ENHANCEMENT OF THE NATIONAL TELECOMMUNICATIONS NUMBERING, NAMING, ADDRESSING, AND IDENTIFICATION (NNAI) RESOURCES FRAMEWORK

The Communications Authority of Kenya (CA) is the regulatory agency for the ICT industry in Kenya with responsibilities in telecommunications, cyber security, e-commerce, broadcasting and postal/courier services. The CA is also responsible for managing the country's numbering and frequency spectrum resources, administering the Universal Service Fund (USF) as well as safeguarding the interests of users of ICT services.

In furtherance of the responsibility of administering and managing the country's Numbering, Naming, Addressing, and Identification (NNAI) resources, the Authority has developed an enhanced draft NNAI framework. The draft framework aims to increase the NNAI resource capacity, hence ensuring adequate NNAI resources to cater for the increasing use cases that need the said resources, as well as keeping abreast with technological changes.

Further, noting that NNAI resources are finite, the draft framework proposes introduction of annual fees for select NNAI resources used by service providers in the network as well as special patterned numbers.

Members of the Public, ICT Service providers, and Stakeholders in the ICT sector, are invited to submit their representations on the proposed framework by October 17th, 2025. Submissions should be made via the email address: numbering@ca.go.ke

No turning back on electronic procurement

The Principal Secretary for the State Department for Public Investment and Asset Management Mr. Cyrell Odede has reaffirmed the government's commitment to roll out and implement the electronic Government Procurement (e-GP) System.

The PS said the intended migration is set to save the taxpayer between Sh150 billion to Sh250 billion annually

which he said is being lost through dubious procurement practices.

Speaking when he made a series of visits to assess the status of the roll out of e-GP in the State Departments for Health Services, Correctional Services and Investment Promotion as well as the Kenyatta National Hospital (KNH), the PS maintained that procuring goods and services electronically through the system is long overdue.

The PS accompanied by Mr. Eric Korir - Director

Public Procurement, made courtesy call to his colleague Principal Secretaries Dr. Ouma Oluga (State Department for Medical Services) and Mr Abubakar Hassan Abubakar (State Department for Investment Promotion) in addition to Mr Sammy Kioko, the Secretary of Administration in the State Department for Correctional Services who represented PS Salome Wairimu Beacco. The PS Odede later held one-on-one discussions with the respective heads of procure-

ment and supply chain management in the three state departments in a bid to find out the progress made in the implementing the e-GP System, challenges encountered during the migration phase and solutions on the same.

He quelled fears over the ongoing legal battle saying the courts have not abolished the government's decision to make procurement processes

via the system but have encouraged both manual and electronic means proceed jointly.

"We are a country that follows the rule of law and we obey court orders. However, the court has not told us to suspend the use of electronic procurement system but has said that both the manual and the electronic should go hand in hand but as government, we

are encouraging our suppliers to do so electronically," said PS Odede.

"We are intentional to ensure that, anyone wishing to do business with the government, ought to do so electronically through the system, thus encouraging our suppliers to register with e-GP in order to transact business with the government," he added.

NOC seals oil and gas deal with Algeria's giant oil company

The Kenya National Oil Corporation (NOC) has signed a landmark Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Algeria's Sonatrach SPA, Africa's largest energy company, in a move set to strengthen Kenya's position in the regional oil and gas market and attract fresh investment into

the sector.

The agreement, signed at Sonatrach's headquarters in Algiers, opens up opportunities across the petroleum value chain and cooperation between the two companies will span upstream exploration and production, the supply of petroleum products, the import of liquefied petroleum gas (LPG), the development of storage and distribution infrastructure,

and the creation of strategic reserves.

The MoU also includes knowledge transfer and staff training, as well as the establishment of a trading platform to support regional energy flows.

Sonatrach, founded in 1963, is the seventh-largest oil and gas company globally and Africa's first oil "major".

The MOU was signed by

the NOC CEO Mr Leparan ole Morintat and Sonatrach CEO Mr. Rachid Hachichi in Algiers, Algeria.

With 154 subsidiaries, it dominates Algeria's economy, contributing more than 90 per cent of government export revenue.

Rachid Hachichi, Sonatrach's President and CEO, said the partnership reflects the firm's commitment to building stronger African alliances.

"Sonatrach remains unwavering in building fruitful partnerships and pursuing Africa's Sustainable Development Goals. Cooperation

in the oil and gas sector is key to unlocking the continent's potential." he said.

This new partnership could help NOC secure reliable and competitively priced fuel imports, particularly LPG, which is increasingly in demand among Kenyan households and businesses.

Access to Sonatrach's trading platforms and supply networks could also reduce Kenya's exposure to global price shocks and cut import costs over time. This deal also signals Nairobi's intention to deepen energy-sector reforms and position Kenya as a regional

energy hub.

If fully implemented, the collaboration could spur new capital inflows into oil exploration, midstream infrastructure and downstream distribution, while intensifying competition with established players in the East African petroleum market.

The agreement, Mr Morintat said comes at a pivotal time for NOC, which is undergoing a restructuring process to become a holding company comprised of three subsidiaries dedicated to exploration, trading and infrastructure.

Kenya Showcases Climate-Security Model at African Climate Summit in Addis Ababa

Kenya has positioned itself at the forefront of linking climate change to national security, unveiling an innovative model that embeds climate resilience at the grassroots level during the Second African Climate Summit (ACS-2) taking place in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia.

Dr. Raymond Opollo, the Principal Secretary in the State Department for Internal Security, spoke on the sidelines of the Africa Climate Summit where he highlighted the Kenya's National Climate Change Security Resilience Programme (NCCSRP) as a groundbreaking program that combines environmental protection with governance and peacebuilding.

"Climate change is no longer a distant environmental concern; it has evolved into the defining security challenge of our time, threatening livelihoods, fueling conflicts over scarce resources, destabilizing economies, and undermining peace within and across our borders," Dr. Opollo told delegates.

Launched under the leadership of President William Ruto, the NCCSRP has placed Kenya's 4,000 Chiefs and National Government Administrative Officers at the heart of climate response.

Through the programme's flagship initiative, Chiefs Climate Action Day, administrators mobilize their communities on the first Friday of every month to plant trees, restore landscapes, and promote environmental stewardship.

Since its inception less than a year ago, the programme has recorded remarkable progress: over 114 million trees have been planted thereby, contributing to Kenya's National Tree Growing Restoration Campaign, which targets 15 billion trees by 2032.

In this program, more than 2 million citizens have been mobilised nationwide for the tree planting exercises with 6.4 million seedlings distributed, achieving a 60% survival rate as the community is charged with taking care of the planted trees, including those within their respective homesteads. Dr. Opollo indicated that these achievements had been made possible without external funding, underscoring the power of community-driven climate action.

"This is living proof that community-driven action works, with the right investment, it can be scaled not only across Kenya but throughout the IGAD region and the African continent," Dr. Opollo said.

In addition to tree planting, the NCCSRP facilitates the resolution of climate-induced conflicts among the communities. Chiefs and administrators are required to arbitrate conflicts and will use community-wisdom and intelligence to support early warning systems.

Dr. Opollo outlined the programme's guiding philosophy, built on three pillars: climate action must be locally owned yet nationally coordinated; resilience is strongest when built from the bottom up, from villages, locations, and the entire communities; chiefs, with their convening power and trusted position, are invaluable 'force multipliers' for peace and sustainable development.

Speaking on regional partnerships and innovation, Dr. Opollo stated that the country's collaboration with IGAD and the IGAD Climate Prediction and Applications Centre (ICPAC) remained central to building capacity for local officers. This had been achieved through the introduction of a specialised Climate, Peace, and Security Curriculum and a Digital Decision Support Framework, a mobile platform that allows Chiefs to report and monitor climate actions in real time.






1.2 Agriculture: Farmers' Digital Platform




1.3b Agriculture: Fertilizer Subsidy





- The National Equipment Service Program (NES) is designed to ensure continuous access to medical services in county health facilities across Kenya. - ❑ Cabinet approval: The Kenyan Cabinet approved the ratification process in 23rd April 2024.
- ❑ Agreement adoption: The Agreement on Fisheries Subsidies was adopted by the WTO Ministerial Conference in June 2022.
- ❑ Purpose of the agreement: The Agreement aims to prohibit harmful fisheries subsidies, which contribute to overfishing and depletion of fish stocks.
- ❑ Entry into force: The Agreement enters into force when two-thirds of WTO members deposit their "instruments of acceptance".



INTER-AGENCY CONVERSATION AND DIALOGUE ON ROAD SAFETY

IMPLEMENTATION OF THE NATIONAL ROAD SAFETY ACTION PLAN (NRSAP) 2024-2028

Kenya's National Road Safety Action Plan (NRSAP) 2024-2028 is a comprehensive five-year strategy aimed at halving road fatalities and serious injuries by 2030. The Action Plan represents a proactive and multifaceted strategy to reduce road traffic crashes, its devastating impact and socio-economic burden estimated at Sh450 billion each year. Launched on April 17, 2024, the Plan builds on the Safe System approach—a globally recognized framework that views road safety as a shared responsibility across the entire system, including roads, vehicles, users, speeds, and post-crash response.

NRSAP is built on eight national priorities, emphasizing evidence-based interventions, strong leadership, multi-sectoral collaboration, and sustainable funding. The highlights of achievements realized under each national priority area since its launch is provided below;

STATUS UPDATE ON THE IMPLEMENTATION OF NATIONAL PRIORITY AREAS

PRIORITY 1: COORDINATION OF DELIVERY PARTNERSHIPS

Under Priority 1, whose goal was to strengthen multi-agency governance, national coordination, and stakeholder collaboration for effective implementation of road safety initiatives, the following have been achieved:

- Establishment of 47 County Transport and Safety Committees (CTSCs) for enhanced collaboration in road safety

County Transport and Safety Committees (CTSCs) have been established through gazettement for all the 47 Counties. Further, 81% of these counties have been inducted to prepare them for their road safety roles as envisaged in the NTSAs Act of 2012. An important outcome out of these induction trainings is the development of County Specific Road Safety Action Plan that guides each county's road safety strategies.

- Mainstreaming road safety into MDAs

Mainstreaming of Road Safety in all Ministries, Departments and Agencies was completed in the financial year 2023/2024. Over 450 MDAs participated in this activity which was implemented as a Performance Target and besides enhancing road safety sensitizations. This initiative led to the establishment of road safety committees within each MDA and the development of internal Road Safety Policies.

- Participation in international road safety activities

Internationally, Kenya has continued to participate in Road Safety programmes and recently, it was elected the President of African Association of Road Safety Lead Agencies (AARSLA) in Lusaka, Zambia. Benin, Zambia, Cape Verde and Democratic Republic of Congo were elected Vice Presidents while Nigeria is the Association's Secretariat. This Association was established to create a common space for African Road Safety Lead Agencies to share experiences, learn from each other's journeys, and to stand together in facing the road safety challenges unique to our continent.

Additionally, the process of ratification of the African Road Safety Charter – a regional road safety strategy – is currently being spearheaded by the Ministry of Roads and Transport. This will promote international collaboration in road safety matters.

- This 2nd Road Safety Conference is part of the multi-agency collaboration required for the successful implementation of the Action Plan and the engagement will culminate in the establishment of the Multi-Agency Steering Committee (MASC) and the Multi-Sectoral Technical Working Group (MSTWG).

PRIORITY 2: FUNDING

The 2nd Priority of the National Road Safety Action Plan seeks to establish sustainable financing mechanisms and mobilize resources to support the implementation of road safety interventions at both national and county levels. Under this priority area, the following have been achieved:

- Government of Kenya Funding of Road Safety Agencies

The Government of Kenya has continued to fund Road Safety across the different agencies that play a role. This has been through exchequer as well as in projects such as World Bank and EU funded projects such as Horn of Africa Gateway Development Project (HoAGDP), Usalama Barabarani, among others.

- Development of the Road Safety Investment Plan (2025)

The National Road Safety Action Plan required that an investment plan detailing key areas for investment to realize significant reduction road traffic fatalities and injuries be identified. The Investment has been developed and among several interventions, it proposes investment in infrastructure treatments and enforcement as areas that would produce significant reductions in road traffic fatalities and injuries.

- Framework for traffic fines and penalties to support road safety programmes

The Government is also currently considering a framework for traffic fines and penalties that will not only automate traffic law enforcement but also generate revenue for implementation of the Action Plan.

PRIORITY 3: RISK TARGETING

Priority 3 of the National Road Safety Action Plan seeks to maximize the impact of safety investments by identifying and addressing high-risk areas, road user groups, and behaviours, thereby reducing fatalities and serious injuries. This has been an important activity that NTSAs as well as the Road Agencies have been consistently undertaking over the last one year.

- Risk Identification and Mapping

Through Crash Data Mapping, NTSAs has identified high-risk locations and road user categories across the country. It is now clear where hazardous road sections are, the road users most affected and most of the causes. KeRRA has also undertaken risk-targeting analysis of 32 priority roads in Kenya that led to establishment of high-risk corridors for targeted interventions.

- Road Safety Audits and Assessments

NTSA, KeNHA, KeRRA, and KURA consistently conduct Road Safety Audits and assessments across urban and rural high-risk roads. These Audits are undertaken during various project lifecycle phases including design, construction, pre-opening, and post-construction. Valuable road safety information such as the causes of road traffic crashes have been obtained from these audits that have been used to not only identify road safety risks in the targeted areas but also informed intervention measures. Some of notable outcomes by KURA includes the Construction of 87 Km of Walkways across the Country, Design of 277 Km of urban roads, Construction of 17 bridges, Construction of 75km of new urban roads, Periodic maintenance of 184.7 km and Routine maintenance of 2,539.21 km.

- Development and Adoption of Technical Tools

To support building of safe infrastructure, Road Design Manuals have been updated to incorporate Non-Motorized Transport (NMT) and safety standards. KeNHA has developed and adopted Work Zone Safety/Traffic Management Plan (WZ-TMP) Guidelines. Further, Blackspot Management Guidelines to mainstream the process of identification, analysis and treatment of hazardous spots along Kenya's highways are currently under development and to be completed by the end of the year.

- iRAP Star Rating and Corridor Safety Assessment

iRAP Star Rating, a system that objectively measures the built-in safety of a road, with one star indicating high risk and five stars indicating low risk – has been completed for 506 km across major roads. Notably, KeNHA has integrated international best practices in objective safety assessment of road infrastructure with over 750Km of the Authority's network being star rated to date, under the iRAP methodology.

- Blackspot Treatment and Hazard Mitigation

The NRSAP 2024–2028 defines blackspots as specific road segments or interventions with a high frequency or severity of crashes, identified through data analysis and risk assessments. From the findings of road safety audits and inspections, high-risk sites have been prioritized for treatment.

Some of the completed sections include Kibarani/Makupa Causeway, widening and traffic separation along Salga – Sachangwan, gantry signs and enhanced non-standard signage at Kinungi – Ihindu – Karai section, construction of pedestrian bridges alongside Chimoii River Bridge on the Northern Corridor, non-motorized transport facilities at Sigalagala along Kisumu – Kakamega highway and installation of elaborate non-standard signs along the Subuiga descent.

Dualing of Ngata Bridge, a previously hazardous section marred by loss of control and run-off collisions especially by heavy goods vehicles, is nearly complete. Realignment of Bonje area, grade separation works at Gitaru – Rungiri and reconfiguration of Coptic Roundabout along Kisumu – Kakamega highway, are all ongoing.

To aid in addressing hazardous locations, KeNHA is currently developing Black Spot Management Guidelines anchored in the Safe System Approach. The Guidelines will harmonize the process of identification of black spots through robust crash data analysis and investigation, development of countermeasures through to implementation, and monitoring and evaluation to assess effectiveness of the interventions.

PRIORITY 4: ROAD INFRASTRUCTURE SAFETY

Priority 4 aims at ensuring safe road design and engineering to prevent crashes and reduce injury severity through upgraded infrastructure, regular audits, and capacity enhancement. This was planned to be realized through comprehensive interventions in high-risk corridors, Road Safety engineering capacity building, safe road design and management, road safety assessment and investment, road safety audits, development of urban street manuals and establishment of road safety stations. The following were achieved in the last one year;

- Comprehensive interventions in high-risk corridors

KeNHA, has instituted interventions to address high risk areas particularly those involving vulnerable road users. Along the Northern Corridor, the Greenpark Underpass at the intersection between Uhuru Highway and Haile Selassie Avenue, and pedestrian footbridges at Katani Road Junction, Syokimau Railway Station and Airtel, are all at advanced stages of completion.

KURA is also working on a long term solution to the modal conflicts along Outer Ring Road is being implemented through construction of 13 footbridges with pedestrian fencing along the BRT corridor.

Additionally, the proposed dualing and capacity enhancement of Rironi – Nakuru – Mau Summit is expected to significantly address road safety hazards on one of Kenya's busiest highways. Other notable projects currently ongoing along high-risk corridors include dualing of Kwa Jomvu – Mariakani, capacity enhancement of Nyali – Mtwapa – Kilifi and upgrading of Kitale – Moropus along the Kenya – South Sudan Link Road.

Existing roads have been placed under Performance Based Contracting maintenance to attend to routine maintenance needs including road signage, high-visibility lane markings, safety fences, reflective elements for night-time visibility and speed management features such as rumble strips

- Road Safety engineering capacity building

To enhance road safety engineering capacity, Road Safety has been integrated into Annual Training Plans and contract requirements in Road Safety Agencies. Further, several staff in road agencies have been trained on Road Safety Auditing and iRAP Star Rating mainly supported under EU Usalama Barabarani Project. This will be further enhanced as the various agencies continue to implement the Action Plan.

- Safe road design and management

To improve on infrastructure safety, the Kenya Road Design Manuals, including Road Safety Audit Module have been updated. In addition, Blackspot Management Guidelines and Design Guidelines for NMT, Work Zone Safety Audits, and Accident are currently under development.

- Road safety assessment and investment

All new road designs now incorporate safety considerations including pedestrian walks, crossings and

other safety infrastructure following the implementation of the finding of the road safety audits. Some of the investments in national infrastructure informed by road safety audits and assessments include:

- o Pedestrian walkways constructed; school zones upgraded for child safety.
- o Blackspots redesigned with road safety features (e.g., barriers, signage, lighting).
- o Speed calming measures (rumble strips, humps, signage) implemented and maintained across multiple high-risk areas.
- o Street lighting integrated in new roads in urban centers as per policy; existing lights continuously maintained.
- o Road reserve/right of way cleared and maintained, damaged road furniture replaced.

For existing roads, integration of safety audit recommendations is underway across national and county roads as earlier detailed.

Institutional Reforms & Policy Progress

To improve road safety institutions, National Road Stations and Amenities Policy guidelines have been completed by the Ministry of Roads and Transport. These guidelines will inform the development of road side stations – areas critical for ensuring that motorists get the desired rest to address fatigue that has been identified as a safety risk factor.

PRIORITY 5: VEHICLE SAFETY STANDARDS

Priority 5 targets improvement of vehicle standards, compliance and it addresses the pillar of safer vehicles. This priority area envisages all vehicles operating on Kenyan roads meeting minimum safety and environmental standards throughout their lifecycle, thereby preventing road crashes, fatalities, and emissions.

Towards this end, several positive steps have been made including:

Vehicle safety standards programme

To improve on the safety standards of the vehicles imported into the country, the Kenya Bureau of Standards (KEBS) implements Pre-Export Verification of Conformity (PVO) for used vehicle imports from major supply countries like Japan, UK, UAE, and others. For vehicles arriving without pre-inspection, Destination Inspection (DI) inspections are conducted at the Port of Entry. KEBS issues the Certificate of Roadworthiness (COR) before customs clearance.

Besides, KEBS and NTSA undertake vehicle inspection checks that include compliance with KS 1515:2019 radiation levels, odometer integrity, and EV battery life. KEBS has also reviewed the KS 1515 to include emerging technologies like electric and hybrid vehicles (DKS 1515:2025).

In addition, NTSA licenses and supervises body builders in line with KS 372:2019 (Standard for building Passenger Body Vehicles) to ensure that locally built passenger vehicle bodies meet the required safety standards.

Standardization and Capacity Building

KEBS has developed over 35 standards to enhance vehicle safety, including speed limiters, underrun protection, telematics, road markings, visibility, EVs among others.

Policy and Regulatory Milestones

To strengthen compliance to road safety requirements, Motor Vehicle Inspection Regulations, 2025 has been developed and are awaiting publication. These regulations will not only improve motor vehicle inspection but also expand to private motor vehicles as provided in the Traffic Act.

PRIORITY 6: ENFORCEMENT TARGETING UNSAFE BEHAVIOUR AND EDUCATION

Risky and unsafe road user behaviors have been identified as major causes of road traffic crashes and Priority 6 seeks to address this through enforcement. This priority aims at reducing road traffic crashes, fatalities, and serious injuries by strengthening the enforcement of traffic laws targeting high-risk behaviors, while enhancing road user awareness and behavior change through sustained education and public engagement campaigns.

Over the past one year, a number of achievements have been realized. These include:

Automation of speed enforcement

In recognition of speed as a major risk factor, a project on automation of speed management is ongoing. The implementation of this project will involve the use of smart speed cameras to detect speed infractions and sanction violators through instant fines.

Driver Testing Automation

To enhance the competency of drivers, a study on automation of Driver Testing including re-testing has been completed. This has informed a proposal to mobilize funds for automation of driver testing in Kenya which is expected to influence the quality of drivers that end up getting licensed to drive on the Kenyan roads.

Implementation of Safe System Curriculum in Schools

As a sustainable strategy to change road use culture, NTSA with the support of European Union and working with

Kenya Institute of Curriculum Development (KICD) has completed a project on integration of road safety into school curriculum (from Pre-primary 1 – Grade 12) and was rolled from January 2025.

Safe Environment and trips in Schools

To ensure safer school environment and trips, Schools Transport Regulations (2025) have been developed and are awaiting publication. These regulations not only specify the standards of school vehicles but also govern the way school transport is operated with the aim of avoiding safety risks thereby promoting safety of learners.

Joint Enforcement, Public Education and Sensitizations

The NPS and NTSA continuously undertake joint enforcement on the roads to deter potential violations against the Traffic Act and other Road Safety Regulations. In addition, these and other government agencies undertake public education and sensitizations individually and in collaboration with each other.

Since the launch of the Action Plan, for example, NPS has, between January and August 2025 sensitized 6,659 Drivers, 18,176 Motorcyclists, 10,446 Conductors, 4,391 Passengers, 336 Pillion Passengers, 1,527 Pedal Cyclists, 6,040 Pedestrians, 5,051 Pupils, 29,618 Students, 1,687 Teachers, and 28 PSV Sacco Officials, among others.

Continuous regulatory enforcement

The NTSA undertakes continuous regulatory enforcement targeting violating drivers, transport saccos and Speed limiters. Through this strategy, many public transport operators and drivers/conductors have been sanctioned through compliance orders, suspensions of Sacco operations, suspensions of driving licenses among others.

Policy and Regulatory Milestones

As a way of dealing with the challenge of driving under the influence of alcohol, another major risk behavior, Traffic (Drink Driving) Regulations, 2025, has also been developed and are awaiting publication. These regulations will improve enforcement against drink-driving.

PRIORITY 7: POST-CRASH SERVICES

Priority 7 of the National Road Safety Action Plan seeks to realize a strong system of emergency response to minimize the severity of road crash outcomes through improved emergency care, timely rescue operations, trauma care infrastructure and coordinated multi-agency interventions across the entire crash management continuum. Some of the achievements on this priority area include:

Post-Crash Investment in High-Risk Corridors

Through the Ministry of Health and County Governments, Trauma framework implementation is ongoing across 17,000 health facilities in 47 counties that includes establishment of Trauma Teams. In addition, 381 critical care facilities are operational with approximately 1,095 ICU beds (adult and pediatric).

Efforts by several governmental and non-governmental organizations in training communities as first responders is also acknowledged. Specifically, Kenya Medical Training College in collaboration with the Nairobi City County and NTSA has trained over 12,000 boda boda riders across the country as first responders. This will ensure that crashes that happen within areas where these responders operate receive first aid that could save victim lives.

Access to Emergency Medicines and Ambulance Evacuation

The Ministry has revised the 2024 Essential Drug List to include emergency, trauma, and critical care medicines. This will ensure that those seeking emergency care as a result of Road Traffic Crashes access essential medicines. The Government also supports and collaborates closely with major ambulance service providers such as Red Cross and St. Johns Ambulance.

In addition, the Government through the Kenya Medical Practitioners and Dentist Council (KMPDC) is currently taking an inventory of ambulance service providers and ambulances they operate with a view of improving emergency response networks and systems.

Corridor-Specific Post-Crash Investments

The Government is also constructing a Trauma Center in Sagana under Kenol-Sagana-Marua Road project. This will include equipping select county facilities with emergency response tools, including ambulances.

PRIORITY 8: ROAD SAFETY DATABASE, MONITORING AND EVALUATION SYSTEMS

In recognition of the role of accurate and complete data in designing cost effective and high impact road safety strategies, The National Road Safety Action Plan in Priority 8 seeks to establish a reliable, integrated, and multi-agency road safety data system.

Towards this end, the Government of Kenya through JICA is currently implementing a project that involves a collaborative establishment of a crash data system that will be domiciled at the National Police Service. This project will involve strengthening data handling protocols, investment in crash data software, and re-training and capacity building of all Officers involved in data line analytics.

This crash database system will undoubtedly enhance the understanding of the contributing variables to accidents, such as speeding, drunk driving, and mechanical flaws, and eventually help drive evidence-based treatments and enforcement. Improving multi-agency collaboration via a coordinated strategy and standardized processes requires no further emphasis, and NPS shall sustain this pursuit among many other ongoing interventions.

As all Agencies continue to implement the National Road Safety Action Plan, all road users are expected to play their part as **ROAD SAFETY IS A SHARED RESPONSIBILITY**.



Subsidized fertilizer for tea farmers to arrive in October

The first consignment of 99,000 metric tonnes of NPK fertilizer procured by the Kenya Tea Development Agency (KTDA) for its managed tea processing factories is set to arrive in the country in October. In a notice published on its website, KTDA's Acting Head of Procurement and Logistics, Peter Mungai, confirmed that the agency had finalized the importation process. The fertilizer's composition ratio is 26 (Nitrogen): 5 (Phosphorus): 5 (Potassium). "KTDA Management Services Limited has finalized the process of importing 99,875 metric tonnes of bagged fertilizer for its managed tea processing factories. The first consignment is expected to arrive in early October or thereabout," reads the notice. This year's consignment of Nitrogen, Phosphorus, and Potassium (NPK) fertilizer is estimated at 1.9 million 50-kilogram bags. The purchase is 2,887 metric tonnes more than what the agency procured during the 2024 growing season, when 97,000 metric tonnes were imported from Russia through competitive international bidding. According to the notice, KTDA is now working on the modalities to ensure deliv-

ery of the fertilizer to more than 69 factories across the 16 tea-growing counties.

Further, the agency says that it has approved a payment rate of Sh15.57 per tonne, per kilometre for transporters delivering the input to factories in Zone A (the South Rift region Bomet,) and Sh 11.92 57 per tonne, per kilometre for transporters who will deliver the fertilizer to factories in Zone B (East of the Rift) and C (West of the Rift).

In order to qualify, trans-

porters will be required to have trucks that have a carrying capacity of more than 15 tonnes and be registered to a citizen or under a Kenyan company name. The trucks must also be compliant with all government requirements on commercial motor vehicles such as third-party insurance cover, have a vehicle tracking device and a speed governor.

Transporters who participated in the tender and are willing to accept this

offer are hereby invited to collect and sign contract documents from the office of the Head of Field Services and Agriculture, "says the notice.

The agency has been procuring fertilizer in bulk for smallholder tea farmers who deliver green leaf to KTDA managed factories. This arrangement ensures that the farmers have access to high quality fertilizer at competitive prices and in a reliable manner.

Government rallies support for local electric bus industry

The Government has reaffirmed its commitment to supporting local vehicle manufacturers as it accelerates the country's transition to electric mobility in a bid to build a sustainable transport system.

Investment, Trade and Industry Cabinet Secretary Lee Kinyanjui said the transition will cut the over reliance on petroleum imports noting that petroleum remains the single largest

import at the national level. Speaking in Thika during the signing of a strategic partnership between Kenya Vehicle Manufacturers (KVM) and electric mobility firm BasiGo, Kinyanjui said the government has rolled out an automotive policy that gives preferential treatment to locally assembled vehicles.

He added that fully imported vehicles will attract higher taxes, while locally assembled ones will benefit from incentives to spur subsidiary industries that

10,000 households in Wote town to benefit from water projects

Sh15 million digital X-Ray boosts Narok healthcare

The Narok County Government has received a major boost to its health services after the US President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR) donated an Artificial Intelligence (AI)-enabled digital X-ray machine.

The Sh15 million equipment was donated through the Henry Jackson Foundation for Medical Research International (HJFMR), South Rift program. The machine is expected to improve the diagnosis of chest-related illnesses, enabling faster and more accurate results.

Narok County's CECM for Health, Antony Namunkuk, said the portable diagnostic unit will significantly enhance early detection and treatment. He noted that it will go a long way in improving healthcare by bringing quick and accurate services closer to the people.
