**BY GEORGE KAIGA(KNA)** he Office of the Data Protection Commissioner (ODPC) will soon roll out its services in counties in order to take services closer to the people as it seeks to enhance greater awareness of the provisions of the Data Pro-

tection Act, 2019. According to the Deputy Data Director, Oscar Otieno, ODPC will devolve its services to Mombasa, Nakuru and Kisumu cities by end of this June with Eldoret, Garrissa and Nyeri- roll out our services to all the counties," he added. Huduma Centres expected to host their services in the first half of the financial vear.

"Under our three- year strategic plan, we intend to

# Technical officers to be trained ahead of inclusion of procurement in IFMIS

According to Mr. Leonard Ngaluma, the Director for Administration in the Office of the Deputy President, the training is part of state efforts to digitize all services delivery for all

**BY IRENE AGUM (PCO)** The Government will

train technical officers with the aim of integrating the procurement and asset management functions within the Integrated Financial Management Information System (IFMIS) to enhance efficiency.

According to Mr. Leonard Ngaluma, the Director for and enhance service Administration in the Office of the Deputy President, the

training is part of government efforts to digitize all services and enhance service delivery for all.

Naluma was speaking during the launch of the IFMIS Inventory Module Training for ICT, accounts, finance, audit and supply chain officers from the Executive Office of the President in Athi River.

"The business process re-engineering to be implemented countrywide, will

see the procurement module incorporated within IFMIS, thereby fastening the procurement process and effectively addressing and eliminating the headache associated with the recurrent pending bills for government in every financial year," he said.

Ngaluma pointed out that the improved system which is aligned to the Public Finance Management (PFM) Act, 2012 will see effective management of inventory while reducing government vulnerability to accusations of mismanagement.

"The Government has continued to take a beating as its systems have remained manual, effectively facilitating corruption. Previous efforts at addressing this vulnerability in the procurement system have seen many officers sus-

pended without adequately addressing systemic challenges," he said.

He disclosed that government processes incorporated in the IFMIS structure include planning, budgeting, accounting, financial reporting and audit.

"It is anticipated that once all officers are trained on automation of the procurement, assets and inventory modules, the entire IFMIS structure will be completed," the administrator said.

Ngaluma observed that the introduction of the iSupplier, iProcurement and inventory web-based systems will facilitate efficient and effective execution of all financial management processes for the government thereby eliminating risks, enhancing security and financial controls in all service areas including

providing inter-connectivity of county government units.

"The re-modified IFMIS will enhance transparency in tracking delivery of goods and tracking payment status for suppliers through the self-service processes. It will also be able to create invoices and initiate delivery while automating the goods inspec-tion process," he said. Ngaluma noted that the

invoice tracking solution is an enhancement of the iSupplier portal that seeks to improve transparency and information flow to suppliers.

It is projected to enable timely disbursements to MDAs while reducing idle cash balances

He further said, a digital channel will be embedded in the system to allow suppliers query the status of the payments, deliveries and validating their purchase orders through SMS or USSD.

He said the improved system will see the development of timed projections in line with approved annual budgets while identifying gaps in cash resources early enough to allow for short term borrowing.

"It is projected to enable timely disbursements to MDAs while reducing idle cash balances in the MDAs' bank accounts," he said.

Ngaluma commended the National Treasury for identifying the gaps that challenge proper implementation of IFMIS, reiterating that officers are committed to the success of the program expected to go live from 1st July 2023.

and processors against the tens of thousands of others yet to register, saying failure to adhere to the Data Protection Act will attract sanctions.

"We expect compliance from all data controllers and processors and who must carry out data protection impact assessment (DPIA)," he added.

Both Kenyan businesses and individuals are increasingly having to contend with emerging online threats with Naivas Supermarket and Kabarak University having been the latest victims of cybercriminals.

Mr Otieno made the remarks in Kitale, Trans Nzoia County, where the commission held an awareness outreach programme to over 100 data controllers and processors drawn from both public and private sectors.

He said so far, the commission has received 2,831 complaints, with 922 admitted but 1,895 of the

cases declined under preliminary review for not meeting the threshold.

"ODPC, under the Act encourages self-regulations and settlement of disputes by way of Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) either through facilitation, conciliation, mediation or negotiation as opposed to court processes," he added.

Speaking at the forum, Kwanza Deputy County Commissioner Benedict Munyoki, who represented the County Com-

missioner Gideon Oyagi, said, increased collection of data by both government and private entities has fueled threats to personal data by predators.

He raised concern that some agencies involved in data collection were misusing members' data, hence the need to strengthen privacy mechanisms through the Data Protection Act.

"Some agencies were misusing members' data and we have witnessed increased cases of cybercrime, characterized by blackmail, hacking of Facebook or emails," he added.

Those sensitized on the Data Protection Act, 2019 included youth leaders, officials of bodaboda operators, religious leaders, banks' representatives, both national and county officials, among others.

ODPC has launched a countrywide awareness campaign that seeks to inform members of their rights to data protection.

# Jitume Digital Labs to equip 1m learners with market-ready skills, says CS Owalo

BYEVALYNEGITHINJI (PCO) The Government will equip one million learners with marketready business and ICTrelated courses for free and offer lucrative digital jobs through the Jitume Digital Labs Programme.

The Cabinet Secretary for Information, Communications and the Digital Economy EliudOwalo said, 52 Jitume Digital Labs have so far been deployed all over the country, while another 49 Labs are ready to receive equipment in order to offer services to digital learners.

The CS added that the digital angle of the Jitume-Programme has been designed to equip Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVETS) countrywide with 23,000 virtual desktops.

The CS was speaking during the launch of Jitume Digital Labs in Runyenjes Technical and Vocational College in Embu and Jeremiah Nyaga Technical Institute in Mbeere where each institution received 100 virtual desktops.

gage your services based on your skills, competencies and capabilities so that you are able to get digital jobs."

MrOwalo said the primary objective of the Jitume Digital Labs is to train a public workforce that spawns efficient and effective service delivery in different areas of specialization.

He opined that his ministry has established and operationalized 240 smart village hubs, in collaboration with government partners.

The CS further noted that the government intends to establish 1,450 digital village smart hubs in the electoral Wards.

The CS was accompanied by ICT and Digital Economy Principal Secretary Eng. John Tanui who said Kenya is ready to compete for digital jobs globally.

Embu Governor Ms. Cecily Mbarire was also present and encouraged the students to utilize the digital space to market their innovative products, skills and talents.

# **300 youth from Taveta benefit from Global Youth Mobilization program**

Some 300 young people from Taveta Sub-County have benefited from the Global Youth Mobilization (GYM) Covid-19 Response and Recovery Project under the President's Award-Kenya (PA-K).

The project is inspired by the need to tackle a global crisis in education, rising unemployment, mental health crisis, and increased domestic and gender-based violence among young women and girls and also under-represented and marginalized communities which escalated during the pandemic.

Reports show that worldwide, 132 million girls are out of school while girls face many barriers to accessing education.

The reports indicate that young people and future generations continue to

shoulder much of the longterm socio-economic consequences of the crisis but the disruption in their access to education and employment opportunities as a result of the economic downturn put the young generation on a much more volatile trajectory in finding and maintaining quality lives. According to the Presidential Awards-Kenya CEO Ms Nelly Munala, the GYM Covid-19 Recovery Project targeted 47 countries including Taveta Sub-County which qualified as a recipient of this global initiative because of the high incidence rates of Sexual and Gender Based Violence (SGBV) during the 2019-2020 global pandemic and surge in the number of teenage pregnancies in Tai-

taTaveta County.

MsMunala said the project opened its doors to young people from Timbila Location in Taveta in September 2021 with the help of Volunteer Trainers and Community Leaders.

"A total of 377 participants from Taveta Sub-County have graduated after being equipped with the relevant skills, resources, and linkages to help them improve their lives and that of their communities," the PA-K CEO noted.

75 per cent of the trainees, MsMunala added are teen mothers who were unable to continue with their education. "The young people are drawn from diverse backgrounds, particularly the marginalized and those who were negatively affected by the pandemic and a number of participants engaged in the project have started generating income," said Ms. Munala.

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# LAPSSET allocates Sh50m for scholarships, unlocking Blue Economy opportunities

The LAPSSET Corridor Development Authority has set aside Sh50 million for scholarships to enable youths acquire technical skills in line with the Bottom-up Economic Transformation Agenda (BETA).

Speaking during a sensitization forum on career opportunities in the Blue Economy sector in Mombasa, LAPSSET Corridor Development Authority Chairman Ali Mbogo said, the sector has numerous job opportunities that the youth can tap into to eke a living.

The LAPSSET chairman said, the authority is setting up a 5,000-acre Special Economic Zone in Lamu, and more than 300 companies are expected to start projects.

Mbogo said youths who would want to enroll at the Bandari Maritime Academy to study the International Convention on Standards of Training, Certification and Watchkeeping for Seafarers (STCW) course and have not been able to pay would be

sponsored by the authority. "There are numerous opportunities in the maritime sector but most of our people have not been able to secure jobs because of their economic situations," Mbogo said.

He added that LAPSSET will focus on skills development for youths to benefit from the Lamu Port which has been operationalized.

"We don't want our people from the Coast region and the other areas where LAPSSET passes through to be left out in the job opportunities," he said, add-

ing that the authority will initiate negotiations with learning institutions to tailor-made courses that will suit the youths.

Mbogoappealed to Coastal youths to stop lamenting but instead pursue education for them to be out of the unemployment yoke.

"Even if you have failed in Class Eight you can start with an artisan certificate. We are ready to hold your hands. It doesn't mean if you have failed in KCPE, it's the dead end.

"Let's not be cheated, we need to focus more on skills even if you have a degree in whatever course, back it up with a skill, even if it's a certificate in refrigeration, plumbing, electrical, or masonry for us to move forward," Mbogo urged the youths.

Coast Development Authority (CDA) Chairman MzeeMwinyiMzee encouraged young people to enroll in short courses to acquire skills in maritime because the Coast region has not exhausted the potential of its coastline.

# PS signs MoU to safeguard water infrastructure and reduce losses



The State Department for Water and Sanitation has signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the County Government of UasinGishu and water agencies to come up with strategies to conserve and protect water infrastructure in order to reduce non-revenue water.

The agencies include the North Rift Valley Water Works Development Agency (NRVWWDA), Lake Victoria South Water Works Development Agency, Eldoret Water and Sanitation Company (ELDOWAS) and Water Services Regulatory Board (WASREB). Speaking after signing the MoU at the governor's office, Wa-

ter and Sanitation Principal Secretary Dr. Paul Rono underlined the government's commitment to prioritize water issues in the country.

Rono said the Ministry intends to construct a hundred dams across the country to provide an adequate supply of water for both domestic, irrigation and industrial use. Dr.Rono, who was in El-

doret on a tour to conduct an assessment on the water needs for people of UasinGishu, decried the issue of non-revenue water (NRW), calling for strong cooperation between the national government, county government and water agencies to curb water losses through illegal connections.

The exercise is aimed at coming up with ways of upgrading the current water projects in order to provide sustainable water supply to residents.

# Kenya's Public Service Day to shine spotlight on innovations, achievements

Kenya will join the rest of Africa to mark a very important day for public servants in the continent under the auspices of the African Union (AU). As the Ministry of Public Service, Gender and Affirmative Action prepares for the African Public Service Day (APSD), the Principal Secretary for the State Department for Public Service Mr. Amos Gathecha (pictured) explains to **MyGov writer** Mutiso Mbithi what this day entails and the milestones made by the Government to modernize the Public Service to make it customer friendly through digitalization and other innovations.

### Q: Please explain what the Africa Public Service Day (APSD) entails.

A: The African Public Service Day (APSD) is a special day for public servants and public service organizations which is celebrated on the 23rd June of every year across the African Continent by African Union (AU) member countries. It is meant to mark and appreciate the work being done by the Public Service and recognize their positive contribution to the socio-economic development of the African Continent. However, here in Kenya, we will mark ours on dates to be announced later this month. To mark the day, celebrations are held through annual national and biennial continental events as a strategy to boost public administration programmes, public sector performance and governance.

## Q: What innovations has the **Department for Public Service** put in place to improve service delivery in Kenya?

A: The State Department continuously strives to come up with innovative ways to provide services to the citizens. Some of these are the Huduma Kenya one-stopshop service delivery platforms which comprise Huduma Centres, Huduma Contact Centre; Huduma Mashinani; and Huduma Electronic and Mobile platforms.

#### Q: What is the government doing to improve public service delivery in Kenya?

A: We have put in place a number of strategies to improve service delivery which include: the re-engineering of service delivery processes, automation and digitalization of government services and providing online services to the citizens. Through Huduma Kenya programme, we have taken services closer to our people and automated 5,000 services. We have given full medical cover for public servants and enhanced their training both locally and internationally in collaboration with development partners.

#### Q: What attributes does a public servant require to be declared 'Public Servant of the Year?'

A: To qualify for the Public Servant of the Year Award, a public servant should demonstrate outstanding performance of service provision to the citizens, be a person of integrity and accountable for their actions at any level.

#### Q: How will Kenya benefit from the Africa Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA) once it is implemented? What are some of the trade areas?

A: This year, AfCFTA envisages to spur tourism, transport, business services, communication services; financial services, transport services, and tourism and travelrelated services. Through AfCFTA members will progressively eliminate tariffs and non-tariff barriers to trade in goods, liberalize trade in services, cooperate on investment, intellectual property rights and competition policy. Through AfCFTA, we will re-think the

continental financial architecture to integrate youth and women as drivers of cross-border trade while stimulating and reinvigorating access and inclusion is a priority for the future.

#### Q: How is the government harnessing digital skills especially of the youth for transformation of service delivery to the public?

A: One of the key objectives of APSD is to recognize the innovations that have been developed by public servants and promote their replication for improved service delivery and majority of the innovations submitted have been developed. Through digitization of government services, we have opened up businesses to hitherto marginalized members of our society through Access to Government Procurement Opportunities (AGPO) which has enhanced economic inclusion in the country.

## Q: Please expound on the theme of this year's APSD

A: This year's theme is 'The Future of Public Service as a Catalyst for Revitalizing the Economy and Acceleration of the Implementation of Africa Continental Free Trade Area." It recognizes that the Public Service is operating in an era of increased uncertainty and disruption influenced by technological developments, a robust media, security challenges, geopolitics, emerging pandemics, global disasters and a youth segment under the influence of millennialism, culture, values, bulge, democratization, unemployment and urbanization. The public service workforce is surmounting numerous challenges and leveraging significant opportunities and the theme is premised on the government development agenda with a key focus on innovation to drive economic growth and improve the standard of living for all Kenyans.

ast African Commu-I nity (EAC) partner →states have agreed to anchor their 2023/2024 budgets on a common theme.


The decision was made during a EAC Finance and Economic Planning ministers' meeting for the Sectoral Council on Finance and Economic Affairs at the EAC headquarters in Arusha, Tanzania, attended by the National Treasury and Economic Cabinet Secretary Prof NjugunaNdung'u.

The ministers agreed to anchor their 2023/24 budgets on a common theme of "Accelerating Economic Recovery, Climate Change mitigation and Enhancing Productive Sectors for Improved Livelihood".

In his remarks, EAC Deputy Secretary General Steven Mloti lauded the ministers for implementing progressive macroeconomic policies which have helped to sustain positive economic growth in the EAC region and urged for more appropriate policy responses to help EAC economies contain the effects of economic shocks.

The Sectoral Council on Finance and Economic Affairs which consists of Ministers of Finance from the EAC region also recommended and agreed on enhanced revenue mobilization and expenditure rationalization.

Further, the ministers agreed on the implementation of EAC macroeconomic convergence criteria, to direct partner states to continue with prudent macroeconomic policies.

The County Government of Kilifi has developed a policy with the ultimate aim of helping teenage girls go through menstrual cycles comfortably and reduce the stigma associated to the monthly biological process by an uninformed society.

Speaking during the

World Menstrual Health celebration at Bamba, Deputy Governor Ms Flora Chibule revealed that Kilifi leaders have developed the Menstrual Health and Hygiene (MHH) Policy which gives the county government an obligation to provide menstrual hygiene for girls free of charge.

MsChibule noted that among the commitments that the county government will have in the proposed policy include, ensuring that all girls and women have access to safe, affordable, and effective menstrual hygiene products. "This policy is a critical step towards breaking the stigma surrounding menstruation and promoting gender equality in our county," Chibule said.

Apart from developing policies, MsChibule added the county will go out of

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its way to eliminate ''period poverty'' through a free pads distribution initiatives to ensure every girl has an access to the resources they need to manage their periods with dignity and comfort. "I am pleased to report that the Kilifi County government together with our able partners has distributed over 60,000 sanitary towels to vulnerable girls in our county," she said.

# NIA plans new pump to reopen cut-off blocks in Kano Scheme

### **BY CHRIS** MAHANDARA(KNA)

he National Irrigation Authority (NIA) has requisitioned a modern electric pump for installation at the West Kano Irrigation Scheme in Kisumu County to boost rice production.

NIA Acting Deputy General Manager in charge of Operationsand Irrigation Management Services Joel Tanui said, the agency has allocated funds for the initiative in the 2023-2024 financial year's budget.

He said this was set to maximise pumping efficiency and open up more land for irrigation in the 5, 000-acre scheme to scale up rice production.

Located in the Kano plains, the scheme which was established in 1974 serves over 900 farmers and produces about 7,900 metric tonnes annually.

The scheme's irrigation water is abstracted by pumping from Lake Victoria with the water drainage also pumped back into the lake.

Tanui said the pump, which used to serve the scheme was moved to Ahero

Irrigation Scheme in 2006 to stabilise water supply. The decision to install a

new pump at the scheme follows a public outcry with farmers petitioning the NIA to return the pump to open up blocks of the vast scheme which have been cut off following the recent floods experienced in the area.

Appearing before the National Assembly Public Petitions Committee sitting at the scheme, Tanui said the move to relocate the pump to Ahero was arrived at to save a crop worth millions of shillings.

"At that time, we were experiencing a big challenge

at Ahero Irrigation Scheme which threatened to destroy rice worth Sh600 million. That is why we decided to move the pump," he said.

The NIA, he said, was aware of the plight of farmers in Kano adding that the procurement process for the new pump is set to begin in July to ensure that it is fitted before the end of the year.

'The pumps are not available locally. We source them from South Africa and Germany which takes three to four months," he said.

Returning the old pump to the scheme, he said, was untenable since it was set to be decommissioned

The Nairobi Intelligent Transport System is a key project in our efforts to improve traffic flow and make Nairobi a more liveable city," said Eng. Kinoti.

"We are grateful to the Government of Kenya and the Government of Korea through the Korea Exim Bank for their support of this important project," Kinoti added. Bidding will be conducted through Competitive


The State Department for Public Works has launched the Costs Handbook for Construction Works to provide builders with a basis for estimating the costs of building and civil engineering projects.

# KFCB to promote digital literacy among parents to avert child exploitation

The Kenya Film Classification Board (KFCB) has launched a campaign of promoting digital literacy among parents and caregivers over online safety of children and families.

This is meant to prevent, address and respond to online cyber bullying, sexual exploitation and abuse of children in the country.

KFCB's Acting Chief Executive Officer (CEO)Mr Christopher Wambua said with the increased awareness among parents about modern smart technologies linked to the internet, the campaign will give them the skills to keep children and youth safe from online harm. Mr Wambua stated that through collecting data from its classification and regulatory duties, the Board realized that there was a major information gap among parents.

"We realized that children themselves know more than the parents when it comes to digital literacy as they are

tech savvy," he said.

Mr Wambua noted that this becomes a big problem when it comes to protecting children when they are online. "A study by the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) indicates that two-thirds of children online have not been taught or guided on how to consume online content appropriately. It is parents' and teachers' responsibility to protect them from online harm, especially as the people who are engaged the most with their children,' he added.

He disclosed that the UNICEF study had established that 17 per cent of children aged 18 years had been exposed to online pornography, while 30 per cent had interacted with strangers.

Speaking at Deliverance Church in Nakuru where KFCB took its Digital Parental Digital Literacy Programme (PaDiL), the acting CEO observed that the migration to digital space for learning, working and digital business had exposed many children and adolescents to cyber bullies.


# Tomato farmers in Nakuru in heavy losses as they battle destructive pest

Tomato farmers in Subukia, Nakuru county have been fighting with a pest that has mostly been destroying their crops, especially the leaves with the resultant effect being a drop in the quality of tomatoes.

The pest, Tutaabsoluta, which crept into the country at around 2016 has previously been exclusively tackled by chemical pesticides but a shift in this trend is being sought through an Integrated Pest Management (IPM) approach that hugely incorporates biological control coupled with minimal chemical pesticide application.

Mr. Josiah Ngumi inherited from his parents a passion for farming and has been a farmer for about 10 years. He transformed his hobby into agribusiness and grew tomatoes on a two-acre

"However, the major challenge for tomatoes has been Tutaabsoluta. This is a very destructive pest; it can wipe out all your harvest. But now we have found a solution to the problem," he said.

The Centre for Behaviour Change and Communication Partnerships Director and Technical Lead, Dr. Catherine Lengewa, says, "tomatoes are considered lucrative crops to grow since they mature fast and have a good return once harvested and sold."

She adds, "Despite these advantages, tomatoes are known to be vulnerable to pests and diseases including early and late blight and Tuta absoluta, making it a high-risk crop to grow and consequently prone to heavy pesticide use during its production."

The data indicates women in Samburu County are likely to experience teenage pregnancy at 50 per cent, West Pokot 36 per cent, Marsabit 29 per cent and Narok at 28 per cent.

On land ownership rights, the data indicates that only three per cent of women own agricultural land with 62 per cent of them lacking a title deed for the land as compared to men, at 22 per cent.

The survey also indicates that women bear the burden of gender-based violence with those who have experienced physical violence since age 15 highest in Bungoma (62 per cent) and lowest in Mandera (nine per cent).

The survey also indicates that women are the most prone to sexual violence with the data showing that 13 per cent of women have reported to have experienced sexual violence at some point in their lives.

Among other issues, the the PS and the Governor discussed partnerships between the National and County Governments on effective ways of mobilizing the youth to take up Maritime careers for eventual absorption in the local and international maritime job market.

Already, Mwadime noted, the department has commenced the process by engaging the youth in Taita Taveta County. and by next week, the department has organized sensitization forums in all the Sub-Counties of Kinango,Lunga Lunga, Matuga and Msambweni of Kwale county.

"Our target as a country is to have 5,000 youth employed annually in this sector. The proximity to the ocean puts us at an advantage position to secure these jobs which are up for grabs to every Kenyan youth." the PS said.

The Government, Mwadime revealed, has through the Higher Education Loans Board, set aside Sh.20million this year as a loan facility strictly for students pursuing maritime courses at the Bandari Maritime Academy, further indicating that the kitty will be enhanced to Sh 25m in the next financial year, "as a way of ensuring no youth interested joining the maritime field is left behind ".

# PPB cracks down illegal distribution outlets

In a resolute move to protect public health and maintain regulatory integrity, the Pharmacy and Poisons Board (PPB) of Kenya, the country's Drug Regulatory Authority, has launched a targeted crackdown on illegal distribution outlets operating within the Nyanza and Nairobi regions. The operation which

commenced last month aims to combat the presence of illegal chemists, herbal medicine stores, and cosmetic shops that unlawfully stock medicament-containing preparations disguised as cosmetics.

Mr. Julius Kaluai, the Head of Good Distribution Practices at PPB, emphasized the importance of the crackdown, stating, "our primary goal is to ensure a safe healthcare environment for all Kenyans and by taking decisive action against these illegal outlets, we are protecting consumers from potentially harmful products."

Working in collaboration with various government agencies, including the Judiciary, Kenya Police service, Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions (ODPP), and the Police, the PPB's concerted efforts have yielded significant results and multiple arrests have been made with a total of seventy individuals apprehended and are now facing prosecution in courts within the Nyanza

Kaluai highlighted the dedication and collaboration of these entities, stating, "We greatly appreciate the unwavering partnership of the judiciary, Kenya Police service, ODPP, and the Police. Together, we have taken a strong stance against offenders, ensuring that justice is served and public health is protected."

In addition to the arrests, the PPB's regulatory inspectors have conducted over 200 inspections to enforce strict compliance with regulations. Kaluai emphasized the importance of these inspections, saying, "through rigorous inspections, we will leave no stone unturned in our mission to create a transparent and accountable healthcare system. Our aim is to foster a culture of compliance and safeguard public health."

The successful outcome of the crackdown has been attributed to the collaborative efforts of all involved stakeholders. Kaluai added, "The achievements we have made in this operation reflect our collective commitment to upholding the law and creating a safe healthcare environment. By working together, we send a strong message that illegal practices will not be tolerated."

The PPB cautions individuals against tampering with closure notices, as it is an offense under investigation that will result in regulatory sanctions. Kaluai emphasized the importance of lawfulness, stating, "Upholding the principles of law is crucial in establishing a transparent and accountable healthcare system that prioritizes the well-being of every individual."the country.

Furthermore, the PPB urges public and private healthcare facilities, as well as those responsible for handling pharmaceuticals, to make use of its online services for proper disposal of pharmaceutical waste. Kaluai stated, "We encourage all healthcare facilities and pharmaceutical handlers to utilize our online services for the responsible disposal of pharmaceutical waste. By doing so, we contribute to a sustainable and environmentally conscious healthcare system.'

# The case for a digital ID - CŠ Owalo

Minister says a digital ID will reduce citizens' burden of walking around with over 25 different identity documents to prove who they are

he need to grow e-commerce, have safe access to digitised services, curb online fraud, ease identification burden for citizens and help the nation in development planning is making the government develop a digital identity.

The Cabinet Secretary for Information, Communications and the Digital Economy, Mr Eliud Owalo, said Kenyans currently have a huge burden of walking around with over 25 different identity documents to prove who they are before they access various services.

Some of the identity documents Kenyans have to carry around are the National ID card, NSSF and NHIF cards, employers' ID, passport, birth and marriage certificates, driving licence, academic certificates, private health insurance card, ATM card, disability card and passport photos.

Almost every new critical service requires a new set of data from the government, leading to issuance of an additional special purpose ID, noted Mr Owalo.

For example, when the Inua Jamii programme was introduced in 2004, the government came up with a new bank ID and token, to enable beneficiaries access their benefits. Anticipated future services portend a rise in

the new digital ID by February next year, according to the government.

Mr Owalo said the analogue ID has lost trust as photo, and

document manipulation applications rise, giving fraudsters an easy time to come up with fake ones.

"This is worrisome in an increasingly sophisticated digital economy, where M-pesa alone moved Sh8.8 trillion digitally in 2022. and in the process undertaking billions of ID authentications in an eco-system where there is a manifold increase in financial crimes and identity thefts," said the CS.

An increase in identity theft and other forms of cybercrimes, Mr Owalo noted, have slowed down the growth of e-commerce.

"The digital ID will be a great enabler of e-commerce. It will help create digital trust by facilitating the authentication of an actor's identity in e-commerce, through a connection between the identity attributes in the digital world and the real-world legal identity," he said. **CONTINUED ON PAGE 2**

# Why Kenya must transition to using a digital ID

He added that e-commerce activities depend on digital trust to process transactions.

"The prerequisite for e-commerce transactions is the establishment of a digital trust relationship between a vendor and a buyer, so that both parties know who they are transacting with. The private sector - including e-commerce platforms, digital banking, payment processing, and logistics - provides key services that enable e-commerce and enhance digital trust," he said.

President William Ruto last week said that the new ID would help to digitise the civil registration and vital statistics system. "The government will set up a new civil registration and vital statistics system that meets the imperatives of a new digital era. The system must be able to assign unique personal identification numbers at birth to all persons born in Kenya," said President Ruto at the 7<sup>th</sup> Identification for Africa Conference (ID4Africa) held in Nairobi.

He added that a digital ID would assist the government to have a passenger information solution to monitor movement in and out of the country.

Another benefit of a digital ID is that a biometric match between one's physical and stored details will authenticate a person in a foolproof manner, based on the principle that they are unique. "The effect is that when you

## INFOBOX

## Pakistan's digital ID journey

Pakistan computerised its National ID in 2001, a process that was done by a newly formed National Database and Registration Authority (NADRA).

The agency transformed the digital ID landscape by including new markers of identity, such as biometrics, within a digital citizen database.

Their digital ID has the bearer's full name, date of birth, and addresses, a unique 13-digit ID number that encompasses an individual's domicile, followed by a family number that forms each individual's family tree, after which an odd or even number is assigned denoting the individual's sex. But this national identity system, according to critics, has failed to cater for the needs of marginalised communities, and is a potential threat to citizens' right to privacy since details are centralised under a single authority. The origin of Kenya's national identification can be traced back to colonial times. An ordinance signed by Sir Henry Conway, the Colonial Governor in 1912–1917 made it mandatory for all adult males aged 16 and above to have official identity documents.

Identification was largely for the purposes of controlling the movement of natives. It also facilitated payment of hut tax and recruitment into colonial labour. This colonial ID, referred to as kipande, was designed to be a tool of exploitation. Africans hated it. They saw it as a symbol of oppression and imposed servitude. will want to open a bank account, the bank will not necessarily require you to produce a physical ID. They will authenticate you via your biometrics and get all the pertinent information from the single source of truth and proceed to serve you, including when you apply for a loan, or wish to withdraw funds, thereby avoiding the risk of a fraudulent impersonator presenting a fake or photoaltered ID," he said.

The digital ID, noted the CS, will promote inclusive access to education, healthcare, and labour markets as it will safe migration and also contribute to greater levels of civic participation.

"For example, in Estonia, over 30 per cent of individuals vote online, of whom 20 per cent say they would not vote at a physical polling place. The envisaged benefits are immense. Digital ID is indeed paramount to increasing the adoption of formal financial services and identifying specific policy interventions."

According to him, the transition from the analogue to the digital ID is key in Kenya's digital transformation agenda as it incorporates citizens in the journey.

The government is currently working on making Kenya a digital economy through initiatives that include taking over 5,000 services online, setting up of 1,450 digital village hubs, installing 25,000 hotspots and 100,000km of fibre optic cable.

"Digitisation of our systems, processes, services and re-engineering how we do business will be incomplete unless the citizens can participate digitally. It is estimated that this transformation has the potential to unlock economic value equivalent to between 3 and 13 per cent of the gross domestic product by 2030 from the implementation of digital ID programmes," said Mr Owalo.

So what details will the digital ID encompass? Mr Owalo said it will be a body of verified information about an individual sourced from the Integrated Population Registry Service (IPRS), National Integrated Identity Management System (NIIMS) and the National Registration Bureau (NRB).

This information will be digitally linked to aggregated data from various official and trusted sources (functional ID data) such as the National Hospital Insurance Fund (NHIF), National Social Security Fund (NSSF) and the National Education Management Information System (NEMIS). Some people have dismissed the digital ID project as another Huduma Namba, which collapsed during President Uhuru Kenyatta's regime.

Mr Owalo differs, noting that in Huduma Namba, there was issuance of a physical ID card. "There would be no physical ID card with the digital ID. It will, instead, be an instrument for enabling citizens to be part of the new digital transformation in the world. The digital ID will be very instrumental in helping us to remain socially, economically and technologically relevant in the new world order. It has been utilised effectively in India, Pakistan, Estonia, Belgium and many other parts of the world. Kenya as a country cannot be left behind in the new world order," he said.

## Kenya's exports to African nations surge 23pc in Q1

Kenya's exports to various African countries increased by 23.3 per cent in quarter one as the government enhanced bilateral ties with nations like Tanzania, Uganda, Egypt and Rwanda. New data from the Central Bank of Kenya (CBK) showed that the exports rose to Sh98.8 billion at the end of March, a rise from Sh80.1 billion in a similar period in 2022. Most of the exports went to Uganda, Tanzania, Rwanda and Egypt, with the DR Congo emerging as the other leading destination of goods from Kenya.

Kenya exported goods worth Sh30.9 billion to Uganda, to Tanzania Sh14 billion and Rwanda Sh9.3 billion, according to the CBK.

Other top destinations of exports were Egypt, South Africa, Zambia, Zimbabwe and Somalia. President William Ruto has in the past months held bilateral talks with various African Heads of State, including of South Africa, Egypt, Eritrea, Djibouti and Tanzania in bid



to increase trade with Kenya. The talks have culminated into removal or relaxation of visa rules for citizens of both countries to enhance movement of people and goods.

And last week, President Ruto announced plans to remove visa requirements for African nationals travelling to Kenya for business to further boost trade under the African Continental Free Trade Area. Kenya exports to African nations are mainly tea, coffee, oil (re-exports), animal, vegetable fats and oils, and manufactured goods.

#### Your love story with dogs goes back far...

Yes, as far as 1976 actually when I was a small boy living in Nyahururu. A priest at Nyahururu Catholic Church known as Fr Lewis noticed the interest I had in dogs and gave me a German shepherd puppy. That ignited my passion.

#### How many dogs do you have?

There are 42 mature dogs currently at my home. They were more but I have sold some and leased out others.

### **Describe your** typical day...

My day starts at sam with an inspec-tion to confirm that all the dogs are well. Then I prepare a schedule for the day, including their meals and walks in the neighbourhood. The schedule guides my two workers on what to do. The workers are trained on first aid so that they attend to emergencies in case they arise. Most of the time I leave my home at gam to train dogs at people's homes or institutions.

#### How much does one need to start such a business?

With Sh20,000, one is good to go but it's good to have some knowledg about the business and have passion for it.

### Tell us about dog breeding...

In breeding dogs, you work with what is known as "working line". These are dogs with stronger qualities such as powerful muscles and are purposely selected for breeding. This means the breeder should know their animals well

#### Some people say it's hard knowing when a female dog (bitch) is on heat...

It can be if one does not know how to detect the heat signs. The obvious sign is bleeding from the vulva and others licking the back end more than usual or being over friendly to other dogs. I mate the dogs once I detect blood. Three to six mating ses-sions are enough to make the female pregnant. pregnant.

#### How does a quality working line look like?

In the case of German shepherds, a good quality working line will have medium-sized animals, with good quality fur, temperament and body structure. These are the ones I use for breeding purposes. To avoid inbreeding, I change males every two vears.

## So, do pregnant dogs need special care?

Yes, they need good feeding and housing. A dog's gestation period is about 60 days and one can get up to 14 puppies in a single birth. But a dog will eat her puppies if left to starve. I have a maternity wing for the mother and its puppies once it gives birth. During this time, I feed them on meat and eggs.

## Tell us more about feeding your dogs

While dogs are carnivores, they need the other nutrients namely carbohy drates and vitamins. I normally buy broken rice, which I cook as well as concentrates from shops that I offer them alongside meat.

## Where do you

source the meat? I have several sources of meat remains but the main ones are ab-batoirs in Kiambu and Nairobi where I buy a 90kg bag at Sh4,000. I also buy livestock blood for the dogs from the abbatoirs. All this must be cooked well otherwise the dogs will diarhoea. I cook the entire week's meal once. For the concentrates, one should check the expiry date to avoid buying food contaminated with afla-toxin, which kills dogs in days.

he Judiciary has embarked on a nationwide programme to sensitise citizens on using alternative dispute resolution (ADR) mechanisms to reduce the number of cases in courts as judicial officials struggle with a backlog.

Court Annexed Mediation (CAM) deputy registrar Caroline Kendagor said the institution would start using Nyumba Kumi, village elders and trained Judiciary-accredited mediators to facilitate negotiation among warring parties. She noted that most disputes, especially civil ones, can be solved through mediation,

thus, if the method is adopted, wheels of justice would grind faster as judicial officials will have few cases to handle.

"There is public outcry over delayed resolution of cases in almost all the courts. possibly due to a high number of petty cases finding their way there," she said in Gatundu South sub-county during a sensitisation forum. According to her, mediation is cheaper, faster and enhances quick resolution of matters.

In Kakamega, Principal Judge Byram Ongaya of the Employment and Labour Relations Court (ELRC) said the Judiciary has turned to Article 159 of the constitution, which permits the use of ADR mechanisms.

Justice Ongaya, who was speaking during the Employment and Labour Relations Annual symposium, said the Judiciary, together with stakeholders, is developing a curriculum for the Kenya Judiciary Academy that aims to train conciliators

"We are working with consultants, the

courts, and the Ministry of Labour to develop a curriculum to train conciliators. A conciliator, also called an Administrator Judge, will act as neutral entity between warring parties and work to ensure they settle disputes without turning for court trial," he said.

He observed that with the measures taken, they anticipate reduced cases in courts, adding that no case should go to court without passing through all the stages of ADR.

Justice Jemimah Keli, a principal judge in Kakamega, requested Chief Justice Martha Koome to establish a labour court in Likuyani sub-county, noting that residents are forced to travel for hours to seek justice in Kakamega town. The court has jurisdiction to hear and determine disputes relating to employment and labour relations.

Kakamega is one of the counties where the Employment and Labour Relations Court has been established. Others are Nairobi, Mombasa, Kisumu, Nakuru, Nyeri and Eldoret.

## **Benefits of ADR**

- ADR gives warring parties a chance to work through disputed issues with the help of a neutral party.
- It is a faster and less expensive method than going to court, where one needs to file case and hire a lawyer, all which attract charges.
- ADR saves time by allowing resolution of a matter in weeks or months, compared to court, which can take years.
- The pillars of ADR are negotiation, mediation (or third party intervention) and adjudication
- Article 159 of the constitution mandates the Judiciary to use Alternative Dispute Resolution mechanisms including mediation

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# Gov't promises to transition tobacco farmers to safer crops for good health

Health Cabinet Secretary (CS) Susan Wafula has expressed the government's commitment to immigrate tobacco farmers in Migori county to production of safer crops for the sake of good health and economic prosperity.

MsWafula noted that people in counties like Migori where the crop is produced in large quantities have for a long period suffered serious ailments related to the crop and should be migrated from the unnecessary health hazard and deaths.

Speaking while marking this year's World Tobacco Day at Sibuaoche market in Uriri Constituency within Migori County, MsWafula said it is time for tobacco farmers to embrace crops like the now popular nyota beans, sweet potato, sorghum, maize, sunflower and sugarcane among others, to raise their incomes and health.

The CS noted that it is a pity that the prevalence rate of tobacco use among the adults in Kenya stands at 11.6 per cent while that of the youth is 9.9 per cent.

This, she added, triggered the number of tobacco-related deaths in the country to over 6,000 annually against the global rate of eight million people within the same period.

The CS said the Ministry of Health, in

It is worrying that more farmers are still stuck in the production of tobacco-CS Wafula conjunction with tobacco control bodies and partners like the World Health Organization (WHO) will double efforts in persuading the over 20,000 tobacco farmers in Migori alone and the 36,000 of them countrywide to switch to safer crops.

The ministry had also made arrangements with the Ministry of Education to introduce a syllabus on tobacco use in the curriculum.

Kenya is also a signatory to the global treaty on tobacco

control and has so far earned ten awards for the good work of fighting the crop and will ensure that it protects the Ozone layer from the impact of tobacco, the CS added.

She said for Migori, she would take it upon herself to talk to her counterpart in agriculture to see that the Sony Sugar is made vibrant to promote sugarcane growing to be the people's economic mainstay in future.

"Currently, it is worrying that more farmers are still stuck in the production of tobacco despite the many diseases like cancer that the crop exposes them to," she lamented.

## Kenya assumes chairmanship of continental bank board

Kenya has taken over the chairmanship of the Board of Governors of the African Development Bank (AfDB).

Prof NjugunaNdung'u, the Treasury Cabinet Secretary, succeeded Egyptian Governor Hassan Abdalla as the chairman of the continental bank after a week-long annual AFDB meeting.

The chairmanship rotates between member states who are members of AFDB. The board constitutes a governor and an alternate governor appointed by each member country who exercise voting powers proportional to the shareholding of their country.

As such, Kenya will host the AfDB 2024 annual meetings, in Nairobi. In his acceptance speech, CS Ndung'u reaffirmed the Government of Kenya's commitment to ensure successful meetings. The CS underscored the

# Makueni County to establish a neurosurgical center in Wote town

Makueni Governor Mutula Kilonzo Jnr has promised to commit a parcel of land to establish a neurosurgical center in Wote in an effort to provide medical services to the region.

He added that plans are underway to enhance the neurosurgical camp to a regular program.

He was speaking during a three-day free medical camp aimed at treating and creating awareness to patients suffering from tumors on their heads at the Makueni Referral Hospital, Mother and Child wing in Wote.

Hundreds of Makueni residents benefited from the free neurosurgical medical camp organized by the county government in partnership

with the Brain Tumour Association of Kenya (BTAK) and the University of Nairobi (UON).

The camp also brought together a team of specialized surgeons from BTAK and Makueni doctors including 50 medical students from UON who will learn how to conduct complex surgeries.

"So far, everything has gone on well, and today we intend to operate four patients, already the surgeries have started and two

patients are at the theatre," said Dr. Christopher Musau a consultant neurosurgeon and the Patron of BTAK.

"On the first day, we were able to attend to 100 patients and identified 6 persons who needed the neurosurgical services," added Musau.

The patients were identified by a team of medical practitioners who offered free medical screening that took place at the sub county hospitals.

Governor Kilonzo Jnr lauded the team for availing the rare medical services to the residents of Makueni and neighboring counties.

"We have also agreed that if they find it necessary, to cascade the treatment to Nairobi where the affected patients will access the medical service free," he said.
