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

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
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State to build 30 sports academies, 22 new stadia

The government is expanding sports infrastructure across the country in an effort to support young talent, President William Ruto said.

The President said the government is also setting up 30 sports academies and an additional 22 stadia.

These initiatives, he said, will give talented Kenyans an opportunity to nurture their skills and thrive on the global stage.

"My administration is deeply committed to nurturing talent and unlocking opportunity for our youth. We are investing in sports academies, community facilities, and the creative economy because we know that sports is not only about competition, but also about empowerment, unity, and national pride," President Ruto explained.

The President made the remarks at State House, Nairobi, during a ceremony to mark the arrival of the English Premier League Trophy in Kenya.

He said the trophy should remind Kenyans that the country's love for football is boundless and, with teamwork, resilience, and purpose, greatness is within reach.

"As the Premier League Trophy begins its Kenyan tour during the Guinness Matchday Weekend, I invite all Kenyans to come out and celebrate this historic mo-

ment," he said.

The President noted that football runs deep in Kenya's national story, recalling the dazzling brilliance of the late Joe Kadenge, Victor Wanyama, who flew the national flag in the English Premier League, and McDonald Mariga, the first Kenyan to win

the UEFA Champions League.

"These are men who inspired generations and reminded us that Kenyan talent belongs on the world stage," he said.

President Ruto commended the East African Breweries Ltd (EABL) for championing talent in the country by supporting various sports.

Kisumu Port records surge in cargo volumes after major infrastructure improvements

Kisumu Port has recorded a sharp rise in cargo volumes following major government-backed infrastructure upgrades, reinforcing its position as a key hub for East Africa's inland trade.

According to the Port Manager for Cargo Services, Patrick Makau, cargo volumes at the facility have increased from 127,000 metric tonnes in 2023 to 281,000 metric tonnes in 2024, and further to 324,000 metric tonnes by the end of September this year.

He said the figure is projected to reach 400,000 metric tonnes by December – the highest since the port was refurbished and reopened in 2019.

Speaking during the reception of a new vessel, MV Mpungu, at the port, Makau said the Kenya Ports Authority (KPA) remains committed to sustaining the growth momentum through continued investment in infrastructure to attract more vessels and enhance efficiency.

He noted that top on the agenda was dredging the port to allow larger ships to dock,

as well as promoting multimodal transport that integrates lake, road, and rail networks for seamless cargo movement across the region.

"We are committed to supporting regional trade expansion



through ongoing infrastructure upgrades, aiming to meet the rising demand and unlock new opportunities across the lake region," said Makau.

The arrival of MV Mpungu, a 96-metre-long cargo vessel from

Uganda, marks a new chapter in East Africa's inland shipping.

Operated by Grindrod Logistics Africa under East Africa Marine Transport (EAMT), the vessel made its maiden call to Kisumu to load cargo destined for Port Bell and Jinja in Uganda.

Its arrival was marked by a brief ceremony attended by KPA officials and representatives from Express Shipping & Logistics (EA) Ltd. MV Mpungu Captain Obedi Nkongoki, who was presented with a certificate of call and a commemorative plaque, praised Kisumu's strategic role in regional trade, saying the vessel would make regular calls to ports across Lake Victoria.

"Kisumu is a key hub for unlocking trade potential in the region and we look forward to making regular calls here and to other ports around the lake," he said. Commissioned on January 31, 2025, MV Mpungu has a cargo capacity of 1,000 tonnes, equivalent to 22 trucks, and features a roll-on/roll-off design that allows efficient loading and unloading of wheeled cargo such as trucks and trailers.

Capt. Nkongoki said by taking 22 trucks off East African roads per trip, the vessel would play a crucial role in preserving road infrastructure and saving governments huge repair costs.

The ship is expected to transport goods including tiles, excavators, plant machinery, and aluminum, complementing its operations on the Port Bell-Mwanza route.

State rolls out NYOTA programme to empower young entrepreneurs

The Government has reaffirmed its commitment to empowering young people through the newly launched NYOTA Business Support Programme, a nationwide initiative offering non-refundable grants of Sh50,000 to help youth start or expand their businesses.

The programme aims to promote self-employment, entrepreneurship, and innovation among young people as part of the government's strategy to reduce unemployment and stimulate economic growth at the grassroots level.

Cabinet Secretary for Cooperatives and Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) Development, Wycliffe Oparanya, said the government is determined to support the youth with both financial and technical assistance to help them build sustainable livelihoods.

He clarified that the Sh50,000 issued to each beneficiary is a grant, not a loan, emphasizing that the funds are meant to empower young people to venture into productive business activities without the burden of repayment.

"The Sh50,000 is not a loan; it is a grant that gives young people a foundation to grow their businesses. We have put in place systems to ensure the money is used for the intended purpose,

and we are committed to guiding the beneficiaries throughout the process," said Oparanya.

He explained that the NYOTA program is one of the key government efforts aimed at nurturing a generation of responsible and creative entrepreneurs who can transform local economies.

Additionally, Oparanya noted that the government has designed the initiative to reach youth from all parts of the country, giving equal opportunities to those with genuine business ideas and the drive to succeed.

To ensure transparency and accountability, the CS revealed

that chiefs and assistant chiefs in all counties have been trained to oversee the progress of beneficiaries at the community level and submit monthly reports to track business performance. These reports will help the ministry monitor the proper utilization of funds and ensure the success of the program.

He added that involving local administrators ensures that funds are used appropriately and that the program remains transparent from start to finish.

Oparanya also disclosed that the NYOTA program includes a savings component to help young entrepreneurs cultivate

financial discipline. Beneficiaries will be required to save a portion of their business earnings, with access to the accumulated savings depending on compliance with the program's requirements.

"The saving element will help create discipline. It ensures that young entrepreneurs understand the value of consistency, patience, and accountability in business. This is how we build a generation that can manage money wisely," he emphasized.

The programme will also include training and mentorship to equip beneficiaries with practical business knowledge. Oparanya revealed that the government is partnering with experienced entrepreneurs and professionals who will mentor the beneficiaries for several months after their training.

"The goal is not just to provide money but to build capacity and create a network of successful young business owners," he said.

The CS, further, clarified that having a Hustler Fund loan does not disqualify an applicant from receiving the NYOTA grant.

He emphasized that the two programs are independent but complementary in supporting small enterprises. However, he urged the youth to maintain good credit behavior, saying responsible borrowing and repayment are important in entrepreneurship. "We are not disqualifying anyone because

they have a Hustler Fund loan, but we encourage them to be responsible. Paying debts and maintaining good records builds trust and discipline, which are vital in business," he added.

Oparanya assured Kenyans that the NYOTA programme is free from political interference, noting that all applications were submitted digitally by youth themselves using a system that allows access even without the internet. This, he said, promotes fairness, accessibility, and inclusivity across the country.

He encouraged beneficiaries to invest in their home areas to create jobs and drive economic growth within local communities, stating that sustainable development begins at the grassroots level.

"The government believes that supporting young people to establish businesses in their home constituencies will have a lasting economic impact," Oparanya said.

He reaffirmed the government's focus on empowering youth as a key driver of national growth, saying initiatives like NYOTA are designed to unlock Kenya's demographic potential. The CS added that similar programs will be developed to support different categories of youth, including graduates, innovators, and small-scale producers.

In her remarks, Principal Secretary (PS) for MSME Development Susan Mang'eni revealed that more than 200,000 youth applied for the NYOTA program during the application phase, with a significant number coming from universities and tertiary institutions.

Drought hit Marsabit benefit from national livestock restocking drive

The Government has distributed 100 camels to vulnerable households in Kargi, Marsabit County, under the ongoing livestock restocking programme spearheaded by the State Department for ASALs and Regional Development through the National Drought Man-

agement Authority (NDMA). The initiative, launched in September in Butiye Ward of Moyale Constituency, Marsabit County, saw another 100 camels distributed, marking the first tranche of a countywide plan that will deliver a total of 400 camels across four constituencies. Implemented in line with a directive from President William

Ruto, the restocking programme aims to rebuild livelihoods and strengthen resilience among pastoral households affected by recurrent droughts across Kenya's arid and semi-arid lands (ASALs).

Speaking during the event, Principal Secretary for the ASALs and Regional Development, Mr. Kello Harsama, un-

derscored the Government's commitment to restoring the dignity and livelihoods of pastoral communities through sustainable recovery programmes.

"In the ASALs, livestock is not only a source of income but a way of life. Through this restocking programme, we are restoring hope, rebuilding livelihoods, and enhancing resilience in line with the government bottom-up economic transformation agenda (BETA)," said PS Harsama.

Coordinated by NDMA, the programme is being rolled out across several ASALs counties to support households that lost livestock during previous droughts. It aims to strengthen food security, boost household incomes, and enhance the adaptive capacity of pastoral families to withstand future climate shocks. According to a bulletin from NDMA, although many ASALs counties are currently classified under the "Normal" drought phase, the effects of prior shocks remain severe: approximately two million people remain food-insecure, while about 850,000 children under five years and over 120,000 pregnant and breastfeeding women require acute nutrition support. NDMA notes that the restocking initiative is part of a holistic resilience-building framework that

includes water infrastructure rehabilitation, pipeline extension, irrigation expansion, livestock value-chain development, and early-warning systems—all aimed at restoring livelihoods and promoting long-term climate adaptation.

To support these interventions, the government has allocated funds for restocking and drought-recovery efforts across the 23 ASALs counties demonstrating its commitment to the bottom-up economic transformation agenda (BETA) and to revitalising pastoral economies.

"We are committed to ensuring no one is left behind as we work to transform livelihoods in our arid and semi-arid lands. This is about restoring dignity and resilience, one animal at a time," PS Harsama added.

In Marsabit, the Camel distributions in Kargi and Butiye mark significant steps in the County's recovery efforts following recent droughts that decimated herds and severely disrupted livelihoods.

Laisamis Member of Parliament, Joseph Lekuton, hailed the initiative as timely, noting that it directly supports households hardest hit by drought. He called for continued Government investment in drought mitigation, sustainable range-land management, and support for pastoral economies.

Chuka community celebrates launch of the Bible in local dialect


The Chuka community in Tharaka Nithi County celebrated a historic milestone with the launch of the Gichuka New Testament Bible, marking the first time the word of God has been made available in their local dialect.

The colourful event, held at Chuka Picnic Grounds, brought together clergy, faithful, and community leaders who hailed the translation as a spiritual and cultural breakthrough

for the Gichuka-speaking people, a sub-group of the Meru community.

Speaking during the launch, Bible Translation and Literacy (BTL) Board Chairperson Kendi Ogamba described the day as momentous, saying that translating scripture into the Gichuka language will strengthen faith within the community and deepen their understanding of the gospel.

"Listening to God's word in your own language speaks directly to the heart. This is a spe-

cial day for the people of Chuka, and we thank God that His word can now be read and understood in words that are familiar and dear to us," emphasized Ms Ogamba.

She noted that despite the successful translation of New Testament, BTL has embarked on translating the Old Testament to ensure the entire Bible is available in Gichuka language. The Moderator of the 24th General Assembly, Reverend Mutahi Thegu, commended BTL for its commitment to pre-

serving indigenous languages through scripture translation, adding that the project would promote unity and spiritual growth among believers.

"This translation will not only deepen our faith but also help preserve the Gichuka language for future generations. The Bible has strengthened our identity as believers," said Reverend Thegu.

Ms Rebeca Kagendo, a resident, expressed gratitude to BTL, saying the translation will make the scripture more relatable.

Over 29,000 youth register for NYOTA project in Kisii County

More than 29,000 youth across Kisii County have registered for the National Youth Opportunities Towards Advancement (NYOTA) Project, State Department for Broadcasting and Telecommunications Principal Secretary Stephen Isaboke has said.

The NYOTA initiative aims to empower young people through entrepreneurship, training, and financial support.

Speaking during a verification exercise at Kisii National Polytechnic on the outskirts of Kisii town, Mr. Isaboke noted that the high number of registrations followed a successful sensitisation drive conducted two weeks earlier, during which youth were

encouraged to sign up online via the USSD code *254#.

"The response has been overwhelming. We have recorded 804,000 registrations nationwide, with Kisii County accounting for about 29,979 applicants," Mr. Isaboke said.

The PS explained that the ongoing validation exercise was crucial in ensuring that beneficiaries are genuine, locally distributed, and meet the project's eligibility criteria.

"Applicants are required to present their National Identity Cards (IDs) for authentication and answer a few questions to confirm their eligibility and commitment to the project," Isaboke added.

After verification, applicants will be required to take the Entrepreneurship Aptitude Test (EAT) as a mandatory require-

ment for the final selection, to assess their business potential and readiness for self-employment.

Isaboke said the government had allocated Sh20 billion for the Nyota Project and the first Sh5 billion has been released for Phase One, with subsequent disbursements to follow.

After the screening, 3150 successful applicants in Kisii will receive a Sh50,000 grant each to start and expand small businesses.

"This initiative is not just about money but about building a culture of entrepreneurship and resilience among our young people," said the Principal Secretary.

Isaboke added the huge turnout and enthusiasm reflects the youth's readiness to embrace opportunities for economic empowerment.

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New policy to safeguard rights of marginalized groups in Kenya

The State has announced that the Ethnic Minorities and Marginalized Communities Bill, 2025, together with the Draft Policy on Minorities, will establish a legal framework to guarantee the protection of the rights of minority and marginalized groups, as enshrined in the Constitution of Kenya. Mr. Abdi Kahiya, Director of Governance within the Minorities and Marginalized Affairs Unit (MMAU) in the Office of the President, said that although Article 56 of the Constitution recognizes these groups, there is currently no guiding legislation or policy to implement these constitutional provisions.

"Despite efforts by various lobbies and advocacy groups at both national and county levels, the absence of a structured framework remains a major setback to fair treatment and inclusion," said Mr. Kahiya.

Speaking during a public participation exercise at the Narok County Commissioner's office, where institutions and organisations submitted comments on the two documents, Kahiya emphasized the government's commitment to advancing the rights and welfare of special interest groups.

He said strengthening legal and policy structures is crucial to ensuring equity, inclusion, and social justice for all

Kenyans.

Mr. Kahiya expressed confidence that the public participation forums would generate actionable recommendations to guide legislative reforms and policy interventions aimed at safeguarding marginalized communities' rights nationwide.

The Office of the Chief of Staff and Head of Public Service, through MMAU and a Technical Working Committee, developed the Draft Policy and Bill on ethnic minorities. Mr. Kahiya said these documents seek to shift Kenya's development trajectory from historical exclusion to equitable inclusion, recognizing that sustainable growth and national cohesion depend on the full participation of all communities.

He noted that, although Kenya has made progress in some areas, serious challenges persist, especially in land ownership and resource distribution, issues the new Bill and Policy aim to address if approved.

He affirmed that the new framework will provide a structured approach to tackling challenges related to access to resources, representation, and socio-economic inclusion.

Mr. Lodoi also reiterated the government's commitment to cultural inclusion, explaining that the proposed statute will preserve and promote the cultural values, languages, and practices of these communities.

The Bill and Policy will also ensure reasonable access to essential services such as water.

Principal Secretary for the State Department for Science, Research and Innovation, Prof. Shaukat Abdulrazak, speaking during a capacity-building workshop for Young Scientists in Africa held in Nairobi, said the initiative continues to strengthen the fabric of global science through inclusive, equitable, and transformative capacity-building efforts.

Lewa wildlife conservancy drives climate-smart agriculture to boost food security

Lewa Wildlife Conservancy has intensified its efforts to promote sustainable agriculture through a comprehensive Climate-Smart Agriculture (CSA) programme aimed at enhancing resilience and food security.

Located in northern Kenya on the Laikipia Plateau in Meru County, bordering Laikipia and Isiolo counties, the conservancy's programme is designed to equip farmers with practical knowledge and tools to adapt to erratic weather patterns and declining soil productivity.

Speaking during a farmers' field day at Munda Primary School in Buuri East Sub-County, Meru County, Chief Programmes and Partnerships Officer John Kinoti noted that the initiative goes beyond farming techniques, involving both herders and farmers in knowledge-sharing to ensure food security within conservation areas.

Kinoti emphasized that agribusiness is key to survival given the scarcity of resources such as water, noting

that it generates more income compared to conventional farming methods.

He said Lewa has mobilized more than 8,000 farmers, with tangible results already emerging.

"The adoption of CSA practices has led to increased yields, including the production of approximately 20 tons of onions. The programme also facilitates market linkages and post-harvest handling, ensuring farmers can store and sell their produce effectively," said Kinoti.

He added that through the field days, stakeholders in pesticide production, irrigation systems, and organic farming have been connected directly with local farming groups for future interactions and advice.

"As Lewa Wildlife Conservancy, we are reaffirming our commit-

ment to community-led development and environmental stewardship, positioning the CSA program as a model for climate adaptation and sustainable agriculture in Kenya," said Kinoti.

Head of Community Development Programmes at the conservancy Lawrence Riungu, emphasized the urgency of the intervention, saying that farmers have long relied on rainfall, but with changing climate conditions, water is becoming scarce and crops are failing.

"We are teaching conservation agriculture techniques such as drip irrigation and soil testing to help them produce more with less," he said.

According to Riungu, the CSA programme promotes a wide range of technologies including soil health management, water harvesting, integrated pest management and the use of certified seeds.

Farmers are also being introduced to renewable energy solutions, such as biogas and solar power, alongside improved fodder varieties including Brachiaria grass, super napier, and Juanca grass.

Public universities, NGO roll out green jobs initiative to tackle youth joblessness

Fifteen public universities have partnered with Jacob's Ladder to launch an ambitious five-year initiative to prepare Kenyan youth for the green economy, making its second stop at Taita Taveta University as part of a nationwide campaign to address the country's deepening youth unemployment crisis.

The Green Careers Caravan, launched through the Vice-Chancellors' Committee and the State Department of Higher Education and Research, aims to directly engage over 150,000 young people across 42 public universities by 2030.

The initiative comes at a critical time when nearly 12 percent of the youthful workforce and more than 31 percent of the 10 million youth in the labour force are either unemployed or under-employed.

Speaking at the event, Sellah Bogonko, Co-Founder and CEO of Jacob's Ladder Africa, emphasized the urgency of converting Africa's demographic potential into tangible outcomes.

"We are witnessing a historic convergence of Africa's demographic dividend and the global green transition. But potential alone is a passive promise. Only when our young people are fully aware of opportunities, educated in relevant skills, empowered through access and networks, ethical in their approach, entrepreneurial

in their mindset and operating within systems that actually work for them, they will transform into the active builders, innovators, and leaders that will turn Africa's promise into the world's best story of transformation," Bogonko said.

The transition to a green economy offers significant hope across Africa, with the shift potentially generating 3.3 million jobs by 2030 in renewable energy, e-mobility, construction, manufacturing, and sustainable agriculture.

The caravan is designed to help students understand and access these emerging opportunities through inspiration sessions, innovation pitches, and debates on critical environmental challenges.

Professor Christine Onyango, Acting Vice Chancellor of Taita Taveta University, highlighted the institution's pioneering role in integrating environmental sustainability with economic opportunity. The university, known as the home of ideas with a niche in mining and engineering, has established the Center of Excellence for Mining Environment and Natural Resource Management under a German-Kenya project funded by DAAD.

"Mining engineering happens in the environment, and when we think about green, we think about the environment," Professor Onyango explained.

She stated how the university has developed programs to address environmental destruction caused by mining, including a Master of Science in Engineering Environmental Reengineering focused on rehabilitating land damaged by

artisanal miners.

The university has also created innovative sustainability programs including SUMEWA, an initiative that uses solar energy to recycle mining water and make it safe for human consumption, and a biogas system that converts kitchen waste into cooking fuel.

These practical applications of circular economy principles are complemented by academic programs such as an MBA in Natural Resource Management and climate-smart agriculture initiatives.

Noting the university's

comprehensive approach to environmental restoration and sustainable resource management, Professor Onyango emphasized that Taita Taveta's approach extends beyond reforestation stating that, "Planting trees is one thing, but taking back the soil so that you can support plant growth and other activities of human nature is important."

Shedrack Mutungi, County Executive Committee Member for the Department of Youth Affairs, Sports, Gender and Social Services, pledged the county government's full support for the initiative.

He revealed that the county has passed the Poverty Alleviation and Empowerment Act, which will allocate 5 percent of the county's total budget every financial year to youth empow-

erment programs, including green economy initiatives.

"The current government is committed to ensure that the youths are able to get job opportunities and investment opportunities within the county," Mutungi said, urging students to remain patient and entrepreneurial while avoiding get-rich-quick schemes.

The Green Careers Caravan, which began at Kisii University, will extend to thirteen more universities during the first half of 2026 before scaling to all 42 public universities across Kenya over the next five years.

The program then plans to expand to one new African region each year, delivering more than 150 university activations continent-wide.

Mudavadi leads call for digital shift in Kenya's agriculture sector

The Government is championing a tech-powered revolution in agriculture—one where data drives decisions and innovation feeds the nation.

Speaking during the fifth National Agribusiness Summit in Nairobi, where he presided over the National Agribusiness Excellence Awards, Prime Cabinet Secretary Musalia Mudavadi emphasized that agriculture must evolve from subsistence to enterprise, driven by digital ecosystems and smart partnerships.

"The future of agriculture is digital, intelligent, and interconnected. We must invest in

systems that make every farmer visible, reachable, and supported," he said.

Mudavadi outlined the Government's efforts—through the Ministry of Agriculture and allied institutions—to develop integrated digital platforms aimed at streamlining service delivery.

These include farmer registration, e-extension services, access to digital inputs, and real-time market intelligence.

He urged counties to align with national systems such as the Kenya Integrated Agricultural Management Information System and the National Farmer Registration System, noting that credible data is essential for

effective planning and equitable resource allocation.

The PCS stressed that agricultural transformation cannot be achieved by government alone. He called on the private sector to lead in investment, processing, and logistics, while encouraging development part-

ners to continue supporting financing, capacity building, and knowledge exchange.

"True change happens at the grassroots. County governments must be empowered to implement locally responsive programmes," he added.

Mudavadi reaffirmed the

Government's commitment to bridging the gap between policy and practice, ensuring that initiatives are aligned, transparent, and results-oriented.

Highlighting the role of innovation hubs and incubators, Mudavadi said youth-led start-ups and agri-tech innovators must be linked to public programmes, financial institutions, and investors ready to scale transformative ideas.

He also decried the export of raw produce only to import processed goods at a premium, calling it a drain on national wealth and a missed opportunity for job creation.

"We are promoting local manufacturing and agro-processing to retain value within our borders. By investing in cottage industries, cold storage, and agro-industrial parks, we are creating sustainable jobs—especially for women and youth," he said.

Mother of five makes history with successful heart-chest operation at Jaramogi Hospital

A mother of five has become the first patient in Western Kenya to undergo a successful cardiothoracic surgery at the Jaramogi Oginga Odinga Teaching and Referral Hospital (JOOTRH), marking a historic milestone in the region's medical advancement. Christine Awino Onyango, a 41-year-old vegetable vendor from Kisumu, underwent an esophagectomy — a complex procedure involving the removal of part of the esophagus to treat Stage II esophageal cancer.

The surgery was conducted by a newly reinstated team of cardiothoracic and vascular surgeons led by Dr. Robert Sadia and Dr. Juma Odoro, who returned to the hospital earlier this month after completing five years of

specialized training.

Awino, who is now 12 days post-operation, has made remarkable progress and is set to be discharged.

"God has brought me this far. I just want to thank Dr. Sadia and his team for taking their time with me. I am now feeling much better," she said from her hospital bed, her voice soft and hopeful.

Her ordeal began with persistent pain when swallowing, followed by vomiting small amounts of food.

After initial treatment at Kisumu County Referral Hospital failed to ease her condition, further tests at JOOTRH revealed she had esophageal cancer.

"I was not afraid," she said. "Once sickness sets in, one just needs to find a way of getting treatment."

The successful procedure represents a major breakthrough for the

Lake Region Economic Bloc (LREB), which has long lacked facilities capable of performing such delicate operations.

It also sets the stage for the upcoming launch of JOOTRH's Heart Surgery Unit, expected to serve millions across Western Kenya and beyond.

Dr. Sadia described the surgery as a milestone in improving access to specialized healthcare in Nyanza and Western regions.

"An esophagectomy offers the best chance of controlling esophageal cancer and prolonging life. This success shows that patients in this region no longer have to travel to Nairobi or Eldoret for such advanced procedures," he said.

Esophageal cancer remains one of Kenya's deadliest diseases.

According to the Kenya National Cancer Registry, more than

2,000 new cases are diagnosed annually, with the country ranked among the top five globally in prevalence. The disease is especially common in the western and rift valley regions, where diets high in fermented foods and delayed diagnosis contributes to its high burden.

Until now, patients requiring esophagectomy had to seek treatment at Kenyatta National Hospital (Nairobi), Moi Teaching and Referral Hospital (Eldoret), or occasionally travel abroad—journeys that are both financially and emotionally draining for most families.

The introduction of cardiothoracic surgery at JOOTRH, therefore, offers hope for thousands who previously faced long waits and high costs.

The hospital's oncology department notes that esophageal cancer is the second most common cancer treated at JOOTRH.

KARO pushes for affordable health insurance and better benefits for retirees

The Kenya Association of Retired Officers (KARO) has ramped up its advocacy for better healthcare coverage and improved welfare for retired public servants.

KARO Nairobi Branch Chairman, Mr. Ahmed Hussein, highlighted the association's ongoing efforts to ensure retirees are adequately supported in their post-service years.

Hussein pointed out that while the current medical cover for KARO members is provided through Kenbright Brokers with AAR Insurance managing the 2024/2025 plan, there are still significant gaps in the healthcare coverage for retirees.

AAR Insurance is also expected to continue providing coverage through the 2025/2026 period. However, Hussein expressed concern over the lack of comprehensive medical benefits, particularly for retirees facing high medical costs.

The Chairman also emphasized the vital role of the Social Health Authority (SHA) in supporting the elderly.

Representatives from SHA were present at the event to explain the authority's benefits, registration process, and available services. KARO operations are funded

through member subscriptions, which help the organization advocate for better retiree benefits.

Hussein referenced key constitutional provisions, including Article 43(1), which guarantees social protection rights, and Article 57, which calls for the government to protect the welfare of the elderly.

He noted that the government has not adequately addressed the healthcare needs of retirees, leaving them vulnerable to steep medical costs despite these protections.

Despite ongoing negotiations, KARO's attempts to secure comprehensive medical cover through the National Health Insurance Fund (NHIF) have been hindered by recent health legislation.

Retirees are further marginalized by the exclusion of chronic pre-existing conditions in private insurance policies, leaving them without sufficient coverage.

Hussein also highlighted the alarming financial insecurity faced by many retirees, noting that over 25 per cent of public service retirees earn less than Sh4,000 per month—well below the national poverty line. He called on the government to expedite the creation of a Post-Retirement Medical Cover policy to allow retirees to afford medical

insurance premiums.

The Chairman also urged the government to align Kenya's policies with

international standards, including the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and the International Labour Organization (ILO), to prevent retirees from falling into poverty due to inadequate pensions and healthcare.

He expressed optimism about the development of the Emeritus Programme/Policy, which aims to leverage the skills and expertise of retired public servants for the benefit of the nation.

Through these ongoing efforts, KARO seeks to secure the rights and enhance the quality of life for Kenya's retired public officers.

In a keynote address by Kinuthia Wamwangi, EBS, Ambassador for Older Persons in Africa, called

on Kenya to place greater emphasis on the dignity, rights, and well-being of its aging population.

The Ambassador also stressed the importance of healthcare for retirees, urging both the government and families to focus on ensuring that older persons have access to quality healthcare, nutrition, and mental wellness.

"Retirement must go hand in hand with health," he noted, advocating for environments where elderly citizens can thrive, not merely survive.

Wamwangi acknowledged the challenges older people face as family businesses transition between generations calling for the preservation of these businesses.

Experts call for stronger collaboration to fill gaps in climate and health

Experts have underscored the need for stronger research collaborations, increased investment, and data-driven policies to tackle the growing health challenges of climate change across Africa.

Speaking during a high-level panel on closing research and evidence gaps between climate and health, Dr. Pushpam Kumar, Chief Environmental Economist and Senior Economic Advisor at the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP), emphasized that sound evidence remains the foundation for effective decision-making in climate and health policy.

"When health tries to position itself within global climate negotiations, the first question always is, 'where is the evidence?'" posed Dr. Kumar, stressing that without localized data, Africa risks being sidelined in the global climate discourse.

He also added that credible evidence is essential for planning resilient health systems, guiding investments, and ensuring communities are better prepared for climate related health risks.

Further, Dr. Kumar also highlighted the Advancing Research on Climate Change and Health (ARCH) initiative, funded by the FCDO (Foreign and Commonwealth Development Office) and IDRC (International Development Research Centre), which is strengthening systems for continuous evidence generation.

According to the Chief Environmental Economist, the initiative operates through five global research hubs, including two in Africa, to mentor early-career scientists, expand networks, and promote gender responsive research at the primary health care level.

Making her remarks, Dr. Elisabeth Kimani-Murage, from the African Population and Health Research Center (APHRC), presented the concept of the Eastern Africa Climate and Health Science Policy and Innovation Center (EAT SPICE), an initiative aimed at addressing evidence fragmentation and policy integration in the region.

Though still a concept, EAT SPICE envisions a locally led, transdisciplinary hub that unites research, policy, and community voices to advance climate and health solutions.

"We have many climate policies, but health co-benefits are often missing," implored Dr. Kimani-Murage assuring that EAT SPICE will bring together data, evidence, and partnerships to ensure equity, justice, and African leadership in research.

She outlined three strategic pillars for the center including high-quality collaborative research that integrates local and indigenous knowledge; policy influence and advocacy to ensure evidence informs practice; and capacity strengthening anchored in diversity, inclusion, and climate justice.

Representing the Lancet Countdown Africa Regional Centre, Dr. Tafadzwa Mabhaudhi also explained that the initiative, as part of the global Lancet Countdown network, tracks and reports on the health impacts of climate change from over 200 experts worldwide.

Dr. Mabhaudhi disclosed that the Africa regional hub was launched to contextualize global data and ensure that the continent's unique realities inform global indicators and policies.

"Our mandate is not research, but evidence synthesis, policy translation, and advocacy," he highlighted. "We need to move beyond data collection to wisdom — applying knowledge to influence policy and practice".

He added that closing Africa's capacity gap remains key, arguing that real progress depends

on building a generation of professionals who can interpret evidence, question decisions, and shape policies at the intersection of climate and health.

At the same time, the session also featured a presentation on the Sub-Saharan Atmospheric Monitoring Service for Africa (SAMSA) by Dr. Bas

Henzing, Head of Climate and Air Quality at the Netherlands Organisation for Applied Scientific Research who explained that SAMSA aims to connect health outcomes with air quality and climate data to better understand and manage the growing urban health crisis across African cities.

He lamented that urbanization and rising pollution levels are worsening public health, yet data linking climate variables and health outcomes remains limited.

SAMSA, according to Dr. Henzing, seeks to bridge this gap by integrating real time data from multiple sources, including satellite observations, sensors, and

local monitoring systems across national and sub-national levels.

"The challenge is to close the gap between policy-makers, scientists, and community workers. We must link climate and air quality data with health indicators to guide interventions and support decision-making," he urged.

Senate calls for increased access to early childhood and vocational education in Kenya

The Senate Committee on Education has emphasized its commitment to strengthening Early Childhood Development Education (ECDE) and Vocational Training Centres (VTCs) across the country.

Speaking in Trans Nzoia County during an oversight visit focused on human resource management, the Committee, led by Senator Betty Montet and Vice Chair Prof. Margaret Kamar, said this initiative will promote holistic development and equip the next generation with relevant skills.

The Committee highlighted the need for counties to prioritize increasing the number of ECDE centres and VTCs to ensure more beneficiaries are reached.

"If our youth are not trained, we will continue to see a growing number of unskilled young people. Those who drop out after primary or secondary school must have an opportunity to gain practical skills," said Prof. Kamar.

Highlighting the importance of skill-based

education, Senator Kamar expressed concern that the transition rate from secondary schools to universities in some counties remains low. In Trans Nzoia County, for instance, the transition rate stands at just 20 percent.

Saying that education is an equalisation factor, Kamar urged parents and guardians to support their children to enroll for technical training as it provides a reliable path to employment and entrepreneurship.

"Every child deserves a chance to learn a skill. Whether they proceed to university or not, VTCs offer them a sense of direction and dignity," she said pointing out the need to also invest heavily in early childhood education. "ECD should be taken seriously because this is when a child's potential begins to show. It is at this stage that we can tell which direction their talents and abilities are likely to take," she added.

Applauding Trans Nzoia County for the remarkable strides achieved in improving ECDE and VTCs, the Committee picked out a move by the county to

absorb ECDE teachers on Permanent and Pensionable terms describing it as a game changer in the sector as it comes with a bundle of motivation.

"Trans Nzoia has set a commendable example by recognising the importance of early learning. When teachers are well motivated, they give their best to the young ones," said the Committee Chair.

The Committee was also impressed with the significant emergency of more ECDE centres in Trans Nzoia County between the year 2022 and 2025.

The said period coinciding with the era of Governor George Natembaya, has seen ECDE centres rise to 143, nearly doubling the number since the inception of devolution. The Governor who was present assured the Senate team that his administration remains committed to strengthening the county's education sector, revealing that starting 2025-2026 Financial Year, tuition in VTCs will be free.

Other members of the Committee who were present were Laikipia Senator John Kinyua and Taita Taveta.

how to turn this waste into useful products that benefit our people," said Njuki.

He added that the partnership would not only improve environmental management but also create employment opportunities, especially for the youth, through the collection, processing, and production of organic fertilizer from waste.

"We import a lot of fertiliser as a country, yet most of our waste is organic. By turning waste into agricultural inputs, we will promote food security, create jobs, and enhance useful production," he added.

The MoU establishes a Special Purpose Vehicle (SPV) that will allow the counties to engage an international investor, the Jospong Group from Ghana, which has a proven track record in modern waste management (BETA).

Koskei reaffirms state's commitment to equitable development across Kenya

The Head of Public Service and Chief of Staff, Felix Koskei, has reaffirmed the government's commitment to ensuring equitable development across all regions of the country.

Speaking at Lupida Primary School in Nambale Sub-County, Koskei urged Kenyans to support the government and its development projects, which aim to transform the nation.

Makokha added that the government has also launched the

national training program for county training officers to align County plans with national development blueprint. We are also training NGAO officers on a program called Emerging Paradigm in Data Ecosystem on grass root leaders to ensure every village contributes data and evidence to guide national decisions.

The Principal Secretary for State Department of Micro Small and Medium Enterprises (MSME), Susan Mang'eni, urged the youth to embrace the NYOTA program so that they can get capital to start business and create their own employment.

"We want to tackle the issue of unemployment and NYOTA program is one of the initiatives to address the same. This calls for the support from other leaders to ensure after these youths have been empowered with funds to start business; the environment is made conducive for them to do their businesses," she said.

Mang'eni pointed out that the hustler fund repayment rate in Busia County stands at 80 % calling for defaulters to clear their debts.

"In Busia County we have disbursed close to Sh980 million through hustler funds. My call to all who took the funds is to ensure they pay back so as to improve their limit and give opportunity to others to benefit from the fund. The county repayment rate is 80% but we are working to see how the remaining 20% is achieved" she said.

Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA) notifies the public that it has enhanced the Tax Compliance Certificate (TCC) application process to include compliance with eTIMS/TIMS for non-individual entities and individuals with income other than employment income.

Taxpayers seeking a TCC must:

1. Be compliant with eTIMS/TIMS registration for persons in business.
2. File tax returns on or before the due date for all applicable tax obligations.
3. Make payment of tax on or before the due date.
4. Settle all outstanding tax liability and/or apply for a payment plan which upon approval, enables the taxpayer to continue with the self-service process of TCC application.
5. Be VAT compliant (including VAT Special Table status).

Taxpayers can apply for a TCC through the iTax platform. They can check validity of a TCC using the Certificate Checker on <https://itax.kra.go.ke/KRA-Portal/>

Delivery of Government projects and the role of the citizenry

Delivery of goods and services to the people of Kenya is the heartbeat of public service. It is the link between promises made by the government and lives changed on the ground. In Kenya today, that link must be tested in the lived reality of citizens, on the roads they use, in the hospitals they visit, in the time it takes for a public project or programme to move from paper to presence to impact.

For this to happen, the government works to ensure that what is planned is actually implemented, and that what is done makes a difference. In recent months, the Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff, Delivery and Government Efficiency, through the Government Delivery Unit (GDU), has led targeted project inspections across counties, documenting progress, uncovering areas where delivery has stagnated and trouble-shooting to resolve challenges in the implementation process.

In several counties, there were various stalled projects caused by a range of issues, including contractors facing capacity challenges, challenges in the tender process, or delays in mo-

bilization of equipment and labour for works. To address this, the Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff, Delivery and Government Efficiency has been at the forefront, urging implementing government agencies to improve contractor evaluation frameworks and discourage repeated non-performance amongst contractors. This is aimed at improving project management and delivering quality outcomes for all Kenyans.

Previously stalled projects which the Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff, Delivery and Government Efficiency has assisted in trouble-shooting include the Loitoktok tomato agro-processing factory construction of the Gilgil market and other infrastructure projects within Nakuru county and construction of a Science Complex and dormitories at the Nairobi School. The trouble-shooting process brings together a multitude of key stakeholders involved in the project and is aimed at ensuring that the projects are implemented as planned and are completed on time.

In the case of the Mamboleo-Miwani-Chemelil-Muhoroni-Kipsitet corridor, the 122-kilometre stretch is a key transport link for Kisumu county and the surrounding sugar belt. The project has been

revived in line with the Government's Bottom-Up Economic Transformation Agenda (BETA), which prioritizes the maintenance and



expansion of critical transport corridors to support trade and service delivery. Renewed progress on the project has brought relief to local communities and helped restore economic activity in the region.

The GDU's verification of progress in implementation of projects and programmes is critical in ensuring that they are on track to meeting their objectives and goals. Project progress reports, however critical and no matter how convincing, must be backed by reality on the ground. This is the reason teams are dispatched to project and programmes implementation sites in order to confirm progress. Are the structures up? Are traders preparing to move in? Are timelines being met?

Are key stakeholders part of the implementation process? What do the locals think about the project or programme? All these and many more checklists assist in accurately capturing progress and identifying core implementation bottlenecks.

However, citizens are essential partners and stakeholders in the Government's mission to monitor projects and programmes. During recent inspection tours, members of the public stepped forward to share insights that helped expose gaps and highlight areas needing urgent attention. In some instances, members of the public, long seen merely as passive observers of the implementation process, have pointed out key gaps in project design which has provided invaluable information in redesigning projects and programmes or extending them to address the gaps. Such feedback which is often seen as complaints is being taken seriously and follow-up action is taken to inform decisions made on the ground.

One prominent aspect which has been clear in all project inspections is that timelines matter. A school project delayed by one year is a class-year missed by students. A stalled road is more than an inconvenience. Delay is a threat to commerce,

healthcare access, and overall national productivity. Delivery of government projects must therefore be measured by not only how efficient they are but also how timely and impactful they are on their targeted beneficiaries.

Challenges in project implementation, while to be expected should not be viewed as an excuse. Yes, budget cycles can be unpredictable. Procurement systems still need tightening. Capacity gaps remain. However, this administration has committed to transparency, impact, and responsiveness. We are laying the groundwork not just for today's projects, but for a public service that understands that delivery is a permanent responsibility.

We are working toward a Kenya where service delivery is timely, efficient, and people-centred. From policy gaps to potholes, from inadequate funding to functionality of completed projects, we are working with all those involved to address challenges, improve efficiency and effectiveness. Because when the last mile is delivered, the first mile of transformation begins.

Background Information

One of the principal objectives of the African Union (AU) is to promote peace, security and stability on the continent. The Protocol Relating to the Establishment of the Peace and Security Council establishes the primary decision-making organ, which is the Peace and Security Council (PSC). Through the AU Peace and Security Council (PSC), the AU seeks to "anticipate and prevent conflicts." Article 12 of the PSC Protocol provides for the establishment and operationalization of the Continental Early Warning System (CEWS) whose primary objectives are the anticipation and prevention of conflicts as well as the provision of timely policy options for the AUC Chairperson. At its 463rd meeting in October 2014 the PSC held an open session on the theme "Structural Prevention of Conflict – Reinvigorating States in Fragile Situations in Africa". The PSC Session commended efforts by the AUC to finalize the elaboration of a Continental Structural Conflict Prevention Framework (CSCP), which includes a Country Structural Vulnerability and Resilience Assessment (CSRA) and Country Structural Vulnerability Mitigation Strategy (CSVMS) tools to support member states efforts in the identification of Structural Vulnerability and Resilience factors to conflict in countries at an early stage with special emphasis on seven areas that are relevant in identifying drivers of conflict. These include:

- **Socio-economic development;**
- **Good governance, the rule of law, democracy and human rights;**
- **Security sector;**
- **Environment and climate change;**
- **Gender and youth;**
- **Post-conflict peacebuilding; and**
- **Transitional justice and reconciliation.**

The PSC underscored the need for a comprehensive and holistic approach to conflict prevention, comprising both direct and operational measures to prevent the eruption of large-scale violence, and a strategic focus on the structural causes of conflict. In this respect, the PSC reiterated the need to build robust, responsive and accountable institutions, as well as promote inclusive political processes and economic empowerment to prevent conflicts and consolidate peace. At its 502nd Meeting in April 2015, the PSC, recalled its 463rd session deliberations and encouraged Member States "to fully take advantage of the CSRA and CSVMS tools in their efforts towards the structural prevention of conflict and consolidation of peace and stability." The PSC went further to request the AU Commission in collaboration with RECs to avail all necessary resources to Member States. The Commission has since elaborated on the CSCP, put in place the CSRA and CSVMS tools and finalized Guidelines and Methodology.

The communiqué of the 1163rd meeting of the AU PSC convened at the Ministerial level on July 21, 2023, underscored the need for Member States to fully embrace the Continental Conflict Prevention Frameworks, which include the voluntary Country Structural Vulnerability and Resilience Assessment (CSRA) and Country Structural Vulnerability Mitigation Strategies (CSVMS).

The process of undertaking the CSRA and developing the CSVMS is voluntary, and country driven. The CSRA is generated through a request from a Member State, simultaneously to the REC it belongs to, as well as to the AU Commission. So far, five (5) Member States have acceded to the CSRA/CSVMS process namely: The Republic of Ghana (2017), the Republic of Côte d'Ivoire (2019); the Republic of Zambia (2021); the Republic of Malawi (2023) and the Republic of Kenya (2023, through COMESA).

The Ministry is currently soliciting Expressions of Interest (EOIs) for an eligible lead consultant for **Kenya's Country Structural Vulnerability and Resilience Assessment Process** as per the given Terms of Reference.

Scope of the Assignment and Specific Outputs

The lead consultant will be in-charge of the team of three experts who will provide technical and strategic support to the development of a Country Structural Vulnerability and Resilience Assessment (CSRA) and Country Structural Vulnerability Mitigation Strategy (CSVMS) report including a draft Implementation Strategy/ Matrix and Lesson Learnt Report. The specific outputs include:

- a. Inception Report based on Desk Top Research and consultations with AU-DPAPS & APRM, COMESA, EAC, IGAD, and Kenya Government SVA Bureau and Stakeholders as well as Members of the Technical Working Group on CSRA;

Leaders call for greater investment in youth, women's football

Football stakeholders have called for increased investment at grassroots, youth, and women's football to strengthen the sport's development across Africa.

Speaking during the fourth edition of the Africa Football Business Summit in Mombasa, Football Kenya Federation (FKF) President Hussein Mohammed said the federation is channeling more resources towards nurturing young talents and improving governance structures within the sport.

Mohammed noted that FKF is undergoing major restructuring aimed at promoting accountability and professionalism in football management.

"Our focus as a federation will be to invest in youth football. We are restructuring the federation to ensure strong governance systems, and in the coming months, there will be significant investment in youth and women's football," he said.

He added that FKF is also investing in data analytics and modern administrative systems to enhance efficiency in football management.

The FKF president further announced plans to launch a regional beach football tournament to be hosted in the Coast region, noting that the area has shown great progress in developing the sport.

"This region has shown us that it is possible to fix football through collaboration and cooperation. We thank the Mombasa branch leadership for their efforts in promoting the game," he added.

President of the Grenada Football Association (GFA) and FIFA Technical Development Committee member, Marlon Glean, who attended the summit, praised Kenya's football leadership and called for stronger collaboration between Africa and the Caribbean in promoting football globally.

"Kenyan football is in good hands. We in the Caribbean see ourselves as an extension of Africa since we share the same bloodline, culture, and passion. It's time Africa and the Caribbean stand together to dominate the global football space," he said.

Glean pointed out that with about 79 FIFA member associations between Africa and the Caribbean, the two regions have the potential to influence global football policies if they work together.

"There's no reason we shouldn't be dominating the global football arena," he added.

Hussein also urged Kenyans to rally behind the Harambee Starlets, who are scheduled to play against Gambia in a qualifier match at Nyayo Stadium.

"Please come out in large numbers to support our girls. They have shown great promise, and we believe they will make the country proud," he said.

New board set to boost clean water supply efficiency

Bomet County Government is committed to providing clean potable water to the public, Governor Prof Hillary Barchok has said.

Speaking at Kabungut in Bomet Central Subcounty, the governor noted that with the inauguration of the new Bomet Water and Sanitation Company (BOMWASCO) Board of Management, water supply in the county will be



revitalised.

During the board inauguration, Governor Barchok assured the new board of his full support, pledging to facilitate their operations, fund interventions, and collaborate with stakeholders to ensure BOMWASCO successfully meets the county's growing water needs.

He urged the board to move swiftly to address water supply challenges in Bomet County and en-

sure residents have uninterrupted access to clean water.

Since its incorporation in 2013, BOMWASCO has

expanded from 7 to 14 water schemes but faces significant demand pressure, particularly in Bomet town, due to population growth.

Water demand has surged with an increased student population at institutions like Bomet University College, which requires 4,500 cubic meters of water. However, the Bomet Water Supply Scheme currently produces only 1,200 cubic meters, falling short of its

2,500 cubic meters design capacity.

Governor Barchok tasked the board to urgently tackle the 63 percent Non-Revenue Water (NRW) loss from illegal connections, infrastructure damage, and high-power costs. He emphasized that savings from these efforts should fund scheme improvements and last-mile connections to meet rising demand.

He also highlighted the

need to solarize water plants to reduce electricity costs.

As part of interventions to cut electricity expenses, the Department of Water, Sanitation, Environment and Climate Change, through FLLoCA funding, has initiated solarization of water schemes including Bomet Water Supply and Longisa Water Supply, alongside community-identified spring protection and pipeline extension projects.

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Kenya navigates sustainable Blue Economy with Marine Spatial Plan

Kenya is developing an ambitious National Marine Spatial Plan (MSP) to guide the sustainable use of its ocean resources and unlock the vast potential of the Blue Economy, which largely remains untapped.

The MSP is a 20-year strategic framework approved by the Cabinet, designed to guide the sustainable and integrated use of Kenya's 250,000 square-kilometre ocean space, ensuring a balance between economic growth, environmental conservation, and social equity.

Although the still in draft form, the final plan is expected to be ready by June 2026 for submission to the Cabinet for approval. The initiative is supported by the Government of Kenya and the World Bank through the Kenya Marine Fisheries and Socio-Economic Development (KEMFSED) Project.

The MSP covers the country's coastline, stretching from Vanga in Kwale County to Kiunga in Lamu County, which faces increasing pressure from overexploitation and user conflicts.

Experts say Kenya must integrate environmental management with economic, fiscal, and social goals to ensure sustainable marine development.

Marine Spatial Planning has increasingly gained attention globally as a practical framework for coordinated management and decision-making in marine areas.

The plan's scope includes inshore waters in Kwale, Mombasa, Kilifi, Lamu, and Tana River Counties, territorial seas, and the Exclusive Economic Zone

(EEZ).

The Mining, Blue Economy and Maritime Affairs Ministry, through the State Department for the Blue Economy and Fisheries, has finalised a series of community engagement sessions in Kilifi, Lamu, Tana River, Kwale, and Mombasa.

Participatory forums aimed to raise awareness, build capacity for meaningful participation, and gather local perspectives on resource use, conservation, and development priorities. Participants included representatives of different local stakeholder groups that have an interest in the ocean space.

Representatives of national and county governments, local non-governmental and community-based organisations involved in various activities, community groups, minority groups, beach management units, hotels and tourism and the private sector/business networks, were mainstreamed in the discussions among others.

Deputy Director Physical Planning at the State Department for Lands and Physical Planning, John Tabu said public participation is central to the MSP process as it incorporates the voices of communities directly affected by marine activities.

Kenya's Vision 2030 identifies the MSP as a key frontier in expanding the food economy, while the Fourth Medium Term Plan (MTP IV) recognises the Blue Economy as a driver of national growth.

"The MTP IV provides that the preparation of the MSP is the framework to unlock the resources that are in the Blue Economy," he stated, adding that the plan will zone the marine

space for fishing grounds, tourism, energy, shipping lanes, conservation, water sports and mining.

He added that the plan would also establish management frameworks and regulations to ensure sustainable use of marine zones.

"We are doing this so Kenya can advance to the next stage of development. As the President said, we aim to become a first-world country within 30 years, and that starts with developing and properly managing what we have," Tabu emphasised.

Secretary of the Mombasa Beach Management Unit (BMU) Network, Halima Mweru said the MSP would help reduce conflicts among ocean users. She noted that activities such as port dredging often disrupt fishing grounds, reducing fish catches and sparking tensions between port operators and fisherfolk.

"If we follow the plan, it will end or reduce such conflicts," she stated.

National Land Commission (NLC) Mombasa County Coordinator, Patrick Waweru said the Commission is ensuring the MSP process aligns with constitutional, legal, and international obligations.

"NLC is in the MSP process to ensure that stakeholders in the marine space are involved. They participate in identifying the issues, challenges and potential and also coming up with proposals to advance the national development goals and at the same time conserve marine biodiversity."

Coach Twalib Yusuf, Secretary of Aquatic Sports, called for the establishment of community rescue centres along the beaches and the embedding of lifeguards on the beaches to improve the safety of ocean users.

State steps up forest conservation efforts

From 15-billion tree planting campaign to enactment of new policies and laws, the conservation drive aims to restore ecosystems, combat climate change, and inspire global action

When you plant trees, you not only grow forests, food, water and jobs, but also a sustainable future.

The Government, as well as ordinary citizens, understand this better as they join forces to plant trees in different parts of the country.

Under the anchor campaign, which involves the planting of 15 billion trees in 10 years, the country is carrying out an environmental restoration programme never witnessed before as it seeks to reverse climate change effects.

Climate change, while it appears to be only an environmental problem, burdens other sectors like health, energy, transport, finance and blue economy.

The national forest restoration project, which was kicked off on December 21, 2022, after a presidential launch at Ngong Forest, targets to plant 15 billion trees by 2032, thus restoring 10.6 million hectares of degraded forests and rangelands.

Most importantly, the programme aims to raise the national tree cover to 30 per cent from the current 12 per cent.

To support this ambitious drive, the Government established seed centres across the country as well as partnered with various stakeholders to accelerate seedlings production.

A major boost, however, has come with the adoption of a Whole-of-Government Approach, with each Ministry, Department and Agency assigned a specific forest or degraded landscape to restore.

President William Ruto, Cabinet Secretaries and other senior officials have planted trees at public functions and various institutions as part of the Government policy.

The first phase of the project, which

runs until 2027 and targets to plant five billion trees, has recorded remarkable success, with over 1.06 billion trees planted so far, President Ruto said while marking Mazingira Day on October 10, 2025. "We call on every Kenyan to make their contribution to the national tree-planting drive as we work towards our ambitious goal of 15 billion trees by 2032," the President said.

He acknowledged existing challenges in accessing tree seedlings and reassured that the Government will continue to provide them across the country under a new strategy.

This is through a multi-agency approach involving Kenya Forest Service (KFS) and National Youth Service (NYS).

"KFS, in collaboration with the NYS, will mobilise 15,000 NYS personnel to revive 300 nurseries in all our forests and establish 17 mega nurseries to produce two billion seedlings every year for Kenyans to plant," the President said.

In the collaboration, KFS brings decades of forestry knowledge, nursery management and ecological planning, while NYS contributes a disciplined, youthful workforce capable of executing

large-scale operations across the country.

The nurseries, besides delivering seedlings, serve as key points for technical training and community engagement.

The Mau Forest Complex Integrated Conservation and Livelihood Improvement Programme, spearheaded by Environment PS, Eng. Dr Festus Ng'eno and which is being launched today, complements the overall forest restoration campaign.

The flagship initiative, targeting Kenya's largest closed-canopy forest ecosystem, seeks to restore the vital water catchment area and its biodiversity.

The Mau Forest is not just a forest, it is a lifeline; its restoration, therefore, is a national duty.

To monitor the progress made in planting trees, the Government has embraced digital tools, in particular Jaza Miti App.

The app allows users to document tree-planting activities by recording the number, species and location of trees planted. One also can upload photos and monitor the survival and growth of their trees over time.

President Ruto, who chairs the

Committee of African Heads of State and Government on Climate Change (CAHOSCC), noted that across the globe, greenhouse gas emissions are still on the rise.

He challenged the international community to step up contributions in climate change adaptation and mitigation to complement Africa's efforts.

At the recently held second Africa Climate Summit in Addis Ababa, the President said Africa is taking bold approaches to climate action by adopting climate positive growth, positioning the continent as a source of solutions rather than a victim.

He noted that the Nairobi Declaration adopted at the inaugural Africa Climate Summit in September 2023 demonstrated Africa's commitment to climate action as a driver of economic growth, transformation and job creation, and not a burden.

Apart from restoring the environment, the 15 billion trees programme has created hundreds of jobs for the youth and women, including through the sale of seedlings as well as the planting and taking care of the plants.

One may wonder, how does tree planting help in reversing climate change effects? First, trees isolate and absorb carbon dioxide from the atmosphere, therefore, reducing emissions as they store the carbon in the leaves and soil and release oxygen into the atmosphere.

Further, trees help in stabilising land by preventing soil erosion thus boosting fertility besides mitigating pollution and evaporation of moisture.

Kenya's national tree restoration programme is anchored in the National Climate Change Action Plan (NCCAP) 2023-2027 and the second Nationally Determined Contribution (NDC), which outline bold targets that include a 35 per cent reduction in greenhouse gas emissions by 2035.

NCCAP identifies eight priority sectors that are central to the country's climate resilience and low-carbon development goals. These sectors are disaster risk management, food and nutrition security, water, fisheries and blue economy, forestry, wildlife and tourism, health, sanitation and human settlements, manufacturing, energy and transport and children and youth. ■



Model seeks to empower local communities to engage in economic activities to curb forest degradation

Spanning over 403,000 hectares (ha), the Mau Forest Complex (MFC) is one of the country's most vital natural resources.

It is the largest Afro-montane Forest in East Africa and Kenya's largest and most important water towers.

It comprises 22 forest blocks, 21 which are public forests managed by the Kenya Forest Service and one community managed Maasai Mau block.

The complex holds the highest economic value among all forests in the country, estimated at Sh197 billion.

This is attributed to its extensive resources and transboundary ecosystem services, according to the Ministry of Environment, Forestry and Climate Change.

The Ministry adds that the forest is a critical biodiversity hotspot since it is a habitat to species of international conservation concern and serves as the source of 12 major rivers namely

Sondi, Mara, Nyando, Yala, Ewaso Ng'iro, Molo, Njoro, Nderit, Makalia, Naishi, Mumberes and Nzoia.

The rivers feed key lakes including Turkana, Baringo, Nakuru, Natron, and Victoria.

At Lake Natron, MFC also plays a vital role in the breeding of Lesser Flamingos, as water from rivers originating in the forest feed the water body.

Further, MFC supports the livelihoods

Mau project a time-tested model in restoring degraded forests

of millions of people surrounding it, sustains the ecological health of the region and ecosystems such as the Maasai Mara and Serengeti, which are renowned for their rich biodiversity and tourism value.

Despite its critical ecological and socio-economic value, MFC faces severe degradation driven by human activities and climate change.

Key threats include illegal charcoal production, over-harvesting of wood fuel and timber, overgrazing, land use changes, forest fires and poor farming practices.

More pressures such as population growth, riparian encroachment, water pollution and unregulated water abstraction by commercial farms and industries have further strained the ecosystem.

The Main Forest Complex Integrated Conservation and Livelihood Improvement Progress (MFC-ICLIP) seeks to address the threats and challenges facing the resource.

Dr Eng. Festus K. Ng'eno, the Principal Secretary, State Department for Environment and Climate Change and the Patron of the Programme, said it is a collaboration with the private sector, development partners, NGOs conservationists and the local communities.

He described MFC-ICLIP as a trans-

formative and novel initiative to forest restoration.

“It is a programme for everyone, it is seeking to unite communities, the private sector, development partners,

to cost Sh21.5 billion and targets the Eastern, Molo, Western and South West MFC blocks and adjacent farmlands covering a total area 317,115 hectares.

“The programme outputs will be achieved through annual editions of multi-stakeholder conservation campaigns,” Dr Ng'eno explained, adding that they will help to restore and sustainably manage the Mau Forest Complex through an integrated conservation and livelihood improvement approach that enhances ecosystem functionality and strengthens climate resilience across the landscape.

The projects specific objectives are:

i. To restore degraded landscapes and protect the Mau Forest Complex, for enhanced ecosystem services, agricultural productivity and climate resilience.

ii. To support nature-positive enterprises and agricultural value chains for improved livelihoods

iii. To promote circular economy to spur green jobs for a clean and healthy environment.

iv. To promote environmental education and research to inform development and decision making.

v. Strengthen policy, governance and institutional frameworks for sustainable community based natural resource management of the Mau Forest Complex. ■




Initiative aligns with global, regional & national climate goals

The Mau Forest Complex Integrated Conservation and Livelihood Improvement Programme (MFC-ICLIP) aligns with Kenya's, regional and global environmental commitments, including Sustainable Development Goals (1, 2, 6, 7, 8, 12, 13, 15), the Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD), United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change and the AFR100 Initiative, under which Kenya has pledged to restore 5.1 million hectares by 2030.

Nationally, the Mau initiative supports

the implementation of Kenya's Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs), the National Climate Change Action Plan (NCCAP), and the National Landscape and Ecosystem Restoration Strategy (2023-2032), which targets the restoration of 10.6 million acres of degraded land through the growing of 15 billion trees in seven ecosystems.

These ecosystems include water towers, wetlands and riparian lands, natural and plantation forests and agroforestry in agro-ecosystems. ■

The forest, which spans across five counties, supports agriculture, hydropower generation and tourism

Mau Forest, renowned for its expansiveness, lush biodiversity and ecological importance, spreads across the highlands of the Rift Valley, forming magnificent canopies and river systems.


The forest spans several counties, including Nakuru, Kericho, Bomet, Narok and Baringo.

It is one of Kenya's largest natural forests, covering approximately 400,000 hectares. The forest complex is divided into multiple blocks namely Eastern Mau, Western Mau, South-West Mau, Trans Mara and Maasai Mau.

These blocks overlap with different county boundaries, making the forest a shared ecological resource among various regions.

For example, the Maasai Mau block is located in Narok County, while parts of Eastern and Western Mau extend into Nakuru and Kericho counties.

The forest's strategic location and sheer size make it a critical part of the country's ecological backbone, acting as the largest of Kenya's five "Water

Towers".

The others are Mount Kenya, Aberdare Range, Mount Elgon and Cherangany Hills. The forest is the source of numerous rivers, including the Mara, Sondu and Njoro, all which feed major lakes such as Victoria, Nakuru and Natron.

These rivers and lakes are a lifeline for millions of people across East Africa, supporting fishing, farming, tourism and trade.

Lake Victoria, the world's second-largest freshwater body, sustains one of the region's biggest inland fisheries, providing food and income to communities in Kenya, Uganda and Tanzania.

On the other hand, Lake Nakuru draws tourists from around the globe, boosting

local economies through wildlife safaris and hospitality services.

River Sondu, which originates from the Mau Forest Complex, nourishes agricultural lands in Kericho and Kisumu counties, enabling smallholder farmers to cultivate crops like maize, sugarcane, and vegetables and keep livestock.

The river also powers the Sondu Miriu Hydropower Project, which immensely contributes to Kenya's national electricity supply.

River Mara, the most iconic of the three, begins in the Mau Forest, winding through the Maasai Mara National Reserve before terminating into Lake Victoria.

It is one of Africa's most celebrated

wildlife ecosystems because it supports the annual Great Migration, where millions of wildebeest and zebras cross its waters, attracting tourists from around the world.

This spectacle fuels a thriving tourism industry, providing income and employment to thousands as it also supports pastoralism and crop farming.

On its part, River Njoro, flowing from the Eastern Mau Escarpment into Lake Nakuru, plays an equally critical role.

It supplies water to nearly a million residents in Nakuru County and helps recharge underground aquifers that ensure long-term water security.

The river feeds Lake Nakuru, a UNESCO World Heritage Site known

for its flamingos and rich biodiversity.

Mau Forest was a complete complex. However, over the decades, it has faced serious threats from deforestation, illegal logging, charcoal burning, overgrazing and agricultural encroachment.

These activities have led to widespread degradation, resulting in soil erosion, reduced water flow, biodiversity loss and frequent landslides posing significant risks to surrounding communities and the ecosystem.

The Mau Forest restoration initiative, launched today, implements large-scale reforestation, agroforestry and community conservation programmes that come as a boost to efforts initiated over the years. ■



How 10-year forest initiative will be carried out

Project has five components, with the first phase costing some Sh2.1 billion

To successfully restore the forest, the Mau Forest Complex Integrated Conservation and Livelihood Improvement Programme (MFC-ICLIP) is being implemented through the following five components:

a) Sustainable landscape management

This involves restoration of degraded landscapes and protection of natural ecosystems. Under this component, the initiative targets to restore 33,138 hectares of forests and 668.7 hectares of wetlands.

There is also the establishment of 16km of socio-economic buffer zones; fencing of 50km of forest boundaries; protection of 237.5km of wetlands and 100km of riverine areas and restoration of 143,803 hectares under sustainable land management practices targeting 128,680 farmers.

Provision of 5,000 households with solar, biogas and energy efficient stoves as well as offering solar lighting systems to 400 schools will also be done.

Component one also involves water harvesting, storage and distribution, where there is rehabilitation of 20 dams and 40 water pans, provision of 10,000 water ponds, 800 water tanks for 400

households and 400 schools, protection of 40 springs for improved water access and provision of 10 micro-irrigation kits for increased food and nutrition security.


b) Community Livelihood Improvement Programme (CLIP)

Through this component, the programme will scale-up 50 nature-positive enterprises and sustainable land management practices, including milk, potatoes and avocados, 100,000 land-use plans, training of 80,000 farmers, put 143,803 hectares under agroforestry and soil and enhance water conservation practices (terraces, grass strips and gabions).

It will also support 25,000 farmers in agroforestry through provision of high value seedlings, 50 green enterprise community savings/loan schemes and creation of at least 10,000 green jobs.

c) Circular Economy

For effective environmental management, the project encourages the creation of a circular economy. This will be done through the holding of 100 public awareness campaigns, decentralisation of 100 waste recovery and processing enterprises, construction and equipping of three material recovery facilities (MRF's), provision of 200 metal waste skips and 2,000 model colour coded bins to schools.



d) Environmental education and research

The project will support 500 Mazingira Clubs in schools, establish 50 model schools and strengthen environmental education in 50 schools.



Further, 10 model schools to showcase green learning centres, ICT hubs, circular economy initiatives, tree nurseries, solar/biogas systems will be set up in the targeted communities. In the 10-year project, annual Mau Conference and

marathons will be held.

To promote culture and heritage, the project will seek the gazetttement, construction and protection of shrines and cultural centres.

e) Governance, coordination and resource mobilisation

MFC-ICLIP will be anchored on strong governance and coordination structures, bringing together partners and stakeholders through regular roundtables and barazas at both national and local levels.

A National Technical Coordination Committee and Local Coordination Committee will provide technical backstopping and ensure inclusive, multi-stakeholder participation. To sustain the initiative, the project will also prioritise resource mobilisation through donor coordination forums and the establishment of a Mau Water Fund, positioning it as a long-term financing mechanism for landscape restoration and conservation for sustainability.

A monitoring, evaluation and learning (MEL) framework will guide implementation, incorporating baseline studies, quarterly data collection, annual review workshops and periodic evaluations in years five and 10.

The MEL system will be supported by digital tools such as an MIS platform and online dashboard, ensuring real-time tracking of progress and impact across ecological, socio-economic and institutional indicators. ■

Know Nakuru County in a minute

Nakuru County is located in Rift Valley. It shares borders with Baringo County to the north, Laikipia to the northeast, Nyandarua to the east, Kericho and Bomet to the west and Kajiado to the south. Covering an expansive area of approximately 7,509.5km², Nakuru is one of the largest and most populous counties in the country. The county experiences moderate temperatures ranging from 10°C to 28°C, with annual rainfall averaging between 850mm and 1,800mm depending on altitude and terrain. Its diverse climate supports a wide range of agricultural and ecological zones.

Nakuru City serves as the county's administrative and commercial headquarters. It was granted city status in December 2021, making it Kenya's fourth city after Nairobi, Mombasa, and Kisumu.

The county is renowned for



its rich biodiversity and scenic landscapes. Lake Nakuru National Park, famous for its flamingo population and rhino sanctuary, is a major tourist attraction. Other natural landmarks include Menengai Crater, one of the largest volcanic calderas in the world, and Lake Naivasha, a freshwater lake that supports vibrant birdlife and water-based tourism.

Agriculture is the backbone

of Nakuru's economy, with residents engaged in mixed farming—growing crops such as maize, potatoes, and horticultural produce, alongside dairy and poultry farming. The county also boasts a growing manufacturing sector, robust trade networks, and a thriving tourism industry. According to the 2019 census, Nakuru County has a population of 2.16 million, making it the third most populous county in Kenya.

Ministry mainstreams environment agenda as tree planting drives intensify

State's funding of the sector grows enabling the Ministry to entrench tree planting, including through celebrations like Mazingira Day

The Government has ramped up its investment in the environment sector, enhancing budgetary allocations over the years.

In the financial year 2025/2026, the Government allocation to the Environment, Climate Change and Forestry sector stood at Sh10.7 billion as Treasury prioritised the acceleration of forest restoration efforts.

Of the money, Sh1.6 billion went to forest research and development to enhance scientific understanding of the forest ecosystems, promote innovation in agroforestry and inform policy decisions.

Further, Sh3.7 billion was earmarked for environmental management and protection to fund restoration of degraded ecosystems, enforcement of environmental regulations and community-led conservation programmes.

Treasury also allocated Sh1.5 billion to the Financing Locally Led Climate Action (FLLoCA) Project.

The initiative empowers counties to design and implement climate resilience initiatives tailored to local needs.

Meteorological services, on the other hand, in the budget read in June received

Sh1.6 billion, money to be used for modernisation of weather forecasting systems, expansion of early warning capabilities and improve climate data collection.

This allocation signals the Government's commitment to locally driven climate-solutions.

The Ministry of Environment, Climate Change and Forestry is responsible for the implementation of the above-mentioned projects.

Led by Cabinet Secretary Deborah Barasa and Principal Secretaries Dr Eng. Festus Ng'eno (Environment and Climate Change) and Gitonga Mugambi (Forestry), the Ministry plays a central role in shaping environmental policy and promoting climate resilience.

One of the key projects that the Ministry is implementing is the 15-billion tree campaign that seeks to boost the forest cover to 30 per cent from the current 12 per cent by 2032.

The Mau Forest and Kaptagat Forest restoration projects, among others, complement the 15-billion tree campaign.

To drive the restoration and climate mitigation agenda, the Ministry has developed various frameworks, including

the National Climate Change Action Plan (NCCAP) and Kenya's Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) under the Paris Agreement.

The Ministry further spearheaded the process to develop and enact the Climate Change (Carbon Markets) Regulations, 2024.

The law took effect on May 17, 2024, providing a comprehensive legal structure for the development and oversight of carbon markets in the country.

It categorises carbon projects into land-based, like reforestation and conservation and non-land-based like clean cook stoves and solar lighting initiatives.

It distinguishes between compliance carbon markets (regulated) and volun-

tary carbon markets, enabling both public and private sector participation.

The law mandates community development agreements and annual social contributions to ensure local communities benefit from carbon projects. Another key milestones the Ministry has made in the environment and climate change sectors include the rehabilitation of critical ecosystems such as the Mau Forest Complex and Mount Kenya, which are vital for water security and biodiversity.

Under the 15-billion tree campaign, the Ministry has spearheaded the growing of 1.06 billion trees.

The campaign targets to reduce greenhouse emissions as well as stop and reverse deforestation. Tree planting is a powerful sustainable solution to mitigate the adverse effects of climate change and reduce environmental degradation.

In the campaign, the Government is pushing for the planting of a variety of trees depending on regions.

These include indigenous species like mukau (*Melia volkensii*), croton and acacia, suitable for arid and semi-arid lands due to their resilience and ecological benefits.

The Government is also promoting the planting of fruit trees like mango, avocado and guava, particularly in schools and homesteads, to enhance food security and provide economic opportunities for families.

CS Barasa on Mazingira Day said that in the fruit tree campaign, the Government targets to grow 100 million trees in primary schools, linking environmental conservation with food security and education.

The approach further ensures that young learners grow up with a tangible connection to nature and an understanding of its role in sustaining communities.

In May 2025, the Ministry, together with various partners, including the

United Nations Office for Disaster Risk Reduction launched the Early Warnings for All (EW4All) initiative, which seeks to strengthen Kenya's disaster preparedness. It is a step towards protecting lives and livelihoods as Kenya shifts from reactive disaster response to proactive anticipatory action.

"Every Kenyan, regardless of where they live or what language they speak, deserves access to life-saving information before disaster strikes. Let us, therefore, unite, collaborate, engage and build an Early Warning System in Kenya that will reduce loss of life and livelihoods, bolster food security and build a more resilient Kenya for generations to come," Ms Barasa said.

The Ministry has also stepped up efforts to strengthen plastic waste management and promote circular economy to reduce single-use plastics, encourage recycling, reuse and sustainable packaging alternatives, building on the 2017 plastic bag ban. ■

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Ministry partners with private sector to enhance food security

The Government is restructuring the agriculture sector to enhance efficiency and productivity across the entire value chain, from research and production to harvesting, processing, marketing, consumption, and export.

Agriculture and Livestock Development Cabinet Secretary Mutahi Kagwe said the overarching goal is to make every acre of Kenyan soil productive, every farmer visible, and every harvest more valuable.

Speaking during the 5th National Agribusiness Summit in Nairobi, Kagwe emphasized that the private sector remains central to government policy and implementation in driving food security and economic growth.

"We cannot continue spending Sh500 billion annually on food imports. It is unsustainable, drains our foreign exchange reserves, denies our youth employment opportunities, and undermines our farmers' efforts," said Kagwe.

He explained that the government is incentivising the private sector to locally produce key food and industrial crops such as rice, wheat, palm oil, cotton, sugarcane, and livestock

feed—through the Land Commercialisation Initiative (LCI). The programme leases idle land on a long-term and affordable basis to bridge the gap between production and consumption.

"We are also leasing loss-making government-owned firms in the sugarcane, cotton, and pyrethrum value chains to the private sector to free up public funds. These are resources that would otherwise go into endless subsidies with no meaningful turnaround," Kagwe added. He revealed that over 1.5 million acres of

land are available across national and county levels for agricultural investment, which could significantly boost local food production.

Kagwe noted that the agriculture sector is largely driven by the private sector and remains a key contributor to job creation and national food security.

"It is the private sector that will drive agricultural transformation. We have already transferred sugar management to private players and will do the same with pyrethrum. This is not a mistake—it's policy. We also seek to integrate private-sector ideas into

government planning," he said.

The CS highlighted the government's collaboration with the Agriculture Sector Network (ASNET), an umbrella body that brings together agricultural stakeholders to harmonise operations, share ideas, and shape sectoral policies.

He added that within the Ministry, the Land Commercialisation Initiative Office will be expanded into a one-stop investment centre where local and international investors can access all necessary information and guidance on agricultural ventures.


Kajiado takes over management of Amboseli Park

The management of Amboseli National Park has officially been transferred to the Kajiado County Government following the signing and gazettlement of a Deed of Transfer of Management Functions. According to the gazette notice, the national government has transferred, conveyed, and assigned to Kajiado County the full management functions of the park. The transfer takes effect 21 days after signing

and will remain in place for 15 years, subject to renewal. Ownership of Amboseli remains with the Kenya Wildlife Service (KWS), which will continue to provide oversight on key functions. The county will now oversee conservation, wildlife security, and tourism operations within the park, while revenue collection will be conducted through the e-Citizen platform under a phased sharing arrangement.

In the 2026/2027 financial year, revenue will be split equally between the two

levels of government before the county's share rises to 70 per cent in 2027/2028. From 2028/2029, Kajiado County will retain 100 per cent of collections, while five per cent will remain with the national government to support research and ecological monitoring.

A transition committee

will supervise the handing-over until June 30, 2026, during which the national government will continue paying salaries and managing existing contracts.

All current employees will be retained, with the county expected to gradually take over.

Correctional Services fetes top performers at gala
