, multi-annual control plans, verification of mechanisms utilized by competent authorities to enforce food and feed safety requirements, and audits of food safety or feed safety mechanisms.

The two-day event organized by Micro -Enterprises Support Programme Trust (ME-SPT) in collaboration with the county

government participants from the Departments of Agriculture, Livestock and Fisheries, Public Health, Trade, Kenya Agricultural Livestock Research Organization (KALRO), Kenya Plant Health Inspectorate Service (Kephis), Kenya National Federation of Farmers (KENAFF), Kenya National Chamber of Commerce and Industry (KNCCI) the County Assembly of Nakuru among others.

Noting that food safety is inherently a public good, Ms. Abuki observed that the county and national government alone would not address the issue as it is a shared responsibility of all stakeholders - farmers, food handlers and distributors, food manufacturers, food service operators, consumers, regulators, scientists, educators, and the media.

Ms. Abuki indicated that well informed and empowered consumers not only protect their own interests, but also benefit the wider market by enforcing market discipline which encourages producers to compete based on quality of goods.

Chief Officer for Agriculture Mr. Newton Mwaura said the Nakuru County Government has been empowering and encouraging farmers to apply good agricultural practices because investment in food safety practices enable them to tap more remunerative markets.

Owalo: digital agenda

The benefits of digitalisation are being seen and felt across all sectors and the government is keen on the country having a fully-fledged digital economy

■ he government is optimistic that the push to use digital technology to create jobs, enhance delivery of services and collect revenue will enable the country fast-track economic growth.

Mr Eliud Owalo, the Cabinet Secretary for Information, Communications and the Digital Economy, said that the benefits of digitalisation are already being seen and felt across all sectors and the government is building upon them to enable the country have a fully-fledged digital economy.

"Our aggressive push towards digitalisation has not only transformed the service delivery

landscape, but also led to a substantial surge in revenue collection from Sh60 million daily to an impressive Sh1 billion over the past year," said Mr Owalo, who was speaking at a Digital Summit on Artificial Intelligence (AI) in Naivasha.

Some 12,692 government services have been on-boarded fully to the E-Citizen platform, while work to ensure the remaining ones are on the platform is ongoing.

The digitilisation of services has bolstered efficiency and transparency in service delivery, with the government working to bridge to digital divide through expansion of the fibre

cable network and provision of free public Wi-Fi to ensure every citizen has access to the internet.

In the last one year, the Government has set up 1,261 free public Wi-Fi hotspots, facilitating communication and business. Further, it has installed 8,419km of fibre cable in partnership with private sector players, as part of the 100,000km five-year target and set up 247

digital hubs across the country.

And as part of efforts to enhance Universal Health Coverage, some 46 hospitals have been connected to the national fibre optic cable and the Hospital Health Management Information System (Afya KE) that is expected to deepen access to health services is being piloted in selected facilities.

"The government is committed to bridging the digital divide through the automation of services, creating digital jobs and the laying of 100,000 kilometres of fibre cable," stated the CS.

To enhance the enhancement the deployment of digital technology at the grassroots, Parliament passed an amendment to the National Government Constituency Development Fund (NGCDF) Act allowing 3 per cent of allocations to be used in construction and paying for utilities, costs and maintenance of constituency digital hubs.

"The government is committed to bridging the digital divide through the automation of services, creating digital jobs and the laying of 100,000 kilometres of fibre cable," — CS Owalo and access to digital services, particularly in underserved regions, said the CS, noting that ICT is one of the five pillars of the government Bottom-up Economic Transformation Agenda (BETA).

He added that the government is enhancing digital skills of the youth and linking them to jobs through Ajira and Jitume programmes, which provide training and enable the youth to work and earn a living online.

"So far, we have managed to setup and operationalise 116 Jitume digital centres across the country to support the government's initiative of creating employment opportunities for over 1,000,000 youth in three to five years' time," noted Mr Owalo.

The Jitume programme is being implemented in partnership with Technical and Vocational Education and Training Institutes (TVETs), which are being equipped with 23,000 digital devices.

The 116 sites have been connected and supplied with 11,400 Virtual Desktop Devices. Over 390,968 youths have been trained under both Jitume and Ajira programmes and 119,462 jobs created.

Eng John Tanui, the PS for ICT and Digital Economy, noted that the ongoing digital transformation provides a fundamental change in the way the government serves citizens, promotes efficiency and transparency and enhances cost-effective service delivery.

"The government is enhancing connectivity, linking institutions, enterprises, homes and markets to create equal development enabling everyone to tap into digital opportunities," said the PS.

According to Mr Owalo, the government is keen on using artificial intelligence to enhance service delivery across various sectors.

"The ministry recognises the transformative potential of AI in improving service delivery and revolutionise existing systems by enhancing efficiency, accuracy, and accessibility," said the CS.

He said there are three key pillars guiding Kenya's efforts in fostering synergies in digital transformation and the use of AI.

The first is inclusive digitisation, which aims to ensure that the benefits of digital transformation reach every segment of society, including the marginalised communities.

The second is collaborative Innovation, which emphasises the promotion of public-private partnerships, academia-industry collaborations and cross-sector engagements to drive innovation.

Lastly, there is the ethical use of AI and data governance, which underscores the importance of transparency, fairness, and accountability in AI development and deployment

"The government is actively engaging in an open, interdisciplinary conversation to assess risks stemming from frontier AI, delineate the roles of different actors in responding to these risks, and explore the considerable opportunities that AI presents and international collaboration is crucial for managing these risks and fostering opportunities arising from frontier AI," noted the CS.

Phase 2B of SGR to kick-off

THE GOVERNMENT has signed a contract for the construction of the next section of the Standard Gauge Railway (SGR) project, Phase 2B from Naivasha to Malaba in Uganda. According to the National Treasury,

feasibility studies are now underway for Phase 3. Together phases 2B and 3 are estimated to cost \$US 13bn (Sh1.9 trillion). The SGR was originally intended to run from Mombasa to Kisumu, but insufficient funding meant that work on the project came to a halt after the completion of Phase 2A from Nairobi to Naivasha. An update on the SGR

project was included in a prospectus for international investors prepared by the National Treasury ahead of Kenya's recent return to the Eurobond market.

Kenya and Ethiopia partner for LAPSSET transport corridor

THE KENYA-ETHIOPIA joint technical committee on the operationalisation and full utilisation of the Port of Lamu, which was established by Kenya's Transport CS, Kipchumba Murkomen and his Ethiopian counterpart Dr Alemu Sime, has been tasked to identify opportunities and the challenges that have impeded the full use of the LAPSSET transport corridor. Kenya gets 'breathing space' after repaying \$2bn Eurobond debt

The successful issuance of a buyback bond has boosted investor confidence in the country, says President William Ruto

he government's successful settlement of part of the 2 billion U.S. dollars Eurobond debt eliminated the fear of default, lifting the country's profile in the international markets

The debt falls due in June 2024, and there were fears that the country would default on repayment especially after it missed a promise made by President William Ruto that it would be repaid in December 2023.

President William Ruto said that the government used the 1.5 billion dollars it had raised on February 12 in a buyback issue to

The buyback offer received strong demand,

according to Treasury, with investors making orders exceeding \$6.2 billion. The Eurobond issuance was priced at 9.75 percent and would be due in 2031.

The buyback plan strengthened the maturity profile of the 2024 Eurobonds and helped the country proactively manage its debt liabilities.

"The successful execution of both the buyback and the new bond demonstrates strong investor confidence in Kenya through

INFOBOX

Eurobond Buyback

Kenya received an overwhelming \$6.2 billion (Sh985 billion) in its Eurobond buyback issue but the government only accepted \$1.5 billion (Sh238 billion). The government issued the Eurobond worth \$1.5 billion to buy back the inaugural one that was taken in 2014. President Ruto said his government is going to be prudent in any borrowing that it engages in as the overall strategy is to reduce the debt stock, enhance our local revenue-raising measures and reduce expenditure.



the international capital markets and a vote of confidence in the government's overall debt management strategy," President Ruto said.

Kenya had been rated negatively by global credit agencies, what had for long hurt the country's chances to attract cheaper loans from international markets.

In July 2023, Standard&Poor cut Kenya's ratings outlook from stable to negative while Moody's assigned Kenya a B3 with a negative outlook.

Similarly, Fitch had in February 2023 rated Kenya at B with a negative outlook.

The country's credit ratings had remained stable in 2021 and 2022 before the downgrade.

But with the successful debt management strategy through the repayment of the Eurobond, the country's rating has improved. President Ruto said the debt strategy,

coupled with the general economic management policies and the tightening of the monetary policy, investor confidence in the country has grown.

This has, therefore, resulted in the appreciation of the shilling against the dollar from 162 to 142.

The President attributed the recent steep decline of the shilling to "adverse developments in the international monetary system and disruptions in the global supply chains".

The strengthening of the shilling against the dollar, according to the President, has reduced Kenya's overall debt by Sh722 billion (4.95 billion dollars) and also cut the debt service costs by 1.33 billion shillings over the next six years, saving the country a total cost of 6.29 billion dollars.

Central Bank of Kenya data indicates that the East African nation's total debt stood at 76.1 billion dollars at the end of 2023, with external debt comprising 41.7 billion dollars of the amount. \blacksquare

In breeding dogs, you work with what is known as "working line". These are dogs with stronger qualities such as powerful muscles and are purposely selected for breeding. This means the breeder should know their animals well.

Some people say it's hard knowing when a female dog (bitch) is on heat...

It can be if one does not know how It can be If one does not know how to detect the heat signs. The obvious sign is bleeding from the vulva and others licking the back end more than usual or being over friendly to other dogs. I mate the dogs once I detect blood. Three to six mating sessions are enough to make the sessions are enough to make the female pregnant.

How does a quality working line look like?

In the case of German shepherds, a good quality working line will have medium-sized animals, with good quality fur, temperament and body structure. These are the ones I use for breeding purposes. To avoid inbreeding, I change males every two years.

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

¬he National Government's radical move to digitize and onboard thousands of its services has enhanced efficiency and boosted its revenue collections from a daily collection of Sh. 60 million to Sh1 billion in the last vear.

He mentioned that in July last year, 5,084 government services had been fully digitized.

Owalo highlighted that the Government is on course to establish 25,000 Wi-Fi hotspots across the country, as well as 1,450 digital hubs spread across all constituencies.

Additionally, he mentioned that the National Government Constituency Development Fund (NG-CDF) will allocate three percent of its funds towards infrastructural upgrades for

this digital hubs initiative in the constituencies.

He delivered a keynote address during the fourth edition of the Nation Digital Summit on Artificial Intelligence (AI) in Naivasha.

The summit, whose theme this year is "Synergies in Digital Transformation and Artificial Intelligence (AI)," brings together various players and experts in Information Technology (IT) from both the private and public sec-

Mr. Owalo emphasized

that Kenya is striving to be recognized as an influential participant at the Artificial Intelligence (AI) table, driven by the Bottom-up Economic Transformation Agenda (BETA) 2022-2027.

explained that through the BETA agenda, there is an ongoing sectorial reform process, with a team of diverse Kenyan professionals tasked with evaluating the operational framework of every structure under the Ministry of Information, Communications, and the Digital Economy (MoICDE).

Stressing the necessity of regulatory systems to govern AI technology, the CS also underscored the importance of collaborative efforts on a global scale.

He noted that meaningful collaboration among world leaders is essential to effectively address the risks associated with frontier AI and capitalize on its significant opportunities across various domains.

In addition, Owalo said his ministry had a plan to place the country on a path of global competitiveness.
